
Larry Hill Running for Dept. First Vice Commander

Pittsburgh Tribune: VA care billed as priority in Legion leader's visit to Jeannette

Charles E. Schmidt, National Commander of the American Legion attended a dinner at Jeanette American Legion Post 344 on March 22, 2017. Members of the Jeannette American Legion Post 344 got a chance Wednesday night to meet their national president, the third time in recent history that the post has hosted the organization's top officer.

"Tonight is the final stop," National Commander Charles Schmidt said of the roughly 180 posts he has visited in the first half of his yearlong term. The tour included about eight posts throughout Pennsylvania.

Schmidt said his primary focus has been on the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, which Legion members helped bring into existence in 1921 as the U.S. Veterans Bureau.

"Now that the election is over and we have a new (VA) secretary, we want to make sure veterans get the care they've earned and have ready access to that care," Schmidt said.

Toward that end, Legion administrators conduct about a dozen visits to VA facilities each year, generating a report that is submitted to Congress.

"What health care system knows vets better than the VA?" Schmidt said. "It's been serving them since the 1920s. We believe it's a system worth saving." Schmidt said he has confidence that President Trump will make good on his campaign-season promises to veterans.

"I'm optimistic," he said. "He sounded very supportive as a candidate, and as a president, he seems like someone who, if he says something, he'll go to work and get it done."

On the campaign trail, Trump pledged to not only increase health care options for veterans but to establish a 24-hour White House hotline where complaints about the VA can be addressed quickly and effectively.

Schmidt, a 33-year Legion member and Air Force veteran of the Vietnam War, is looking at the organization's membership rolls. Since taking office, 39,000 new members have been recruited into the organization, about 90 percent of the target goal Schmidt hopes to reach by the end of May.

"We're always looking to get Iraq and Afghanistan vets the opportunity to find out what the American Legion does and what it can do for them," he said. Leonard Dulik, first vice commander at Post 344, said he was looking forward to hearing Schmidt's message to members at Wednesday's dinner.

"Anytime the national commander is coming to your post, it's a great event for the post and the community," Dulik said.

The Arctic Dew Line By Dale Nelson

It was late spring of 1955, and the cold war was going wide open. Russia had the "bomb," and the obvious direction of any attack on the US would be over the north pole. I was just out of boot camp, assigned as a deck ape on the USS Merrick, AKA 97. I reported aboard the Merrick at Long Beach, California, in May, and soon after that the ship was under way to Seattle, Washington to take on cargo, to be delivered to the arctic shores of Alaska and Canada. It was called Operation DEW Line, the Dew meaning Distant Early Warning, a string of radar stations across the top of Canada, to pick up on Russian bombers or missiles heading toward north America. I've been told it was a bigger deal than the Panama Canal, but nothing much was said about it, because it was the cold war after all, and even though the Russians probably knew everything they needed to know about DEW line, it wasn't reported on at the time. I know there were 60 ships in the convoy that left Seattle for the arctic, and an equal number heading west across the top of Canada, probably the last convoy of ships that large to be assembled in the history of the world.

The USS Merrick was an "Attack Cargo" ship. Even though she was armed with anti aircraft guns, her main battery was the 24 landing craft she carried, 8 of which were LCM's, or Landing Craft Mechanized, a boat 56 feet long, weighing 55 tons, with twin grey marine diesel engines, and twin screws and rudders. The LCM's were the boat that went with us to the Arctic, the smaller LCVP's were left in Seattle. The AKA was a ship design born during WWII, to take Marines and their cargo, trucks, jeeps, artillery etc. through the surf to the beach, and because there are no docks for ships to go alongside in the arctic, the LCM's were necessary to bring the cargo to the beach, at the site chosen for the radar station.

The entire operation took 66 days from Seattle and the return to Seattle. At the time, we were the largest ship to go around Alaska, and on into the Coronation Gulf of Canada, which, if you look at a map, the farthest east we made it was directly north of Great Slave Lake. We were towed through ice by the Coast Guard icebreaker Northwind going in, and coming out the ice was actually a little worse, and for a time there was talk like we were going to be stuck there for the winter. The Northwind would back off, make a run on the ice, and actually ride up on the flow, and the weight of the ship would break the ice and open a channel. Once back in the states, the ship had to go into dry dock at Hunters Point in San Francisco, and have the bronze screw replaced because it had been damaged very badly by the ice.
