

REST REGIONAL EMERGENCY SHELTER TEAM NEWSLETTER

Welcome to our February REST e-newsletter. We would like to thank each and every one who let us know they liked hearing from REST in this format after our first effort went out in January. This month we're focusing on "the numbers" - where we are at the end of the first half of our season. Once again, we can't thank our volunteers enough for what you have given. We hope every one receiving this finds this newsletter filled with good information about our communities' homeless issues and what REST has been able to contribute in providing emergency shelter services.

REST: February Update Providing Emergency Shelter THE NUMBERS:

We are now entering the second half of our winter shelter season and the region's unusual mild weather is continuing. Despite the unseasonable weather, the numbers of homeless families and women utilizing our emergency shelter is higher than last year. As of the end of January, REST has averaged 15.4 guests each night as compared to 13.4 guests served last year at this time. In total, 990 beds have been filled at the 10 REST host church shelters. Children have filled 47 of those beds, many of which were under four years of age.

So far this season, our volunteers have prepared over 1,100 hot meals. Excess meals have been contributed to Jim Leonard's River Bottom Luncheon Program. Light breakfasts

However, for REST to move ahead and expand its season and services, our friends and acquaintances who reside in this community must leave the sidelines and join the team to further this effort.
