### From the Assistant Chaplain, the Rev'd Canon Bruce Bryant-Scott

So how are we all doing?

It has been over a month since the lockdown came here in Greece. We had our last Sunday service in the Tabernacle on March 15, and the last public gathering was a funeral on Monday, March 16. Since then we have been doing church a little differently:

- Our March 29 Annual Meeting has been postponed.
- I have been publishing Sunday sermons on my blog at <a href="https://theislandparson.com/">https://theislandparson.com/</a>.
- I have also posted Resources for Worship at Home on <a href="https://theislandparson.com/">https://theislandparson.com/</a>.

- While I have not inaugurated Zoom conferences for worship in St Thomas's, I have directed people to places where they are doing it (such as St Paul's, Athens, or Holy Trinity, Geneva), or to pre-recorded services of worship (such as those led by the Archbishop of Canterbury, or St Alban's, Copenhagen).
- Julia Bradshaw and I have been calling through the members of the congregational list; if you have somehow not received a call, or would like more frequent ones, please call me at +30 69855 70353.
- I have got a work permit that allows me to go out for extraordinary reasons, and I have used it once, to meet with a UK citizen who needed some social assistance.

That said, it is not the same as "normal church". We are in a strange space, these days. Since Advent 2019 we have discussed our vision for the Anglican Church of St Thomas the Apostle, Crete, and a Mission Plan has been developed - but we cannot meet to approve it, and so we cannot implement it. As a congregation we are on the threshold of action, but we do not move out, because of the lockdown and the need for social distancing. So we stay home. Most of us here in Crete (and in the United Kingdom) are not in any imminent danger, so there is little for us to do other than the usual chores of eating, cooking, cleaning, and the pleasures of reading and sleeping. Occasionally we go out for carefully planned shopping trips or medical appointments, but unless we have dogs to walk or an intentional practice of outdoor exercise, we are confined to our homes. A few of us are working, and we carry our permits with us waiting for the Greek police to pull us over. We begin to wonder when it will end, when will be able to eat in our local tavernas. It is as though we are trapped in Samuel Beckett's play *Waiting for Godot*, a two act play whose plot has been described as, "Nothing happens, twice."

For some of us this is lovely. We may be natural introverts, and spending time on our own is a welcome break. Others find a strange relief from not having to plan a whirlwind of travel. For many of us the first few days were all right, but now we are more than a little squirrelly. Some of us have friends and family in "hot spots" in the UK and in the United States, and we know of people who have the virus, and some who have died. We worry about people we know in the health care professions.

The strange thing about all of this is that no one really knows how it will end. Some governments are contemplating opening up, but slowly, in stages, and if the number of contaminated rises significantly we are back to the full lockdown. We hope for a vaccine, but no one really knows if one can be produced soon or how effective it will be. We can dream of going back to the way it was in, say, February, but I suspect there will be some permanent changes – such as less shaking of hands, hugging and kissing, and that sort of thing. Face masks will be a permanent feature of crowds. People will travel less for meetings and use internet conferencing more.

One thing I do know is that the church will survive through all of this. The church has been through traumatic times before, and has always served as a means of comfort and rebirth. The novelty of Zoom conferences has worn off rapidly, and when we have the opportunity to get together again in person, we will welcome it with relish. As well, the good news of Jesus Christ and the power of his resurrection in our lives will speak to the rebirth of our communities. We will cross over the threshold and get on with what God has called us to.

In the meantime, let us be safe. Let us pray for those whose work puts them in some higher state of vulnerability, especially those in the medical professions. Let us be in touch with one another, meeting each other's needs as best we can. Let us be still in this time, and allow God's grace to enter us and perhaps open up to us vistas beyond imagination. As St Patrick's Breastplate puts it:

Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger.

#### From Vicky Graham and Touching the Tongas, in a letter to the Rev'd Tony Lane:

.....Many thanks for the financial support it is always appreciated, especially in times like now. Please also thank the people from St Thomas' Church for me.

Like UK, Zimbabwe is on lockdown, except for essential service, which has meant I am allowed to continue on with the clinics. This last month has been really busy, it's the season for the coughs, colds, malaria etc and always alert for any cases that may creep in with Covid 19.

The biggest problem is lack of testing and also the plan if we suspect anyone - what do we do??? Some days I just pray and ask our Lord to protect these communities and my patients. We are trying hard to do the social distancing, if can manage 1 metre we are doing well, this a very difficult thing for Africa. We are trying to take whatever precautions we can - wear face masks and gowns. Washing hands as regularly as possible. It's just another disease that is added onto the many others we deal with.

We are living in very interesting times, first time the whole world is focused on one thing. I do pray many will open their hearts to our Lord, but I know many will become hardened with what is happening....

#### A personal note from Diana:

We cannot pray together at St.Thomas' Church at present – in normal times we would have our Intercessions. I am therefore asking if you would say a prayer on Tuesday morning for the husband of a very dear friend of mine. His bereaved wife, Janet and I trained together as Nightingale nurses at St. Thomas' Hospital, London, and she writes:

HAYDN WARD 18th January 1934 – 17th April 2020

Sadly Haydn died on Friday April 17th at 7.10am. He fought stoically to conquer his failing health but Covid 19 was the final challenge.

I would like to tell you the arrangements for Haydn's funeral.

As a family we have decided we do not want to put ANYONE at risk of catching Covid 19. We are devastated, but we have taken what we believe to be the wise decision to have Haydn cremated without family and friends present at the crematorium.

The cremation will take place on Tuesday 28th of April at 8.30 am.\* (10.30am in Crete).

Myself and our three sons Julian, Timothy, Duncan and their families will be in their individual homes and will be virtually with Haydn's vicar who will lead a service for us from his rectory using Zoom.

To remember Haydn during the ceremony on April 28<sup>th</sup> from your own home, besides saying a prayer, it would be a wonderful gesture to light a candle for him.

A wee nip too! Maybe save that for the evening!!
