In 1 Peter 3:15b, the Bible says "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have." Your "answer" is your testimony. It is the story of your encounter with God and what role He has played throughout your life.

Operation Christmas Child (OCC) is a program run by Samaritan's Purse that shows God's love through shoebox gifts with presents and the Gospel. In October and November, individuals pack boxes and bring them to the church. Marrable Hill Chapel also collects items and the ladies sew dresses and shorts for the shoeboxes



throughout the year and prior to delivering the shoeboxes for shipping, church members meet to pack boxes with these items.

United States, United Kingdom, Canada and Australia, 1,398,234 kids are registered and 115,144,128 books have been mailed. Alexis said that United Way helps fund books in Union County by paying Imagination Library a set fee per child. If a child, parent, or grandparent lives in Union County, you can sign up the child. You can sign-up by going to the site listed above. There are also brochures in our church library.
