<u>Mission</u>: The Community Dinner Committee provides enjoyable, well balanced meals in a community setting to assist in meeting needs for good nutrition and/or companionship amongst our neighbors.

The committee plans, shops, prepares and serves a monthly dinner at the Meredith Community Center usually on 4th Wednesday of the month. We serve between 42-60 guests a month. Our guests donate approximately \$55 a month which goes towards future dinners.

The committee is very fortunate to have two rooms with tables and chairs made available to us by the Meredith Community Center. They allow us space in a closet for storage, half of their refrigerator and half of their freezer. The Center has an institutional size kitchen with a gas stove, a convection oven and most importantly...a dishwasher.

The majority of the dinners are served on dishware not paper. The committee follows a detailed work plan and task list that is used for onsite setup and cleanup. We try to vary the menu, from pork roast to casseroles, a hot dog summer meal, and a cold salad meal in August.

We are very grateful for the club members who volunteer to help. Each month is a wonderful display of team effort, hard work and always a lot of fun...especially hearing our guests say: "*Thank you. That was a wonderful meal.*"

WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN PROGRAM

<u>The Altrusa Literacy</u> Committee continues to partner with the local WIC program -a federally funded program providing nutritional help and education for:

- pregnant women
- breastfeeding women up to 12 months after the infant's birth
- non-breastfeeding women up to 6 months after the infant's birth
- infants and children up to their 5th birthday

Our Literacy Committee provides age appropriate books for the children and educational resources as well as light reading books for the mothers each month. As you can see from the photos, we also provide handouts that address "Tips for Reading to Your Children" each month. *Literacy* has been involved with this program for the past 8 to 9 years. We also offer the same types of books on the 4thWednesday in January, April, July and October (only) for WIC families in the town of Ashland. Our members are always on the lookout for good "board books" for the very young children and appropriate books for those up to age 5...as well as books of interest and help for young mothers.

Our local *Friends of the Library* volunteers have been very supportive by culling out books donated to the Library they feel could be used for our program as well. Our members take turns each month setting up the books, poster and signage at 8:30 the morning of the WIC visit...returning at 2:30 to break it down and take leftover books back to be replenished for the next month. It certainly has become a community effort!




ALTRUSA HOT DOG SALE AT MILLS FALLS MARKETPLACE 2019

RECIPE CORNER

BAGLEY FAMILY IRISH BREAD

Ingredients:

 $2\frac{1}{2}$ cups of flour

 $^{1}\!/_{\!\!4}$ cup of solid shortening.....I use butter

1 cup raisins...soak in small amount of OJ to plump the raisins

1/2 teaspoon of baking soda

1 ¹/₂ cup sour cream

1 teaspoon salt ... if using regular butter, I skip this salt because its already in the butter

1 egg beaten

2 teaspoons of baking powder....make sure it's fresh...baking powder helps the bread to rise and therefore the container should be replaced once a year.

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar

Directions:

Pre-heat oven to 375 degrees...if your over runs hot, turn it down to 350

Soak the raisins in small amount of orange juice

Dry Ingredients:

Blend flour, baking soda and baking powder well with a fork

Drain raisins and add them to the dry ingredients

Wet Ingredients:

Cream butter and sugar until well blended

Add the beaten egg and sour cream

Incorporate the wet ingredients into the flour mixture using a large spoon. Looks like a mess at first but it will come together. Do **NOT** over work the dough

Place in a 1 1/2 quart greased casserole pan or large pie plate

Bake 375 or 350 degrees for 50 minutes...cover with aluminum foil and back for an additional 10 to 12 minutes. Enjoy!

AMERICAN RED CROSS BLOOD DRIVE


Every two seconds, someone in the United States needs blood. Donations help with accident and burn victims, heart surgery, organ transplant patients and those battling cancer. Many of us probably know someone who has benefited by receiving this gift so it was only fitting that on August 8, 2018, **Altrusa International of Meredith** stepped up to sponsor an American Red Cross Blood Drive from 12:30 pm to 6 pm at St. Charles Borromeo Church in Meredith. Members volunteered for poster distribution in Meredith, Center Harbor, Holderness and Moultonborough. Others volunteered to distribute PDF copies of the Red Cross posters to friends and organizations via email. Those who could not distribute posters volunteered to bake for the event and our Communications Committee worked diligently with Meredith Village Savings Bank and WMUR to post the event on the bank's digital sign on Route 25 and to have the event announced on WMUR TV. 

BOOK REVIEW by VICKIE CARTY

<u>WHERE THE CRAWDADS SING</u>, best-selling book by American author and zoologist Delia Owens, is a remarkable first novel. Set in the 1950's North Carolina marshlands, the protagonist Kya Clark is abandoned as a young girl by her entire family and raises herself in an isolated shack. Kya must forage her surroundings to survive, pawing through mud for mussels to sell to put food on her table. She becomes known by the locals as "the Marsh Girl."

Protected by the desolate yet lush landscape, Kya immerses the reader in her natural world, one filled with dragonflies, fireflies, egrets, cicadas, bird feathers and seashells. We see and feel the "sun, as a warm blanket," the "slate-colored waves" of North Carolina's coast, and picture the palmettos, the cattail lagoons, and the oak forest that shelter Kya from the world.

But, as Kya matures into a beautiful, young woman, two men, one good, one bad, become intrigued with rumors of "the Marsh Girl" and vie for her affection. Kya begins to trust and dares to love. This leads to a mysterious death and to Kya's jailing and trial for murder.

Because of the novel's popularity, a film version is being considered. The author herself has written its possible tagline: "A nature-immersed mystery and love story with an ending that you'll never guess, and never, ever forget."

I, for one, whole-heartedly recommend this book. It is rife with magnificent, metaphoric prose. It's a book you will want to keep on the shelves of your own personal library.
