State News Updates

May 11, 2020

- Governor Cuomo held a press conference at 11:30 AM and announced the following:
 - Total hospitalizations at 7,226 on May 10.
 - Total deaths increased by 161 on May 10.
 - Reopening:
 - May 15: local officials in each region should start preparing.
 - Regions must meet seven metrics in order to reopen:
 - 14-day decline in hospitalizations OR under 15 new hospitalizations (3-day average).
 - 14-day decline in hospitalized deaths OR under 5 new (3-day average).
 - New hospitalizations under 2 per 100,000 residents (3-day rolling average).
 - Share of total beds available (threshold of 30%).
 - Share of ICU beds available (threshold of 30%).
 - 30 per 1,000 residents tested monthly (7-day average of new tests per day).
 - 30 contact tracers per 100,000 residents or to meet current infection rate.

- **Governor Cuomo held a press conference at 11:30 AM and announced the following (continued):**
 - Phased reopening of Businesses:
 - Phase 1: Construction, Manufacturing, Retail (curbside pickup), Agriculture, Forestry, and Fishing.
 - Phase 2: Professional services, Finance and Insurance, Retail, Administrative Support, Real Estate/Rental Leasing.
 - Phase 3: Restaurants/Food Services, Hotels/Accommodations.
 - Phase 4: Arts/Entertainment/Recreation, Education.
 - Utilize risk v. reward in order to determine which businesses reopen first:

Risk v. Reward Analysis		
	Greater Economic Impact	Lower Economic Impact
Lower Infection Risk	Industry greater economic impact, low risk of workplace or customer infection spread	Industry less economic impact, low risk of workplace or customer infection spread
Higher Infection Risk	Industry greater economic impact, higher risk or customer infection spread	Industry less economic impact, higher risk of workplace or customer infection spread

- Businesses need to put safety precautions in place.
- Retail Reopening Principles:
 - All retail will be authorized to do curbside pickup and drop-off or in-store pickup.
 - Essential retail will continue operating under the current protocols.
- Additional activities ready to reopen:
 - New York will also reopen statewide certain low-risk business and recreational activities as of May 15:
 - Landscaping and gardening.
 - Outdoor, low-risk recreational activities (i.e. tennis).
 - Drive-in movie theaters.
- Local officials need to ensure:
 - Testing/tracing in place.
 - Monitor infection rate with hospitals.
 - Ensure business compliance.
 - Communicate with other local governments.
 - Regional Control Room: Monitor progress and have a circuit breaker ready.

- [Assembly Republican Members of the Committees on Health, Aging and Oversight, Analysis and Investigation called for a legislative hearing on COVID-19 Pandemic's Impact on State Nursing Homes.](#)

May 10, 2020

- [Governor Cuomo issued Executive Order 202.30. Highlights include:](#)
 - Requiring nursing homes and all adult care facilities to test all personnel for COVID-19 twice per week pursuant to a plan developed by the facility administrator and filed with the Department of Health (DOH) by 5 PM on May 13.
 - Positive results shall be reported to DOH by 5 PM the day following receipt of such test result.
 - DOH or local health departments shall have unrestricted access to any nursing home or adult care facility where it is determined necessary for purposes of testing all personnel.
 - Requiring both the operator and the administrator of all nursing homes and adult care facilities to provide DOH with a certification of compliance with this Executive Order and directives of the Commissioner of Health.
 - The Commissioner of Health can suspend or revoke the operating certificate of any nursing home or adult care facility if it is determined such facility has not complied with this Executive Order or any regulations or directives issued by the Commissioner of Health.
 - Any nursing home or adult care facility which does not comply with the Executive Order shall be subject to penalty for non-compliance of \$2,000 per violation per day, and any subsequent violation shall be punishable by a penalty of \$10,000 per violation per day.
 - The Commissioner may appoint a receiver to continue the operations on 24 hours' notice to the current operator in order to preserve the life, health, and safety of the people of the State of New York.
 - Any false statement shall be punishable under section 210.45 of the Penal Code (Making a punishable false written statement, a class A misdemeanor).
 - Declaring any personnel of a nursing home or adult care facility refusing to be tested for COVID-19 shall be prohibited from providing services until such testing is performed.
 - Prohibiting general hospitals from discharging a patient to a nursing home, unless the nursing home operator or administrator first certified that is able to properly care for such patient.
 - Prohibiting general hospitals from discharging a patient to a nursing home without first obtaining a negative COVID-19 diagnostic test.
