



# "Doc Talk" column

live in there. Almost every part of you is teeming with "bugs" - mostly bacteria, but also viruses, funguses, parasites, etc. Collectively, it is known as your microbiome. There's a lot known about it and it is one of the hottest areas of current research.

Each area of your body has a different microbiome than other areas. It is most concentrated in your colon; there are trillions of microbes in your colon, a lot more than any other part of your body. Your mouth, nose, ears, skin, airways, etc. all have different populations. Some of them are harmless in their proper place,

but in another area of our body can cause illness. Some are merely innocent bystanders, and with: some can cause illness.

The most important some of these microbes; our health is dependent

on their health. We need them to breakdown some components of our food into nutrients that we could not absorb otherwise. The bugs also need us to eat things that they need (this is one of the reasons we need to eat prebiotics).

Our microbiome needs to be healthy in order for us to be healthy. A healthy microbiome needs to be in balance: the right proportion of the right species in the right places in the right amount. One of the simplest ways to understand how the balance can be upset is to consider the effect of talking antibiotic medication. The antibiotic is not selective, it kills any organism that is susceptible to it - it can certainly disrupt the natural order of things, and sometimes rebalancing takes a long, long time. Antibiotics can be wonderful magic for some conditions, but there's always side effects.

Influences on our microbiome are many - the list is long, and research continues to make it longer. The food we eat is one of the most important influences. The old adage "you are what you eat" is absolute truth.

In general, a microbiomesupporting diet would be: - whole foods rather than prepared packaged, produced-in-afactory foods.

 a wide variety of vegetables and fruits, with attention to "eating the rainbow", i.e., eating a variety of colors.

> - modest amount of animal protein, cooked in a healthy manner.

- plenty of healthy fats (cultured cheese, extra-virgin olive oil, oily fish, etc.); do an internet search about "healthy fats". - minimal intake of "highglycemic" foods - this means less of

the simple, refined carbohydrates, like white flour, sugar, etc., especially the additive, high fructose corn syrup.

Multiple medications have adverse effect on our resident microbes, as well. In addition to antibiotics, notable in this list are the meds for heartburn and reflux (see my past column in The Village Magazine about this topic). Anti-inflammatory drugs are not much of a problem for your gut health when used occasionally, but when taken frequently, long-term,



their effects can be quite adverse. Quality of sleep and quality of exercise also have profound effects on our microbiome. As you can see, there are numerous ways that our gut system can get unbalanced; I have mentioned only a few.

Helping to restore gut balance can be assisted by taking in beneficial bacteria to compete with the unwanted ones. Taking commercially prepared probiotics is only one of the possibilities.

We are well advised to include fermented foods in our diet, frequently. They are a rich source of many different probiotic bacteria. Fermented foods are numerous. In past years, they were more often a part of the average diet, as fermentation was often a way to preserve foods. These foods include: several different kinds of fermented vegetables, including sauerkraut, and also kefir, yogurt, kombucha, some cheeses, etc. (There are many others and the interested reader is advised to search the internet for more information about fermented foods.)

The fermented foods contain probiotic organisms; the



commercially available probiotic products often contain the same organisms. Packaged probiotics are big business in our current days, and the buyer needs to understand what's in the market to make good choices. "Caveat emptor". As with any other over-the-counter product, it is best to know the manufacturer. This is mostly impossible without the help of independent testing companies. One that I recommend is consumerlab.com

To be more specific about which type or which brand to choose would require knowledge of your individual circumstances. The Consumer lab webpage has some good general To get personal advice, discuss it with a trusted medical advisor or see a Functional Medicine practitioner.

Probiotics can be very helpful in maintaining health, and thereby, general health. It's important to provide a variety of microbes your Eating a variety of fermented foods can provide the variety.

If you are using commercial probiotics, change products periodically.

