Arthur A. Teixeira is professor of agricultural and biological engineering and affiliate professor of food science and human nutrition at the University of Florida, where he teaches courses in Physical Properties of Biological Materials, and Food and Bioprocess Engineering Unit Operations.

His research interests include engineering design of food preservation and sterilization processing systems; and mathematical modeling for computer simulation, optimization, and control of food and bioprocess operations. Much of this research has led to the modern process design and control systems used in today's food canning

industry. These systems have resulted in increased safety assurance of sterilized canned foods to the public with optimum quality at lower cost, and with improved efficiency. He has been an invited lecturer and conference speaker internationally, including England, France, Belgium, Germany, Portugal,

Duclos recognized as expert in ship building

For more than 50 years, George R. Duclos has been quietly designing, assembling and marketing world-class ships. Today, his company, Gladding-Hearn Shipbuilding is renown for its delivery of high-speed ferryboats, passenger catamarans, fire and tug boats. He is currently chairman and chief executive officer of Duclos Corp. The Duclos family is owner of Gladding-Hearn shipbuilding in Somerset.

Born in Fall River, he was educated in city schools, and started his own boat repair business in 1948, at age 14. Duclos is a B.M.C. Durfee graduate of the class of 1952. At 22, he became partner of the new shipyard, Gladding-Hearn Shipbuilding.

The Durfee Bells: History in the Groundbreaking

On Thursday, November 16th, after five years of hard work and hope-filled expectations, the Durfee Bells Preservation Society made history. Chairman Les Cory and Mayor Edward Lambert, using ceremonial shovels, broke ground for the Bell Tower that will house the historic Durfee Bells on the campus of the new Durfee High School on Elsbree Street. Local newspapers covered the event widely. Many dignitaries, as well as Durfee students, were present.

It was a time of remembering the past and speaking of the future. Former Durfee High Principal James Panos, introduced Mayor Lambert who spoke enthusiastically of the Bell Tower that will be built on the grounds and what it will mean not only to the students at Durfee, but to the City as well. He said that "a community that doesn't remember its past, is a community without a soul" and that the Bell Tower will become a prominent landmark in the City of Fall River.

Chairman Les Cory spoke to the gathering, and especially to the Durfee students, telling them of the wonderful history of the bells. He explained that they had rung 29 times each morning in memory of Bradford Matthew Chaloner Durfee who had died at the age of 29. He explained how Mary B. Young, mother of Bradford, had provided funds for the high school as a memorial to her son who died in 1872. The beautiful high school, designed as a replica of the City Hall of Paris, was dedicated in 1887 and it was the largest financial gift given to any municipality in the United States. Mrs. Young had inscribed on the largest bell "The clock and the chime of bells are for us, for all, and it may be hoped, for many generations to come". Cory told the group what the sound of the tenor bell being tolled at 8:10 a.m. had meant to legions of students for the hundred years they had rung each morning, calling them to class at the majestic Durfee High School on Rock Street.

Now, finally, the Bells will ring again and be housed in a tower that is expected to be 15 feet square at its base and will stand over 40 feet tall. The bells will hang from a frame located on the second level, behind a decorative railing at 16 feet off the ground. The tower will be capped by a four-faced clock in a pointed red roof, reminiscent of the belfry in the Durfee building. A large artist's rendering of the tower was placed on an easel for everyone to see.

In order to have the tower built in time for the Homecoming next November, \$50,000 is still needed to complete the project. There are many ways available to contribute to the finalization of the project: Engraved Memorial Bricks available in two sizes, will make up the Pathway of Memories leading to and around the Bell Tower and can be purchased for either \$100 or \$250. Granite benches that will be located near the Pathway can be purchased for \$2,500 including engraving. A plaque for donors who have contributed \$1,000 will be mounted near the bell tower, and a tax-deductible gift in any amount will have your name listed in the dedication booklet that will be distributed at the dedication ceremony.

We are extremely grateful to all of the Durfee Alumni and others who have contributed to making this wonderful dream a reality and we hope that those who have planned to contribute, but have not yet done so, will make a commitment now, so that at the Thanksgiving game next November, the Durfee Bells will ring again, and the crowd will be in awe of their wonderful sound.

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Hall inducts '63 grid team, five new members

The Durfee Athletic Hall of Fame inducted five new members and the 1963 football team during ceremonies at the Venus de Milo Restaurant in Swansea last June.

The Class of 2006 comprised Tom Botelho (1967), Herman Bomback (1970), Carol Lynch (1977), John Silvia (1980) and Norm Dumont (1986). Lorem ipsum dolor sit amet, consectetuer adipiscing elit. The newest five members increase the Hall of Fame ranks to over 200 former athletes.

