Criterion-based vs Norm-referenced

According to Jenny Chan, Academic Consultant of Success for All, "In the new curriculum, students are given far more responsibility for their own learning. Learning is more concept-driven than content-driven, focusing on big ideas. Students are encouraged to ask key questions such as: Where am I in my learning? Where am I going next? What do I need to get there?"

The new curriculum also brought about changes to the method of assessment. The traditional report card with letter grades is now replaced with a formal written report card which include letter grades on a continuum and some comments to indicate the student's level of performance. The report is a collection of formative and summative classroom assessments.