Let me say a word about PR Ebiotics. These are basically fibrous matter (long-chain polysaccharides) that our inherent digestive processes cannot break down - plant based complex sugars that promote the growth of probiotic bacteria in our gut. The value of prebiotics is that they are food for the beneficial bacteria residing in our colon. These bugs need to be fed, and we want them to be "happy" and healthy to effectively compete with the enemy germs. I'm sure you've been admonished many times to eat plenty of fiber - I still can hear those words from my grandmother. With adequate vegetable and fruit intake, you'll likely get enough prebiotics. Some recommendations: Wash them

and eat all the edible skins, such as apples, carrots, beets, potatoes. Eat plenty of leafy veggies, onions, garlic, nuts and seeds, and do an internet search for prebiotics - find things you like. Choose locally grown, seasonal, organic whenever possible. Much of the chemical contamination is damaging to your beneficial bacteria.

The microbiome in our gut is highly influential in our general health, including our mental health and balance. It is a living garden of microbes, and like any productive garden, it needs to be tended. We can't simply ignore it, or the "weeds" will take over.

A word of caution. If any of these recommendations are a big change for you, change your daily practices gradually. If you have to consider any disease or illness condition you may have, please see your medical provider before making changes.

# Historic Civil War Era Home Purchased, Restored & Renovated by Mike D'Amico of Mike's American Diner and All-Day Breakfast

Local restaurateur Mike D'Amico, owner of Mike's American Diner in Arundel and All-Day Breakfast in Kennebunk is the proud new owner of a civil war era home on historic Summer Street in Kennebunk- 36 Summer Street to be exact.

"As a kid I came to southern Maine every Summer, and in 1999 bought my first home here. At that time, I always admired the beautiful homes on Summer Street and thought to myself, 'I would love to buy one of those someday' and 20 years later I did," D'Amico said.

According to records from The Brick Store Museum, the Italianate mansion on Summer Street was built in 1862 by Captain Moses Maling. It is three bays wide, with a hipped roof, topped by a balustrade. It has twin interior chimneys, with a full entablature; (Entablatures are major elements of classical architecture, and are commonly divided into the architrave (the supporting member immediately above; equivalent to the lintel in post and lintel construction), under the eaves). The windows also have entablatures. "All doors and windows are original and very well preserved. The home still has an intact original stove from Chilson in Boston from 1858. It was only one of two made and the only one existing in the United States today. It remains in the same place it was put when the house was built," D'Amico said.

At the time of the purchase, the stately home needed many renovations. D'Amico started by repairing the interior walls and ceilings and having Sally Curtis and her son Corey paint them all. He updated the electrical and plumbing and replaced all appliances with the help of Ben Tedesco of Appliance Advantage. New flooring was installed, and the basement granite was sealed, painted and replaced throughout as needed. Richard G. Roy did the chimney work, "I also updated the fireplaces and added gas to the fireplaces as well. The home has beautiful original marble fireplaces on both floors."

He continued, "The entry stairs, pillars, and railing have all been replaced and brought back to how

they looked in the 1800's, Gary Martin, of Kennebunkport, who is known for historic renovations did the outside work and the carriage house. When working on a home like this, you cannot just purchase replacement molding it has to be made by hand, just like it was done in the 1800's. Gary and his crew did an outstanding job."

The grand task of turning the existing carriage house into a

mini -ballroom required repairing and replacing all of the outdoor porches landings and decks, like everything else concerning this restoration/renovation was done with great care and attention to detail. D'Amico said "I have also furnished the home with some period furniture, including an 1850's dining table and antique Steinway piano."

The exterior of the house was painted "Historic Quincy Granite", which D'Amico said is a color most close to the original shade.

D'Amico said some of the unique

In November of this year, D'Amico held a spectacular catered open house with live music for friends, family and contractors to see the completed project.



Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. is a 501c(3) charity located in East Taunton, MA whose mission is to provide bullet and stab protective vests and other assistance to dogs of law enforcement and related agencies throughout the United States. The non-profit was established in 2009 to assist law enforcement agencies with this potentially lifesaving body armor for their four-legged K9 officers. Since its inception, Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. provided over 3,500 U.S. made,



custom fitted, NIJ certified protective vests in 50 states, through private and corporate donations, at a value of \$6.9 million dollars.

