Gibson said that one particular line of shoes that they carry, SAS shoes, are everyday comfort shoes—perfect for people with hard-to-fit or problem feet. "We have a lot of sizes we can work with, and it's a brand that a lot of the foot doctors know about," Gibson explained. "It works for problem feet."

V&A Bootery is not an orthopedic store, and its employees are not trained to diagnose foot problems. However, said Gibson, because of its training and experience, the staff at V&A is able to recognize a lot of common, minor problems. Most of their salespeople, Gibson said, have a minimum of 15 years experience at V&A and, not only do they know what they're doing, but they also "take time and patience in serving their customer's needs," giving each customer one-on-one attention.

Morton said she also appreciates the familiarity of this long-term staff. "I first became a V&A customer 25 years ago when Jeffrey Gibson, now one of the owners, was a young man in college and working at his uncle's V&A store," she said. "I did not personally know Jeff until we became neighbors 10 years ago, although I was already one of V&A's loyal customers."

This relationship is no exception to the rule. Gibson said many of his long-term employees know the store's customers well. "Harold has probably sold me more shoes than any other salesperson," said Dottie Sutter, of Portage. "I always appreciate his smile.

V&A Bootery also maintains an excellent relationship with the Meyer C. Weiner Co., developers and owners of Southland Mall.

While the mall has undergone many changes over the years, Josh Weiner, CEO of the Meyer C. Weiner Co., said V&A Bootery enjoys longevity because it is a leader in its field, as well as a leader in the community.

Weiner said he is proud of the family of merchants at Southland, which includes local businesses and national chain stores.
