State News Updates

April 10, 2020

- Assembly Republicans urged President Trump and the New York Congressional Delegation to secure immediate assistance for the States' farmers
- Governor Cuomo held a press conference at 11:30 AM and provided the following information:
 - o Daily ICU admissions have reached a negative number. More people came off ventilators yesterday than went on them.
 - o Total deaths are now up to 7,844, an increase of 777.
 - Hospitalizations by region:
 - 64% in New York City.
 - 22% in Long Island.
 - 8% Rest of New York State.
 - New York State is flattening the curve:
 - The actual curve has come in well below projections, and the Governor attributes this to New Yorkers following the policies/restrictions put in place.
 - Need to stay the course to continue the trajectory the State is on.
 - o Will continue the "surge and flex" strategy with the hospital system.
 - Expand food assistance:
 - Providing \$200 million in emergency food assistance to more than 700,000 low-income households.
 - Housing for medical workers:
 - Airbnb will contribute \$2 million to help provide rooms in union hotels at no cost to frontline healthcare workers.
 - 1199SEIU and Airbnb are partnering to offer housing to their members as they fight COVID-
 - Numerous hotels are providing an additional 800 free rooms for healthcare workers coming to New York City out of state.
 - o Working with the federal congressional delegation to set up a COVID-19 Heroes Compensation Fund.
 - Key to reopening economy is testing, and it will be a gradual reopening.
 - New York State will focus on bringing the Department of Health antibody test to scale, which is key to getting life back to the "new normal."
 - Can do 300 tests today, 1,000 by next Friday, 2,000 by the following week.
 - New York State is already testing more per capita than anywhere else.
 - To bring testing to scale:
 - Governor believes the federal government should invoke the Defense Production Act to increase numbers of available tests.
 - New York State offers a full partnership with the federal government.
 - Will join New Jersey and Connecticut for a testing coalition.
 - O Need a new federal stimulus bill:
 - Fair, non-political, and need-based legislation.

Federal News Updates

April 9, 2020

- The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced agricultural producers now have more time to repay Marketing Assistance Loans (MAL) as a result of the CARES Act
 - The loans now mature at 12 months rather than nine for most commodities.
- The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is utilizing its Tracking Accountability in Government Grants System (TAGGS) to allow for public viewing of data on the awards made from appropriations in the three federal bills signed into law to combat the Coronavirus