The program is open to dogs actively employed in the U.S. with law enforcement or related agencies who are certified and at least 20 months of age. New K9 graduates, as well as K9s with expired vests, are eligible to participate.

The donation to provide one protective vest for a law enforcement K9 is \$950.00. Each

vest has a value between \$1,744 – \$2,283, and a five-year warranty and an average weight of 4-5 lbs. There is an estimated 30,000 law enforcement K9s throughout the United States.





# RECYCLING OPPORTUNITIES One Person's Trash is Another's Treasure

Remember when your mother or grandmother would carefully fold each sheet of gift paper after a present was opened and then roll the ribbon, as well, all for the next year's holiday season. Wrapping paper is recyclable by some recycling agents, even if it has gold or silver decorations, but not if it is cellophane or mylar. For others, the test is to crumple the paper into a ball, and if it stays crumpled, then it can be recycled. In a way, this exemplifies the complexity of recycling. Things keep changing based on what recycling centers can sell to those

who reprocess the commodity. The "reduce, reuse, recycle mantra" needs to be heavier on reducing and reusing than on the recycling, given the fluctuation of current recycling's potential markets.

And peace in our lives? A number of us have been following the advice of Marie Kondo by removing the dust-gathering and unnecessary items from our shelves and closets, and, hence, removing those complications from our lives. Kondo advocates retaining non essentials only if they give us joy. This article will help you find alternative ways to reduce and recycle any joyless things in your life. Though ethical removal can require some thoughtfulness, the removal can also have the unforeseen benefit of giving a bit of joy to others with less. And alternative ways of doing so may also reduce the waste that ramps up the expense in our blue and purple bags and/or in town trash taxes.

#### Clothes and Cloth:

I walked into Lower Village's Return to Cinda's to find out how she donated the gently used clothing she hadn't sold in three months. From her sales, 50% goes to her business and 50% to the client, who also gets the choice of whether or not to donate an item if it hasn't sold. Cinda was out, but Jen was there to answer my questions. "She gives to a variety of charities, but you should hear about the shoes for African children."



Apparently, Cinda donated a huge amount of charity bound denim to the Baptist Church in Springvale, and they made children's shoes out of the denim, with soles from milk jug plastic, all bound for Africa. Consignment and charity stores can Continue to page 18

be creative in the way they support others.

Consignment stores and their like in the Kennebunks vary in charitable giving (you can ask at Melissa's Mighty Finds, Cargo Shop Thrift Store, Fresh Start Consignment Store, Outta the Box Thrift Store, and St. David's Budget Store). Indeed, the Kennebunk Care Closet collects clothes for newly arrived immigrants and others in need. They can be dropped off at, Holy Cross Church, the Kennebunk Chamber of Commerce, and River Tree Arts.

One of my favorite ways to recycle both clothing and house overflow is Fabulous Find in Kittery. Each month they collect slightly used (and often posh) clothing and household items, and they supply three different NGO's monthly with their proceeds. In October, almost \$10,000 went to



each of three non-profits. Anything I haven't worn in a year becomes someone else's treasure, and when I buy something that someone else hasn't used in a year, I'm also giving to a group that does good works. I go away feeling great!

Goodwill takes all fabric and

clothing. They are particularly ethical in recycling material that is too worn for reuse including bedding, slipcovers, curtains, fabric odds and ends, and fabric clothing.

Perhaps the most alarming fact to me is that a portion of all those microfibers we have relished in warm fleeces, microfiber cleaning cloths, and soft plush blankets, are now swimming around in washing machine run-off water, and hence in fish, and recently discovered in our very own blood streams (google microfiber pollution). The times they are a changing. Ethically, we probably need to return to natural fibers of cotton, wool, and linen, or use washing machine filters, or put microfiber items in something called "guppybags" that gather those fibers before they escape (https:// en.guppyfriend.com/).

