# The YOUNG RIDER'S GUIDE To Pony Club

From Horsemanship and Sportsmanship to Fun and Games, Learn the Different Facets of This Organization

here do the crossroads of fun and education with horses meet? At The United States Pony Club, Inc. (USPC)! Poll a group of Pony Club kids as to their favorite aspect of being a member of USPC, and you'll likely hear responses such as "Riding with my friends" and "Competing at the National Championships." Ask the parents, who will tell you they enjoy the safety, teamwork, and responsibility that Pony Club promotes. Think scouts with horses! Read on to learn more about this organization that consistently produces responsible, knowledgeable, and talented equestrians.

### **How it Works**

Pony Club has a wide reach and long history. Kevin Price, CEO of USPC, explains that the Pony Club idea originated in Great Britain in 1928; today Pony Clubs exist in 31 countries, with an estimated membership of more than 130,000. Members range in ages from as young as four through age 25, and also include members of the adult Horse Masters program. "Among major English riding organizations in this country, only one, the United States Equestrian Team (USET) is older than the United States Pony Club," notes Price.

The organization's Standards of Proficiency establish a ladder of riding and horse management skills; mem-

to achieve certifications, working from the D level up through the A level. "We develop horsemen with wellrounded riding and horse management skills. The big buzz in the equine industry amongst many of the disciplines is the lack of horsemanship and horse management

skills," remarks Price. "If there is one thing that really sets Pony Club apart from other equine related organizations it is our core values, which start with education in horsemanship." In addition, older members develop leadership skills as they mentor vounger Pony Clubbers. Members can compete in various disciplines [see sidebar] at rallies.

If you are lucky enough to live near one of the USPC's Licensed Riding Centers, you can enjoy all the perks of Pony Club membership without the hefty price tag of horse ownership. Riding Centers are essentially established riding schools that have incorporated Pony Club into their program. This is a safe and practical option for

### **Not Just Pony Rides!**

While the majority of Pony Club activities consist of mounted and unmounted meetings at the local level, Price explains that USPC offers numerous opportunities, programs, and activities available to support and meet the interests of its members. These include:

- USPC Championships, competitions held on the East and West Coast in the disciplines of eventing, dressage, show jumping, polocrosse, games, tetrathlon, and quiz.
- USPC Festival, held in Lexington, KY, every third year and brings together PC members from the entire country for one championships competition, as well as mounted and unmounted educational sessions.
- USPC Annual Meeting and **Education Symposium**, held annually every January at a different location in the country and includes over 65 unmounted educational sessions.
- Visiting Instructors Program, which upper-level certified PC members participate in as visiting instructors for a Club, Riding Center or Region, thereby sharing their

knowledge and skill while at the same time gaining knowledge and skill themselves and experiencing a new location or part of the country.

- PC International Exchanges and Competitions are competitive venues in the disciplines of show jumping, tetrathlon, games, and non-competitive exchange opportunities in foxhunting. • Pony Club Pony Jumper

### USPC National Youth

Congress is a capstone educational program that brings together as many as 45 PC members from across the country to work with a select group of Pony Club graduates from a cross section of professions to interact, learn, and expand their Pony Club experience.

 USPC National Youth Board is a small group of 20 dedicated older USPC members that functions to increase communication between the organization's governing body and its members. Youth Board members participate on USPC committees and two members serve as full members of the USPC Board of Governors.

Grants and Scholarships

- are available through Pony Club, including college scholarships, and riding and educational grants available to members.
- Competitors from Pony Club also often participate in the United States Eventing Association, United States Dressage Federation, United States Hunter Jumper Association, horse breed organizations, and other sport organizations.

Don't let the name "Pony Club" fool you. "The first assumption about Pony Club is it's about kids and ponies. The first myth to bust is that our members ride only ponies. In truth, our members ride ponies and horses. The second myth to bust is that we only produce riders, and we are a feeder into the ranks of the upper levels riding disciplines. While it is true we develop riders, and some

have gone on to become international and Olympic competitors, our main goal is to develop well-rounded horsemen who will be successful citizens and leaders. In this aspect we excel," notes Price. "Included in the list of distinguished past Pony Club members is a governor of state, state and congressional representatives. generals and other high ranking military officers, and countless physicians, nurses, veterinarians, attorneys, musicians, actors, research scientists, professors, teachers, CEOs of businesses, and horse professionals of all kinds." 
