1. To encourage integrity and honesty, the student MUST do all work of choosing and preparing Articles/Exhibits. Adults are URGED to give advice and encouragement. For younger children, parents can help with any cutting, glue guns or anything that may be dangerous.
2. All exhibits must be brought in between 9:00 am and 5:45 pm on Thursday, August 29th.
3. All exhibits must stay in the main building until 4:00 pm Sunday, September 1st, excluding baking which may be removed Saturday at 4:00 pm. Prize money may be forfeited if entries are removed before the times listed.
4. Name and school attending must be marked on the entry tag.
5. Items marked with an " $\mathbf{X}$ " become the property of the sponsor. If items are removed by the exhibitor and damaged, they are responsible for replacing the item for the sponsor or prize will be forfeited.
6. The Directors shall take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of exhibits sent to the Fair, but the owners/parents themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them. Should any exhibit be accidentally damaged, injured or lost, the Directors will give all the assistance in their power to the recovery of same, but they wish it distinctly understood that they will make no payment for any exhibit damaged, injured, lost or stolen.

2. Do not use sparkles or materials that easily break off the valentines.
3. Please sign the valentines and write a bit about yourself-your age and what school you attend. However, do not include addresses or phone numbers.
4. Do not put the date or year on the valentines.
5. Be aware of who Veterans are-they are living and were men and women who served in the military. Avoid using "RIP" and images related to violence or death such as graveyards or guns.

## Message Ideas

Tell the Veteran why they are important, what you plan to do this year to remember our nation's proud military history, or the reason you want to wish them a Happy Valentine's Day.

1. Thank the Veteran for his or her service, sacrifice and commitment to our country and citizens.
2. Write a poem or include one of significance to Valentine's Day or to Veterans, such as, "In Flanders Field" or "Roses are Red".
3. Send a store-bought valentine; hand-crafted cards, however, make Veterans feel extra special.
4. Valentines of all shapes, sizes, and colours are welcome. However, valentines that are greeting-card size are easier to package and distribute.