#### Plastics:

Microfibers are actually plastics, and plastics are the most confusing things to recycle these days. Right now, Casella empties the recycling bins at our roadside, and Eco

Maine takes recycling from the transfer station for Kennebunk and Kennebunkport payees. And even Casella and Eco Maine disagree about things. So the best we can do is to reuse as much as possible and then recycle according to their guidelines, hoping that they can figure out what is best, given their markets.

Triangle numbered 2's, made



with High Density Polyethylene, are deemed the safest and the most commonly and usefully recycled. That category includes milk jugs, detergent jugs, and oil containers.

High Density Polyethylene is reused for picnic tables, plastic lumber, waste bins, park benches, even raised garden beds because this plastic does not break down under exposure to sunlight and high temperatures, hence safest for secondary use. The other numbered plastics are more complicated, and, again, reducing what we acquire and reusing what we do makes more than recycling. sense

Again, different recycling recipients are apt to give different directions. The Town of Kennebunk is in the process of developing new directions for Casella's pick up bins. Eco Maine does accept recycling numbers 1-7. Nevertheless, we have to think before putting things in the recycle bin

allowed to do so. Eco Maine notes that recycling is a sustainable waste management solution if reducing and reusing aren't possible.

Using your trusty fabric shopping bag over and over reduces both paper and plastic use. For those unlucky enough to have a plethora of prescription pill bottles, those can be cleaned and sent in bulk to be used again. See info@earthub. They also recycle mascara brushes, of all things (!) for bird rescue and grooming!

Mail It Unlimited has said that they would be glad for you to drop off clean and used bubble wrap and Styrofoam peanuts (207-985-2160). Of course, kids might beat you to your trip to Mail it Unlimited. My grandchildren, and even one of my past dogs, have enjoyed stomping on them. A third use for bubble wrap has given some travelers a good

#### It's an enormous task to take on the cardboard recycling for the entire Town of Kennebunkport.

When the Town discontinued its curbside recycling program. It was a devastation to the residents and community of Kennebunkport, At a Board of Selectmen's meeting last spring, the Town of Kennebunkport had decided to suspend its recycling program as it searched for more cost effective solutions. Town Manager Laurie Smith said the move would be temporary, while a new Recycling Committee and town officials would work to come up with a new recycling program.

At Bradbury Brothers Market, we took on the challenge, mostly because the cardboard crusher program has been here since we arrived in 2015. It was a maintainable situation before recycling stopped. but since then, it has become a never ending battle

to keep it empty, clean and safe for our staff to use. Cardboard is left on the stairs, the dock, the deck, and sometimes anywhere outside the building.

As the seasons changed, and winter brought lice and snow, the challenge to keep the stairs, dock and the deck clear and safe at all times became another issue. We cannot staff a person to shovel, salt and crush cardboard all day, especially at this time of year. The stairs and dock belong to Bradbury's, while the stairs and the deck belong to the Town.

Who becomes responsible should something hap-

We have decided to move forward and ask the Town to take out and relocate the crusher. Not having talked with the Town, we are not sure what their plan for the crusher might be at this time. Hopefully, they are on their way to a solution to bring recycling back for all



Apparently Best Buy will take all packaging with them when they deliver and set up new equipment, recycling what they can. It would be wonderful if we could ask all delivery vehicles to do just that. Then again, what if we just left all stores, leaving packaging behind, toting out our handy tote bags with the goods? A rebellious action, but perhaps an action that would have more businesses working with producers to reduce packaging.

#### Household, Furniture, and Metal Items:

Both household items and furniture are desperately needed by immigrants who are trying to navigate in a strange country. Right now WIONN (Welcoming Immigrants Our New Neighbors) is looking for working vacuum cleaners, top loading washers, dryers, air conditioners, bedding in good condition, and sewing machines.

Re-Store collected 1270 tons of reusable furniture, tools, hardware, appliances, light fixtures, plumbing materials, doors, and windows last year and kept that weight out of landfills. With the resale of these items, they have weatherized 32 homes in 2019. The profits go to Habitat for Humanity who have also built 30 homes in York County with volunteer builders and with the sweat equity from the families who were to live in them.)

