Easter message from the Rector.

Jesus-New life , new hope !

After something of a miserably wet, cold winter, it cheers us up no end to see the first signs of Spring and to feel the sun on our faces, and its warmth nudging the natural world back into life and colour.

As I write these words the daffodils are in full bloom and the promise of new life is everywhere.

As Christians we celebrate Easter because we believe it provides the great hope of a fresh beginning for the human race. The great central story of Jesus' death and return to life points us to God's great love for each one of us. One of the most memorable verses in the Bible reminds of this: "God loved the world so much," the apostle John tells us, "that he gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life" (Gospel of John, chapter 3, verse 16.)

This is the wonderful good news we'd love to tell you about should you decide to join us at St Margaret's this Easter.

On **Good Friday** we are planning another Messy Church occasion. There will be the usual opportunity in church for a thoughtful, reflective time focusing on the cross. At the same time, in the Parish Centre, there will be a special 'Messy Church' activity centre around the Good Friday theme (see back cover). We will then all come together in church for the last 15 minutes for a final time of worship followed refreshments and, at 12 noon, by a "Christians Together in Burnage" Walk of Witness, from Christ Church, along Burnage Lane, to St Bernard's Church.

Easter Sunday services will be at 9am and 10.30am. The former is quiet, reflective and very traditional. The latter is more of an Easter Celebration for all ages. Communion will be offered at both occasions.

All that planning and preparation and, before you know it, Christmas has been and gone, and all you've got to look forward to now is the credit card bill hitting the mat.

I'm guessing, if your Christmas was anything like the majority of the population, the sight of the total bill on your statement is hurting and you'll feel like it's going to take you until next Christmas to save up enough to pay it off

Well, perhaps the New Year is a good time to think through your financial situation; perhaps the time is right to seek out some help in how best to manage the money you receive or to work out a budget more thoroughly so that times like Christmas, which does come round every year you know, don't catch you out. Here at St.Margaret's we have trained workers who can deliver a simple, free, Money Management course, using material supplied by Christians Against **Poverty** (CAP) and if you feel this is something you'd like to explore then do, please, let us know and we will be happy to help. Otherwise, when it comes to handling your cash, you might like to consider these simple, small, changes:

- Plan early, be realistic, and budget accordingly
- When planning a larger outlay of cash remember the everyday bills which still have to be paid
- Keep things simple, don't increase your credit card bill unnecessarily if you can afford to pay with cash
- When shopping, be organised, make a list and stick to it as this will avoid impulse buying
- Shop with friends so you can buy larger quantities and get the benefit of discounts and BOGOF offers - they'll stop you over spending too
- Use your leisure time creatively bake and make rather than buying everything - it's rewarding in itself
- Don't rush into a purchase, shop around to find the best deals
- Plan ahead, buy next year's Christmas presents in this year's sales or throughout the year so it's not all done next December - just don't forget where you hide them !!

A few simple adjustments to how we handle our money, whether we have a lot or a little, can make all the difference and, above all, it means we are controlling our cash rather than our cash controlling us

The first question I am asked is "What are Lay Readers?" Well, Lay Readers in the Church of England are people licensed by the Bishop (in our case the Bishop of Manchester), and we are attached to a specific parish. We are all volunteers, and carry out many and various tasks according to the needs of the people in the parish, and working closely with the vicar.



We have all taken a 2-3 year theology training course which equips us to take certain services in the church, and to help with the day to day running of the parish. For instance the recent Memorial Service in Church was devised and led by the Lay Readers, and we also take home communion to the housebound, as well as doing home visits (pastoral care and community out-reach). It is a privilege to support and help people in this way, and is a very varied and rewarding job, serving both God and the community.



Have you ever thought about praying ?

Perhaps you have, at a time of crisis maybe or when you've wanted something so badly that you've tried everything else so why not trying praying too. That way it might all just come true for you. It'll do no harm in asking God as well, will it? When all else fails, then pray. Is that really how it should be?

For the Christian, at least, prayer should be as natural as breathing. If we only ever pray in a crisis what do we do the rest of the time? Hold our breath? If so, it's no wonder the Church in the so called, prosperous, West is dying on its feet.

Set in the context of dwindling traditional UK church attendance and a fervent wave of popular atheism what exactly is it that draws us to God in prayer in these secular times. Perhaps we all have a basic human need to look to God, our Creator, when all else seems to fail. We live in an age that is receptive to the concept of "prayer", the fundamental need to look to someone, some - thing, that is bigger, higher, stronger, more able than ourselves to help us through a difficult time.

Surely it is an encouragement that, despite the colossal force of media outlets which surround us, nothing will ever delete prayer from this world. It's a sign that says whatever humans create, whether it be buildings made of stone or communicative software tools like Twitter or Facebook, the Holy Spirit can blow in and around the detail. Prayers can line the walls of a home, pub or church. They can take centre stage on an online phenomena and make national news. Remember the call to prayer for Fabrice Muamba? 


