JOINT COMMISSION READINESS

HIPAA

The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act regulates the way patient information is handled, to ensure the highest degree of confidentiality and mandates safeguards to ensure that medical information is transmitted and received with the highest degree of security.

HHC employees must only use or disclose patient protected health information (PHI) whether in paper or electronic record, only as is necessary to carry out their assigned job functions and responsibilities. Failure to follow HHC policies and procedures regarding access to PHI can result in disciplinary action (including termination), or in criminal or civil charges. Leadership imposes zero tolerance for HIPAA violations.
