Malia: What is/are your favorite color(s)? Mrs. Pierre: "Pink and green"


Malia: Is there anything else you will like to include?

In 2007, "toy makers recalled over a million toys worldwide because of safety concerns as a result of lead paint and small magnets." (Mayo Clinic, 2017)

When it comes to the joy of receiving toys and gifts, children and teens might look at their favorite toys and forget about the risk and the safety issues that are connected with the toy. "According to the U.S. Consumers Product Safety Commission, hospital emergency rooms were treating an estimated 251,700 toy-related injuries in 2010 throughout the United States. 72% were to people less than 15 years of age." So it is really important that if you are giving a toy to a younger sibling, any family member, or friend that you consider the safety and age range of that toy.

Have you ever played the game telephone? Well gossip is very similar to it. At the end, the sentence once mentioned can become very twisted. This game can be funny, but in real life, gossip can be hurtful.

#### Talk Versus Gossip

Talking is how you spread your thoughts, ideas, and experiences to those around you. Additionally it is not always inappropriate to tell your friends about someone you might know. For instance, saying "I like hanging out with Jake. He tells the funniest stories!" is fine, as those words are not harmful to anyone.

However, when you say mean things, tell stories that you're not sure are true, or reveal information you know was supposed to remain private, you're spreading gossip.

What if you see Jake go into the principal's office and you started to wonder if he is in trouble. Then after you wonder this you immediately started to tell other people that Jake's in big trouble. However, you really have no clue why Jake was in the office to begin with.

Then before you know it, everyone is talking about how Jake is in big trouble and thinking of scenarios for why. "Maybe he played a prank on his teacher," someone says. "Maybe he got into a fight with a kid who didn't laugh at one of his jokes," another student suggests. When Jake finally comes back EVERYONE wants to know his business.

Jake might be a little angry or confused about all the questions, especially when he explains, "I went to the principal's office because my mom was there to take me to a doctor appointment."

That's how **rumors** work. They start small and often blow up into something far different from the truth.

#### What If It's True?

Even if it **was** true that Jake was in big trouble – and you knew this for a fact – it wouldn't have been right to tell everyone else about it. Before you blab, try this out: Ask yourself if you would want other people to know

that kind of stuff about you.

Sometimes a friend will admit something to you and ask you not to share. This information might not seem so secretive to you and you might not be sure why you can't share. Sometimes you might just overhear something and you have tons of questions about the situation and what to share what you have observed. But remember you only heard **one piece** of the story.

#### When It Is Okay to Tell

Of course, sometimes it's OKAY to talk about another person, especially if it involves possible dangerous behavior. What if a classmate brings a dangerous object into school or your friend tells you something that is considered unsafe that might be happening at home? In cases like these, you need to tell a parent or another trusted adult. Telling a grownup who can help is **not** gossiping.

#### **Gossip Busters**

If you happen to hear a rumor, don't repeat it – and don't listen to it either. Additionally when someone trusts you with a personal secret, keep it to yourself. Unless of course it is considered unsafe activity, then tell a teacher or administrative staff member of the school immediately or another trusted adult.

If you're the victim of gossip, talking to a close friend, sister, brother, parent, teacher or guidance counselor can help you feel better.

At first, gossip might seem like fun. It can feel like a private little club with you and your friend whispering about another person. But if someone gossips *with* you, he or she also might gossip *about* you. And it doesn't feel good to be on the receiving end. Stick with friends who would rather live their own fun lives than talk about someone else's!

# What Is Bullying? By Hanan A.

Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior that involves a real or perceived discrepancy or onesidedness of power. The behavior is usually repeated over time. Kids who are bullied and those who bully others may have <u>serious</u>, <u>long lasting problems</u>.

Bullying includes actions such as making threats, spreading rumors, attacking someone physically or verbally, and excluding someone from a group on purpose.

For instance children with albinism are teased and physically bullied by classmates who don't understand their condition. The students who are made fun of withdraw from learning – and many ultimately leave school early. Bullying in schools is a subject that is talked about a lot. But what is bulling?

### Types of Bullying

There are many different types of bullying that can be experienced by children and adults alike. Some are obvious to spot, while others can be more subtle. The different types of bullying that you should be aware of are as follows:

#### Physical Bullying

Physical bullying includes hitting, kicking, tripping, shoving, pinching and pushing or damaging property. Physical bullying causes both short term and long term damage.

#### Verbal Bullying

Verbal bullying includes name calling, insults, teasing, intimidation, homophobic or racist remarks, or verbal abuse. While verbal bullying can start off harmless, it can escalate to levels which start affecting the individual target.

#### Social Bullying

Social bullying, sometimes referred to as covert bullying, is often carried out behind the bullied person's back. It is designed to harm someone's social reputation and/or cause humiliation. Social bullying includes:

- lying and spreading rumors
- negative facial or physical gestures, menacing or contemptuous looks
- playing nasty jokes to embarrass and humiliate
- mimicking unkindly
- encouraging others to socially exclude someone
- damaging someone's social reputation or social acceptance.

#### Cyber Bullying

Cyber bullying can be obvious or secret by using digital technologies, including hardware such as computers and smartphones, and software such as social media, instant messaging, texts, websites and other online platforms.

Cyber bullying can happen at any time. It can be in public or in private and sometimes only known to the target and the person bullying. Cyber bullying can include:

- Abusive or hurtful texts emails or posts, images or videos
- Deliberately excluding others online
- Nasty gossip or rumors
- Imitating others online or using their log-in

## Ingredients

- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 3/4 cup canola or vegetable oil
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cream of tartar
- Colored sugars, sparkling sugars, and multicolored jimmies
- 4" white craft sticks

#### Cook Time 11 Mins Yield 4 1/2 dozen

## How to Make It

# Step 1

Cookie Pops!

Beat butter and shortening at medium speed with an electric mixer until fluffy; add sugars, beating well. Add eggs, oil, and vanilla, beating until blended.

### Step 2

Combine flour and next 3 ingredients; add to butter mixture, blending well. Cover and chill dough 2 hours or overnight.

## Step 3

Shape dough into 1 1/2" balls. Roll each ball in colored sugar or jimmies in individual bowls, pressing gently, if necessary, to coat balls. Place 2" apart on ungreased baking sheets. Insert craft sticks about 1" into each cookie to resemble a lollipop.

# Step 4

Bake at 350° for 10 to 11 minutes or until set. Let cool 2 minutes on baking sheets; remove cookie pops to wire racks to cool completely.
