Michelle Obama is the wife of former U.S. President Barack Obama. Prior to her role as first lady, she was a lawyer, Chicago city administrator, and community-outreach worker.

Mrs. Obama was born in 1964 in Chicago, Illinois. She attended Princeton University, graduating *cum laude*, meaning with distinction or honors, in 1985 and went on to earn a degree from Harvard Law School in 1988.

Following her graduation from Harvard, she worked at a Chicago law firm, where she met her husband, future U.S. president Barack Obama. The couple married on October 3, 1992. As first lady, she focused her attention on current social issues, such as poverty, healthy living and education.

A meaningful quote from Michelle Obama about education was when she said "The ability to read, write, and analyze; the confidence to stand up and demand justice and equality; the qualifications and connections to get your foot in that door and take your seat at that table – all that starts with education." Mrs. Obama said this at the Let Girls Learn Event to Celebrate International Women's Day on March 8th, 2016 in Washington D.C. Justice Sonia Sotomayor

Sonia Sotomayor made history on August 6, 2009, when the U.S. Senate confirmed her nomination to the U.S. Supreme Court. Appointed by President Barack Obama, Sotomayor became the first Hispanic Supreme Court justice. She is the third woman to become an associate justice of the Supreme Court. She follows Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg and former Justice Sandra Dav O'Connor.

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What is Social Bullying and How to Prevent It

WHAT IS SOCIAL BULLYING?

Social Bullying is defined as a form of unwanted, aggressive behavior among school-aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance that is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated.

Social Bullying, which is sometimes referred to as *relational bullying*, involves hurting someone's reputation or relationships. Social Bullying includes:

- Leaving someone out on purpose
- Telling other children or teens not be friends with someone
- Spreading rumors about someone
- Embarrassing someone in public

Social Bullying can take place when talking to people face to face or indirectly by using a social media site or texting. Social Bullying is wrong and there are several ways to prevent it.

WHAT CAN BE DONE TO PREVENT SOCIAL BULLYING?

Here are several steps that can be taken to prevent Social Bullying in school.

- 1. Have school-wide anti-bullying policies
- 2. Implement a several-step approach to helping students who might be social bullies
- 3. Provide support to students who have been bullied
- 4. Involve families and communities to help make this positive change

While you may be tempted to munch a stack of Oreos, they're also a lot of fun

Oreo Cookie Cream Pie

Prep: 25 mins.

Freezer time: At least 2 hours

to bake with. Also when you have a recipe like this luscious Oreo Ice Cream Pie, no actual baking is required!

Ingredients

- 1 Oreo cookie crumb crust (store-bought or homemade)
- 4 cups/1 quart vanilla ice cream (or Oreo Ice Cream, softened)
- 1 package Oreos
- Garnish: chocolate syrup and/or whip cream

How to Make It

- 1. Place Oreos standing up along the edge of the prepared crust.
- 2. Carefully spoon softened ice cream, into prepared crust.
- 3. Squirt chocolate syrup in thin layers over the top of the pie. Decorate with about 4 or 5 crushed Oreo cookies.
- 4. Freeze for at least 2 hours prior to serving.
