The parishioner and visitor book will be open in the porch for people to write in about their interaction with St Patrick's and their memories. We have not yet managed to capture everyone's thoughts and memories. We are keen to include current parishioners so that those who work on the Centenary celebrations will hear our voices loud and clear!

Irene is working on a revised St Patrick's 50th photo book to be kept in the porch. An extra copy will be donated to Don Young's family. Don's scrap book was so useful in putting together the early story of St Patrick's.

History of St Patrick's (continued from last newsletter)

In 1992 Fr Steen arrived and the church's well-oiled wheels kept working. We had lots of services, active committees and individuals looking after parish life. There was, however, a sad and significant loss of parishioners to other churches or none - this attrition may have been encroaching secularisation coupled with leadership deficiencies which I won't comment on here! In 2002, following the retirement of Fr Steen, St Patrick's was placed under the umbrella of Our Lady of Lourdes and St Patrick's parish. Fr Charles allowed St Patrick's to run itself to the extent that it always had. The majority of his duties were in Rottingdean where the church office, sacramental preparation, daily Mass and other activities were all centralised. We had no resident priest in Woodingdean so the presbytery became available to rent. Parishioners completely refurbished the house and re-planted the then minimal rose garden. In 2003, Fr Graham was warmly welcomed too. He accepted (not with delight) the Bishop's desire to have Sunday Mass at St Patrick's – rather than Saturday evening Mass. A new St Patrick's committee was set up and it has worked together in harmony and with dynamism to keep St Patrick's (STP) a highly active part of the OLOL and STP parish family. In fact we are an essential part, as we provide monthly income to OLOL. In times when we had married priests, St Patrick's paid a second sum of money monthly towards the priest's stipend. As St Patrick's income from one Mass per week and the rent from the presbytery were not sufficient to cover our outgoings we had to be more active in income generation. In 2009 the chairs purchased by Fr Jeff were replaced by stacking chairs. We could then hire the church space for other activities. We even put ourselves about a bit by providing the venue for the Brighton festival artists open house in 2012 and 2013. Great combined effort produced an extremely impressive show. We also joined Facebook and Twitter.

Fr Benny O'Shea has been with us since 2018 and during our Celebration Mass Bishop Moth congratulated Fr Benny and the community for "punching well above their weight" - a testament to all the faith, commitment and sheer hard work of the people who have made and still make St Patricks a community of service (ed)

Building works at St Patrick's and the rented house

We are pleased to have JD Building Specialists repointing the perimeter wall on Broad Green (please notice) and the gable end wall of 119 Cowley Drive. The soffits and fascia boards are being replaced on 119 Cowley Drive. The parish bank account will be the poorer soon! Work started on Monday 3rd Feb and will take over 2 weeks to complete. The St Patrick's committee, especially John Duplain and Jane Moore, are overseeing. As the work began, the builder contacted John urgently to explain that they had found a problem with the roof which requires immediate attention. Fast track authorisation has been sought and granted for the roof to be replaced along with the other works.