The Kennebunk Transfer Station will take metal without a charge, but Arundel's AC Metal Recycling will haul away all metals except aluminum and pay you a fair price. Call 207-831-0767 for information and pick up. They also take appliances but, as with the Transfer Station, those that have Freon (refrigerators and air conditioners) require a fee. Clean kitchen aluminum can be gathered in a ball and recycled.

Forty years ago, in the time of the Kennebunkport Dump Parade and Dump Art Contests, we used to be able to go dump picking. Those



times are gone, but now several local communities have places where you can find what others don't want. For instance, The Treasure Chest is volunteer-run at the Kennebunk Transfer Station from 8:00-2:00 on Friday and Saturdays. In August, I scored a beautiful bird feeder that was there at the same time as I dropped off my grandchildren's used boogie boards since they had graduated to surfboards. The boards were snatched up before I could leave with my bird feeder.

#### Paper

Paper and cardboard products can still be recycled in the Kennebunk recycle bins but the paper must be clean and dry. Casella is currently holding on to huge amounts of paper products, hoping that the market will open up for resale and reuse in the future. Products with the thin film of plastics (for instance paper coffee cups, milk cartons, and processed food cartons), however, are not good for reuse. Good news: those sleeves to protect your hands from hot paper coffee cups are totally recyclable, but better yet reusable. The Kennebunk Transfer Station will allow local residents from Kennebunkport to pay for what Kennebunk residents put in their recycle bins for free. The cost starts at \$5 for an 18 gallon container of paper and other recyclables.

Shredded documents and small bits of paper slip through the machinery at recycling plants, but the good news is that they can be composted. And



if that isn't an option, you can put them in a paper bag and add them to recycling. And (this is something that surprised me) thermal cash register receipts from stores contain paper, yes, but they also contain BPA, a cancer causing chemical which is reprocessed with other paper pulp, contaminating recycled paper products. I guess it is into the trash with those, and wash your hands after. Emailed receipts may have a growing and healthy place in our future.

Local libraries are happy to take fiction and non-fiction books that are like new for their book sales. Each library has specific requirements and

times for delivery, and woe be it to anyone who leaves a big box of moldy books outside the library doors! For the library's requirements see their websites about donations. Emailed reminders for overdue books are also available at the Kennebunk Free Library as well, so the other paper slips can be avoided.

#### Electronics

Electronics are accepted at a cost by the Kennebunk Transfer Station, but if you are simply upgrading working equipment, it's good to find someone who can reuse what you no longer need. Those in poorer nations are so excited to be given what might

be an outdated cell phone or laptop. I took my old flip top cellphone to Namibia with me and was glad to see the gratefulness that matched mine own when I gave it to a man who had repaired our third blown out tire.



# Another Facet of BlixxHorses: Education

#### Column exclusive: w

When you think of horses, rarely does education come to mind. Instead horses are synonymous with riding lessons or sports like racing and the images they project. Interestingly, it's due to the lack of education and instruction that avoidable mistakes are made often placing horses on the market once again.

There are many examples of decisions based on misinformation. Often knowledge lacking is very basic but could make a huge difference in how a horse is treated. It's not unusual for people not to know how long a horse can live, the time involved, costs and what level of work and lifestyle change is involved for a horse to be in good care.

Horses have been used as mounts forever so it's no surprise most people are not aware of research showing that their back's were not designed to carry weight, regardless of size. This knowledge can help riders avoid injury and make their horses more comfortable by understanding subtle cues horses give when in pain. Unfortunately without accurate information behaviors are instead defined as 'naughty' and can be missed even by experienced equestrians when seated on top of a horse.

Horses are complex animals, known to be prey but often people don't understand how that affects behavior and needs. Prey animals are stoic. This calming energy serves them by keeping them safe from predators-- and also makes then vulnerable to overuse and mistreatment.

