Calling in the pros on HVAC repair

If you're a homeowner, the internet can be a great source of comfort when it comes to tackling do-it-yourself maintenance. Unusual Noises

Nasty Odors

When an air conditioning unit or heating system is working correctly, you shouldn't be able to smell it. If there is an unpleasant odor emitted, something is wrong. Your first step should be a filter replacement, but if the smell persists you likely have mold growing, a damaged air duct, or a clogged drainpipe. Each of these situations will require a thorough cleaning of the unit and the eye of an expert tech.

Improper Airflow

Clogs, blockages, and leaks can all lead to decreased airflow in your heating and cooling systems, causing them to run less efficiently and shortening their lifespan. Qualified HVAC repair technicians have the experience to quickly diagnose and address airflow issues.

Rising Energy Bills

Have you noticed that your energy bills keep going up every month? Unless you're experiencing a big swing in temperatures, increased energy usage means your unit is having to work harder to maintain your desired temperature. By



keeping an eye on your utility bills, you can get a tech dispatched and get in front of a total breakdown and the headaches that come when your unit isn't running at all.

A note on hiring the right HVAC company

As with hiring any new contractor, take time to do your due diligence on HVAC service. Not all HVAC companies are the same, and you should never consider only one resource when determining the right one for you. Check credentials, licensing and insurance requirements in your region. Ask around for references and read reviews online. Finally, ask them for an estimate. Many HVAC repair companies will provide these at no cost. Get a quote from several different businesses before choosing one.

PROTECTIVE COVENANTS

In order to keep our neighborhood looking beautiful, please make sure you re-familiarize yourself with the following rules & regulations:



- **3.9—Parking of Vehicles:** Vehicles that are non-operational or not operated for more than a period of seven (7) calendar days cannot be stored on any lot. Any street parking must be limited to Guests Only, and only for operational vehicles. Any vehicle that is left on any lot or on a public street and is not operational for more than seven (7) days will be towed at the owners expense, without further notice.
- **3.10—Garbage and Refuse Disposal:** Trash, garbage and other waste shall not be kept except in sanitary containers and shall be kept in a location not visable from the street except on days designated for trash collection or pickup.

Have you filed your Homestead Exemption?

Fulton County Homestead Exemption Deadline is April 1



WHAT IS THE EXEMPTION?

Passed in November 2019, the exemption prevents a dramatic rise in property taxes from year to year by limited the amount property values can increase to 3 percent based on the lowest determined base year value from prior tax years. That value will be identified annually by the Fulton County Assessors Office.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

All homeowners within the city can claim the exemption, however, it applies only to homes used as primary residences. Secondary homes and investment properties are not eligible.

Once granted, exemptions automatically are renewed each year if the homeowner continually occupies the property.

IS THERE A DEADLINE?

To receive the city and county exemptions for 2020 property taxes, you must apply for exemption by April 1st. Applications received after that date will be applied to 2021 property taxes.

WHAT DO I NEED TO DO TO APPLY?

In most cases, homeowners don't need to do a thing. For those who have applied for and received Fulton County's tax exemption, the city's exemption will be applied automatically. Those who do not have the county's exemption, including those who recently have purchased homes in the city, will need to apply using one of the following three options:

- Online: Go to www.fultoncountyga.gov and complete and submit an application.
- Mail: Download an application at fultonassessor.org/exemption (scroll to the bottom of the page and mail it to the address included on the form.
- In person: Visit the Fulton County
 Board of Assessors Office at 235
 Peachtree Street, NE, Suite 1100, Atlanta, GA 30303 or the South Fulton Service Center at 5600 Stonewall Tell
 Road, College Park, GA 30349

© Colonial Pipeline Safety Information

The Colonial Pipeline passes through our community—Please make sure you are aware of the safety precautions required of all of us. Below are some of the more common questions from their website. If you can't find an answer to your question here, please see their website at: https://www.colpipe.com.

I'm planning to do a project that will require digging. How do I do this safely?

Colonial Pipeline and other pipeline and utility operators are part of the nationwide system called 811. 811 provides a uniform, national phone number to access local utility location services. Individuals should call this number before digging to protect themselves and others from unintentionally hitting underground utility lines. For homeowners, 811 should be used prior to starting common projects like landscaping, installing a fence or mailbox, building a deck, putting in a pond or patio, and other DIY projects that involve digging. Digging without knowing the approximate location of underground utilities may result in serious injuries, service disruptions, and costly repairs if oil, gas, electric, communications, or water and sewer lines are damaged. The nationwide service, 811, is free and can be accessed by phone or online in many states at www.call811.com.

I noticed something that I think could be hazardous taking place near the pipeline right-of-way. What should I do?

Colonial Pipeline relies on the help of its pipeline neighbors to help us identify potential concerns, such as digging, suspicious activity, or abnormal sights, odors, or sounds. If you are noticing anything out of the ordinary near the pipeline: call our 24/7 emergency number at 800 – 926-2728. *Immediately, call 911 if there is a risk to the safety of you or others.*

Georgia Primary Elections Postponed

Georgia's March 24 presidential primaries have been postponed until May because of fears over the new coronavirus.

In-person early voting, which began statewide March 2, will be halted and the election will be moved to May 19, when Georgia's other 2020 primary elections are being held. Early voting has been stopped and will resume on April 27th.



MEHOA 2020 Improvement Plans

In response to concerns and requests voiced at our neighborhood and annual meetings, the **Landscape Committee of MEHOA** began working diligently to provide an attractive landscape design for the common area of our neighborhood. Starting this month, a more attractive entrance design will be implemented using heat tolerant plants that add color and balance. Enhancing the visual appeal of the focal points is incorporated into the design. The updating of the entrance incorporated trimming of the Leyland Cypress trees branches that were growing through the fence and in some cases damaging the branches. The lighting for the entrance will also be repaired thereby enhancing the nighttime appearance and ambience. Trees and branches that contributed to the "blind curve at the left of the exit have been trimmed and, in some cases, removed.



The city arborist requires that we replace the trees that were removed with smaller healthy trees of the same species. This requirement only applies to those cypress that faced the main thoroughfare. Removal of some overgrown trees revealed the beautiful Magnolia Insignias on both ends of the fence. Shrubs that are growing underneath larger trees will be moved to allow them to get adequate sunlight and have room for growth. The overall design should allow for long term growth that remains attractive for years to come.

The gazebo needs repairs such as replacing rotting word and loose boards. The trees and shrubs have been trimmed to allow for a more visible enjoyment of the structure itself. The tree trimming around the gazebo is incomplete. These repairs on the gazebo will not happen immediately. Ultimately the plan is to repair the gazebo, power wash the structure, paint and install ceiling fans that will allow neighbors to enjoy it during the warm seasons.
