Sensory Bottles:

You can create these with anything you find at home

- Fill an empty water bottle (or Gatorade/juice/other plastic bottle) about one-third full with water
- Add a few drops of food coloring if you have it.
 Once the food coloring has spread throughout the water, fill the rest of the bottle with baby oil or cooking oil
- Can also fill the bottle with sand or dirt
- Place various items from home in the bottle (plastic animals, crayon pieces, rocks, leaves, glitter, little things you have around the house, etc.
- Make sure to seal the lid with glue so it doesn't open and spill
- Shake the bottle and watch your child explore!
- You can create different themes: water, seasons, colors, etc.

There are lots of different tutorial videos on YouTube as well.

Make Your Own Balance Beam:

You will need ribbon, tape, or rope

- Place the material on the ground in a long line
- Show your child how to walk along the line while balancing, placing one foot in front of the other
- Let them try it
- If they need help, suggest to them holding their arms out in a "T" shape to help balance
- If it's too hard, have them hop down the line with two feet
- If it's too easy, have them try to balance something like a book or pillow on their head while walking along the line
- If the kids are enjoying it- have them create an obstacle course around the house/apartment





Create your own letter/animal bingo

Materials Needed:

- Paper
- Pen, marker
- Small items to use to cover letters on Bingo card (Legos, blocks, buttons, etc.)
- Bowl

Directions:

For Preschool/School age:

- Draw a grid that is five rows across and five rows down
- Write a letter in each square (leave a "free" space in the middle square-see below)
- Write letters onto little pieces of paper. Put the letters in a bowl
- Pick a letter out of the bowl and call it out
- If your child has that letter on their card, they can cover it with a small item. Cover five in a line to win!
- As an extra challenge for children who are ready, have your child come up with a word for each letter you call out

For Toddlers:

 Use /draw pictures of animals instead of letters and make the animal sounds with your child

Make Your Own Roadway/Hiking Trail

Materials Needed:

- Cardboard (flattened box, poster board, etc.)
- Black marker
- Small balls
- Rolled up pair of socks
- Small cars, play people, small play animals if you have them

Directions:

- Make a roadway or hiking path out of a flattened box. Use a black marker to create a road with your child to use with small cars. If your child doesn't have small cars you can also make a hiking path to use with play people or small animals
- Let your child draw/imagine what they want for the roadway/hiking trail
- You could help them to create buildings, trees, picnic table, etc.
- Toddlers will have fun with a simple roadway to roll things on. Cars or small balls work
- You can try placing a rolled up pair of socks under the box to create an a ramp/hill to push things up and roll things down on



Matching Numbers: Sticky Notes

Materials Needed:

- Sticky notes or small pieces of paper+ tape
- Marker or pen


Directions:

For Preschool/School-age:

- Make three sets of sticky notes where each has a number 1 through 10
- Place one set on a wall, lined up in order
- Hide the other two sets around the house/apartment/room
- As a number is found, match it to the number on the wall and place it
- under as a match
- To increase the difficulty for children who are ready, hide all of the
- numbers. When two are found, add them together. As each number is
- found, add it to the total

For Toddlers:

• Toddlers love finding things. To do this activity with toddlers, hide one set of numbers and say the number aloud when it's found. Practice saying the numbers with your child
