There is an old old saying, "God works in mysterious ways" which is really a way of saying God works in God's ways and those ways not being human ways, seem puzzling to us. We often make this observation when several seemingly unrelated events come together to produce an outcome for good. Several days ago, an American television actress married the Queen of England's grandson. The Queen of England being the head of the Church of England followed century old protocol and called the Archbishop of Canterbury to preside over the royal wedding. The Archbishop of Canterbury met the couple to be wedded and suggested a preacher neither had met. He suggested The Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church, a man with whom he had had a pointed disagreement. Despite their opposing view on a matter of church policy, Archbishop Justin Welby knew Michael Curry was a man of God, a man who could and would in all places and at all times proclaim the love that God's son says can save the world. So, a black man with roots in the American South showed up in St. George's Chapel of Windsor Castle and did just that. Estimates say over 100 million people heard that message. Apparently, the sermon both moved and perhaps even emboldened the Archbishop because the next day, he wrote the following.

"At the heart of what we do and believe as Christians is a revolution. It's not conventional. It's not normal. It's not just living life as it comes.

It's a revolution that should and has and will again transform the world in which we live.

It's a revolution that will not accept that we should have food banks in this land – or that our night shelters in winter should be overflowing with people who don't have a roof over their heads.

It's a revolution that does not accept that young people should suffer from mental health issues and not be treated – that people should hate themselves and hurt themselves.

It's a revolution that looks at what is wrong in this world and says we will not accept it – not because of what we've done but because of who Jesus is. That is the revolution that Presiding Bishop Michael B. Curry was talking about yesterday in his powerful sermon at the royal wedding.

It's a revolution not of violence but of love. Not of hatred or politics or manipulation – but a revolution of embrace and inclusion and renewal and acceptance and transformation.

It is a revolution that reaches to the people who are most lost and says, "You're found."

It's a revolution that reaches to the people who are most angry and brings them peace – and to the people who are most fearful and brings them courage.

It's a revolution that's not just worldwide but is for each individual: for you and for me.

It's a revolution in which Jesus Christ is not watching from a distance but is next to each one of us and says: 'You are loved, you are called, come and be with me, and let us change the world.'"

I want to live in a better world. I want a better world for my children and their children and you and your families and for mothers and fathers I don't know personally and aging folks who have seen too much turmoil and young people who doubt their value and innocent people born at the wrong time in the wrong place to know peace and plenty. I don't like conflict and revolution necessarily brings confrontation, but as the Archbishop points out, a revolution of love "should and has and will again transform the world in which we live." I'm signing on. This summer, I'm praying deeply on ways I can serve this cause. I invite you into similar prayer.

With Christ beside us and God before us, let's join a revolution of love. Let's go change the world.

During the Summer months (**beginning June 10th**), the Worship Committee invites you to "**try-on**" a new ministry.

Have you even wondered what it would be like to be an Usher, Lector, Acolyte, Chalist, Verger, Children's Chaplain, or serve on the Altar Guild?

Each week during the summer ages 10 and up can try-on a new role. (15 and up for Chalists)

Cards with instructions for each role/duty will be available on Sunday mornings in the courtyard.

There will be 1 scheduled leader for each role, who will serve as a mentor for the person "trying on" the new role. For roles served by one person (altar guild, verger & children's chaplain) you can pick a role and serve as a shadow to the person regularly scheduled for that day.

The expectation is for the **Try-on Leader** to arrive at least **20** minutes early, select the role, report to the verger for the day, vest if required and/or familiarize oneself with the readings/duties.

If you have ever thought about serving in one of these capacities but were hesitant to try, this is the perfect opportunity. You can try one role or many. You can serve one Sunday or several Sundays.

Beginning during coffee hour on **June 10**, anyone looking for an excuse to come early or stay late is invited to join in **"Go Speak – Summer Edition"**.

Go Speak is a program introduced in this diocese in 2014. As Bishop Anne said then, "It is a process to help each of us give voice to the quiet, ordinary places we meet and feel God's divine presence as well as create deeper levels of community within our congregations." The people who have participated in Go Speak have found it to be valuable, not only because they told their own stories, but because they heard others' stories of faith. Evangelism at its best!

In our diocese, Go Speak cards are used by small groups of 6-10 people gathered in homes and other informal, relaxed settings. Often, the group has a meal or refreshments. People take turns selecting a card that "speaks to them" and then tell their story. The others in the group listen without questioning or feedback. Thus, the listening becomes as integral to the process as the storytelling itself. These gatherings have proven to be comfortable and provide a safe environment to give voice to stories of how God moves in our lives.

"Go Speak – Summer Edition" will meet in the Gallery during coffee hour (9:30 ish) beginning on June 10, and continuing on subsequent Sundays as interest dictates and the Spirit leads.

No preparation or long term commitment required.


