How are we able to come before God now?

King-John 6:13-15, John 18:33-38, Ephesians 1:20-23, Philippians 2:9-11, Revelation 20:11-15

What is a king?

Was Jesus's kingdom of this world?

Does Jesus deny he is a king of something?

Where is Jesus's Kingdom?

One day what will happen?

Day 4

So was Jesus Lord, lunatic or liar? Use scripture and your knowledge to support your opinion and tell what you believe. (The quote for these from CS Lewis was on last week's questions)

Day 5

I want you guys to put everything together at this point, including what we learned last week, and give me a complete view of who Jesus is so you could give it to a nonbeliever.