Keeping a horse in good care requires knowledge in innumerable subjects. Their digestive systems function best by eating small amounts regularly. Though being overweight causes problems, years of research shows beyond a doubt horses need forage available almost around the clock for health and mental stimulation. Still it's not unusual for horses not to have hay to eat from 6 pm until the next morning. Often it's to save on costs.

Another problem lies in myths that are passed down through generations. One is that the natural response of startling or 'spooking' does happen with not breeds certain or is absent with individual horses.

Again, published studies show that is not true, and that any horses can react to a threat. Unless a horse is

monitored 24/7 there is no way to know that a 'bombproof' horses does not react. Behavior has more to do with individual characteristics than breed Individual personalities are shaped by genes.

social Horses are creatures and being alone can be difficult. Sometimes it's a lack of awareness of the need for interaction and stimulation that leads to keeping horses alone. Not only do they need companionship from another horse but from people. Lack of basic needs being met can lead to behavioral problems that possibly could be improved simply through attention. Sometimes horses are alone because they have been rescued or their companion has died, but it may not be fair to a horse to be placed in that situation simply for convenience. If the horse is resold, social skills may be absent setting the horse up for future

> or experience and instead hurt or confuse the horse. While there is a host of professionals in the industry who work regularly with horses and have a deeper understanding, it's important to discriminate to find a source with expertise in a specific area, particularly behavior.

Even professionals however may lack the knowledge and experience that horses owners have with their horses, making the owner valuable in aiding in the care of an individual horse. If the focus is constantly on equestrian endeavors and a multitude of horses are handled, there is less time for individual attention needed to understand a horse where behavior could be affecting the riding experience. Organizations including 4H and Pony Club have value but also focus on riding & competing and often

participants adopt a philosophy which makes riding the priority. The basics of learning and behavior are skipped to allow more time in the saddle. It's vital to know what practices children are learning.

There is a growing population of 1st time horse owners in their 40's and 50's who often choose not to ride but acquire horses that have changed many hands. Some owners have little knowledge and are often dealing with a confused or one suffering silently. It's impossible with life's constraints to quickly learn what you need to know overnight and do it right.

There are a multitude of resources for horse owners who want to raise the bar and learn but there can be confusion. Riding lessons are just that- the horses have no choices and have bits in their mouths as a reminder not to complain. It's not a vehicle for learning and can lead to unrealistic expectations. When you acquire a horse it's best to do it for them, not for one's own welfare and interest. It should be a selfless act in order to benefit the horse and to remember that horses are not machines or toys to take out and put away.

"The Period of PURPLE Crying is a new way to help parents understand this time in their baby's life, which is a normal part of every infant's development. When the baby is given medication to treat symptoms of colic, it reinforces the idea that there is something wrong with the baby, when in fact, the baby is going through a very normal developmental

# Cape Porpoise Harbor Dredging Update

As of the first week in January 2020, much of the harbor dredging project in Cape Porpoise has been worked on, dredge depths have been reached, and a channel dug throughout the harbor.

The dredging began in December of 2019 and consisted of dredging a depth of 10 feet in the anchorage and 6 feet up from the Town pier towards the inner harbor, also known as 'the ditch'. Work was done around the clock, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week throughout the month. The project was expected be completed by the end of December 2019.

Cape Porpoise Harbor Master Chris

Mayo said, "The Army Corp of Engineers completed their final survey just before Christmas and found numerous areas of the project not dug to appropriate depths; meaning the contractor must return to fulfill the federal contract."

The Army Corp of Engineers contracted Coastline Consulting Group, who sub-contracted the project to Patriot Marine Construction.

Mayo said "Patriot Marine will be returning to finish the project. The latest information provided by the Army Corp of Engineers states that Patriot Marine will be returning (weather permitting) on the 16th or 17th of January." No completion date has been determined. Mayo noted "At this point I will not speculate on completion of the project, but we are all hoping for a quick and timely completion to allow the harbor to resume normal operations and occupancy."






