Hello, my name is Jo and I'm a member of St Margaret's Church. Since 2008 I have been visiting Zambia on a regular basis to help with the work of Dignity. Dignity is a Christian charity that seeks to bring hope to rural Africa, both by spreading the good news of Jesus and by working to alleviate poverty.

We help people start and run community Christian discipleship groups called Life! Groups. As they do so people are discovering that being a Christian is much more than going to church on Sunday. They are finding joy in living everyday with Jesus.

We are seeing great things happen as a result of *Life! Groups meeting; people becoming Christians,* people breaking free from addictions, families being reunited, orphans being cared for and many other local grass roots projects.

War and Peace

Over the last couple of months especially, we have been bombarded about the First World War in all sections of the media, as we remember the centenary of the outbreak of that "War to end Wars". I still do not quite understand why war broke out in 1914, despite reading a lot about it. *It* seems to me that it was mainly fought between political powers in Europe, who were involved in the vacuum of power left by the breakup of the Austro- Hungarian Empire. This in turn was further fuelled by involving the people of the various European Empires, and the global effect on the economy of many countries. Whatever the cause, its effect rippled out to involve ordinary people in all walks of life.

Intrigued about my own family and its part in the war, I have done some family history and found that while one of my uncles was manning the guns of the field artillery, another uncle became a stretcher bearer – working among the injured in "no mans land".

Today we are faced by outbreak of war in the Middle East. *Complicated war on several fronts involving radically different political, religious and sectarian attitudes, and forcing people into strange alliances.* Ordinary families have been, and will be, caught up in the violence – with destruction of communities, homelessness and countless numbers of refugees as an inevitable result.

It seems we humans never learn about the futility of war, and forces many to choose between warrior or stretcher bearer on a daily basis. God help us all.

HOPE-ful or HOPE-less ? You Decide

Whenever I go away on my summer holidays I try and take a book with me that is somehow connected with where I'm going. This year we went to Crete, the largest Greek island, so I took a book (*) about the leper colony that was created on Spinalonga, just off the eastern coast of Crete, between 1903 and 1957. Not exactly your standard Mills & Boon holiday romance, I grant you, but more my style.

The book itself is a work of fiction but it was inspired by the real life achievements of one particular patient of Spinalonga and the priest who ministered to the lost souls who were in exile there. It is a gruesome and, oftent, graphic, account of a hard life characterised by despair and despondancy and where a God of grace and compassion must have seemed a million miles away. However, a golden thread of HOPE runs throughout the book which culminates in the line "...the bitter things life fed me make the sweet things even sweeter. I feel blessed to be alive"

Interestingly, the local, free, newspaper for the area where we were staying also carried a small piece about **HOPE** ('elpida' in Greek) in which it said "**HOPE** is to live each and every moment at the fullest" and included some quotations from famous historical figures:

"To live is the rarest thing in the world. Most people exist, that is all" - Oscar Wilde "You've got to dance like there's nobody watching, love like you'll never be hurt, sing like there's nobody listening and live like it's heaven on earth" - William W. Purkey

"That is all a person needed: HOPE. It was lack of HOPE that discouraged a person" - Charles Bukowski, Factotum
