# SAFEGUARDING POLICY

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1. Applicability

This policy applies to all staff, including senior managers and their board of trustees, paid staff, volunteers, work experience students and anyone working on behalf of Haywill Animal Rescue and Therapy Centre (thereafter: Haywill)

## 2. Purpose of this policy

To protect children and young people who receive Haywill's services, including the children of adults who use our services.

To provide staff and volunteers with the overarching principles that guide our approach to safeguarding and child protection;

Haywill believes that a child or young person should never experience abuse of any kind. We have a responsibility to promote the welfare of all children and young people and to keep them safe. We are committed to practice in a way that protects them.

#### 3. Legal Framework

This policy has been drawn up on the basis of law and guidance that seeks to protect children namely:

#### 4. We recognise that

- The welfare of the child is paramount, as written in the Children Act 1989
- All children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have a right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- Some children are additionally vulnerable because of the impact of previous experiences, their level of dependency, communication needs or other issues.
- Working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare
- We will seek to keep children and young people safe by
  - Valuing them, listening to and respecting them
  - Appointing a Designated Safeguarding Office (DSO) for children and young people, a deputy and board member for safeguarding
  - Adopting child protection and safeguarding practices through procedures and a code of conduct for staff and volunteers

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- Developing and implementing an effective e-safety policy and related procedures
- Providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support, training and quality assurance measures
- Recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- Recording and storing information professionally and securely and sharing information about safeguarding and good practice with children, their families, staff and volunteers in one-on-one discussions
- Using safeguarding procedures to share concerns and relevant information with agencies who need to know, and involving children, young people, parents, families and carers appropriately
- Using our procedures to manage any allegations against staff and volunteers appropriately
- Creating and maintaining an anti-bullying environment and ensuring that we have a policy and procedure to help us deal effectively with any bullying that does arise
- Ensuring that we effective complaints and whistle blowing measures in place
- Ensuring that we provide a safe physical environment for our children, young people and vulnerable adults, staff and volunteers, by applying health and safety measures in accordance with the law and regulatory guidance
