State News Updates

June 25, 2020

- **Governor Cuomo issued Executive Order 205. Highlights include:**
 - Directing the Commissioner of Health to issue a travel advisory to be communicated at all major points of entry in New York, including highway message boards that requires:
 - All travelers entering New York from a State with a positive test rate higher than 10 per 100,000 residents, or higher than 10% test positivity rate over a seven-day rolling average to be quarantine for 14 days.
 - Additional protocols may be issued by the Commissioner of Health in certain instances.
 - Ensuring criteria and protocols are coordinated with New Jersey and Connecticut.
 - Requiring the Department of Health to make public the restricted states, on its website:
 - Available at: <https://coronavirus.health.ny.gov/covid-19-travel-advisory>
 - Subjecting violators of the quarantine to a civil penalty of up to \$10,000.
- **Restricted States as of June 25:**
 - Alabama, Arkansas, Arizona, Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, Texas, Utah.
- **Guidance for travel:**
 - The requirements of the travel advisory do not apply to any individual passing through New York, New Jersey, or Connecticut (i.e. less than 24 hours) through the course of travel.
 - This includes stopping at rest stops or lay-overs for air/bus/train travel.
 - All New Yorkers, as well as those visiting from out of state, must take personal responsibility for complying with the advisory.

- **Guidance for essential workers:**
 - **Short-term** (those here less than 12 hours such as those delivering goods, awaiting layovers, and other short duration activities):
 - Should stay in their vehicle and/or limit personal exposure by avoiding public spaces as much as possible.
 - Should monitor temperature and signs of symptoms, wear a face covering in public, maintain social distance, and clean/disinfect workspaces.
 - Required to avoid extended periods in public, contact with strangers, and large congregate settings to the extent possible.
 - **Medium-term** (those here less than 36 hours such as those delivering multiple goods, awaiting flight layover, and other medium-duration activities):
 - Should monitor temperature and signs of symptoms, wear a face covering in public, maintain social distance, and clean/disinfect workspaces.
 - Required to avoid extended periods in public, contact with strangers, and large congregate settings to the extent possible.
 - **Long-term** (those here longer than 36 hours such as those working on longer projects, fulfilling extended employment obligations):
 - Should seek diagnostic testing as soon as possible (within 24 hours).
 - Should monitor temperature and signs of symptoms, wear a face covering in public, maintain social distance, and clean/disinfect workspaces for a minimum of 14 days.
 - Required to avoid extended periods in public, contact with strangers, and large congregate settings to the extent possible for at least seven days.
