
Episcopal Outreach Camp - July 28-31

Get to Know Bishop Gregg The Right Reverend William O. Gregg, Ph.D. VI Bishop of Eastern Oregon, *resigned* Bishop Assistant of North Carolina 2007 – 2014



Sarah Milholland asked me to write a bit so that you might know me a little better and gladly do so. I am delighted to be with you all during the Reverend Sarah's sabbatical.

So, briefly, I am the elder of two children raised in the Presbyterian Church in Portsmouth, VA. I was confirmed as a senior in high school before going off to a Baptist university, the University of Richmond. I went to seminary at the Episcopal Divinity School, then in Cambridge, MA from the Diocese of Virginia, where I was ordained Deacon and Priest. While I was in seminary, I took a year off (as did about ³/₄ of my class – long story...) and did an MA in medieval English at Boston College. What I loved about that was the literature and it was absolutely "useless". I still enjoy Beowulf, Sir Gawain and the Green Knight, and medieval lyrics.

Kathy and I met while I was at seminary through a friend of hers from her days at Boston College. Randy was a Jesuit doing his theology and we had classes together. Meeting Kathy is a funny story – but Sarah said not to go on and on.... In any case, we were married in Adams, MA on a Saturday in May, returned to Cambridge for seminary graduation on Thursday, went to Richmond, VA for ordination to the diaconate on Saturday, a Baptism on Sunday, and Kathy was back in her classroom on Monday. I went to Richmond to find us an apartment, we had our "Adventure in Moving" with U-Haul and moved to Sandston (outside Richmond) and began work July 1. We celebrated our 42nd anniversary this May.

After serving parishes in the Dioceses of Virginia and Southwestern Virginia, including time as a school chaplain and lower school teacher, Kathy and I took off to South Bend, IN for graduate school at Notre Dame. After 10 years in Indiana, as a grad student and professor of theology at St. Mary-of-the-Woods College in Terre Haute, we went to my last parish, St. James, New London, CT. From there I was elected the sixth Bishop of Eastern Oregon in 2000. While in Indiana, we adopted our son, Nathan. He and his son, Kristopher live in Utah.

In this diocese, I served as Bishop Assistant with responsibility especially for the Charlotte and Sand Hills Convocations. In this period I met Sarah+ and Peter, and St. Mark's. During our time in Charlotte, Kathy became very involved in her hobby of collecting antique dolls and in the doll and Toy museum in Spencer. Returning to this area has made it possible for her to reconnect with fellow hobby-ists and the museum.

I retired at the end of January 2014 and in April 2014 became the Rector of Iglesia San Pablo in San Miguel de Allende, México, where we lived until returning to North Carolina in the Spring of 2018. We really enjoyed living in San Miguel de Allende. San Pablo is a fine parish of mostly US and Canadian expats and some Méxicanos. The city is a wonderful place where we came to know and understand much about the Mexican people and their incredibly long and rich cultures. And our Spanish improved immensely.

We now very happily live at Trinity Oaks, a Lutheran Services of the Carolinas CCRC. We live in a cottage (1/2 a duplex), a beautiful neighborhood, and have wonderful friends.

LEGACY UPDATE

I am pleased to share that on Monday, June 17, the Standing Committee of the Diocese of North Carolina approved St. Mark's request to build a new fellowship hall on our campus. The committee's prayerful study of our request, which included a thorough review of our business plan and required us to explore and answer several questions we had not considered in developing it, validated for us — and for them — that this is, in-deed, where the Holy Spirit is calling St. Mark's to be as we seek to know Christ more deeply and make Him known more fully.

Once they approved our request, we immediately re-engaged our architect and contractors, and executed the commitment for our loan, which should close in the next month or so. In the meantime, we will begin pulling the necessary permits and ordering the materials, so that we can break ground as soon as is possible. Peter Macon, will continue to serve as project manager, with Vestry members and other parishioners pitching in as needed. Please let me, Peter or any Vestry member know if you have questions about the project and/or how we will proceed.

Thank you for your prayers of support through this process. It took longer than we anticipated, as things so often do. In the end, we are confident of God's blessing in this endeavor. In peace,