The Class of 2006 represents athletes over a 40-year period, including Dumont who will be inducted in his first year of eligibility. A look at the inductees:

Botelho, who is still contributing to Durfee athletics as a coach, was a two-sport star, who gained All-Bristol County status in football and baseball and an honorable mention on the Boston Herald All-Scholastic team. Botelho, who started his first football game at age 14 as the Hilltoppers quarterback, threw for 20 touchdown passes and ran for six TDs over three seasons. He also performed outstandingly on the baseball diamond as a three-year starter who led the Hilltoppers in

home runs, RBI, doubles and hits while compiling a .357 average during his senior year.

Bomback was an outstanding baseball pitcher and football halfback for the Hilltoppers and named All-Bristol County by the coaches in both sports. He was honored with the Jake Reagan Trophy as Durfee's most outstanding football player in 1969 and named the Red & Black's athlete of the year in 1970.

In baseball, Bomback compiled an 8-1 record as a senior, striking out 112 in 61 innings and along with his brother, Mark, made up one of the top pitching staffs in Massachusetts.

Lynch's athletic talent was displayed in basketball, softball and volleyball where she was a Durfee starter for three seasons and selected as an All-Scholastic performer in each sport. She also was named a High School All-American in basketball. Her talent helped Durfee capture Southeastern Massachusetts Conference championships for three years in basketball and the 1975 softball title. She was named the most valuable player in volleyball in 1976.

Silvia played football, baseball and winter track at Durfee, scoring over 80 points as the Hilltoppers' quarterback in his final two seasons. He was named as an All-Scholastic performer in his senior year. Silvia established a winter track record in the 50-yard high hurdles with a 6.82 seconds time and was a main cog on the 4-by-100 relay team. Silvia also gave the Hilltoppers pitching corps a quality left handed starter on the baseball diamond.

Dumont, who was an excellent performer in basketball and cross country, was best remember for his outstanding contribution in baseball where he posted a 15-5 two-year record and an 0.91 ERA as a senior

with 92 strikeouts in 62 innings. He also batted .340 as a junior and .325 as a senior. He was the most valuable pitcher and player of the Massachusetts All-Star game and a first team selection on both the Boston Globe and Boston Herald All-Star teams. In basketball, Dumont was a steady performer named to the Rogers Holiday All-Tournament team and was among the top 90 runners in the state's cross country rankings


The members of the 1963 football team also was honored at the ceremony. The team had a perfect 8-0 record, allowing only one touchdown and is considered by many as the best football team ever to represent Durfee High School.

The team was coached by Don Montle and assistants Steve Nawrocki, Tom "Skip" Karam and the late Joe "Skip" Lewis. Hungary, Poland, Romania, Bulgaria, Israel, Brazil, Chile, Peru, Columbia, Honduras, Cuba, Indonesia, Australia, Kenya and South Africa. Results from his work have been published in two books, 15 book chapters, and more than 70 refereed journal articles. He has also advised more than 20 graduate students, many of which have already achieved national and international recognition in the food engineering community.

Dr. Teixeira was born and raised in Fall River and was a 1962 graduate of B.M.C. Durfee High School. He completed his higher education at the University of Massachusetts in 1971 with BS and MS degrees in Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering and his Ph.D. degree in Food and Agricultural Engineering. After 11 years of industrial experience with the Ross Laboratories Division of Abbott Laboratories in Columbus, OH and with Arthur D. Little in Cambridge, MA, he joined the University of Florida as Asso-

ciate Professor of Food Engineering in 1982, and advanced to Full Professor with tenure in 1989.

Dr. Teixeira is twice a Fulbright Scholar, NATO Senior Guest Fellow, and Fellow of the American Society of Agricultural and Biological Engineers (ASABE), as well as recipient of the International IAFIS/FPEI Distinguished Food Engineer Award and other awards recognizing the excellence of his teaching and research programs at the University of Florida (Teacher of the Year in the College of Engineering, Gamma Sigma Delta Senior Faculty Award of Merit). He has served on national peer review panels for the USDA and the Fulbright Association, and is associate editor for Transactions of the ASABE, as well as editorial board member for the Journal of Food Science, and Journal of Food Process Engineering. He is also a Registered Professional Engineer in Florida and Massachusetts.

Remember Fall River High School?



Those of us who grew up in Fall River have always known Durfee High School. But did you know that for a short while it lost it's name? We in Fall River just say Durfee and know what we are speaking of. However on April 5, 1927, the Fall River School Committee passed a resolution to change the name. The resolution said, "That the report of the sub-committee on diplomas to the effect that henceforth and hereafter the High School organization be called the Fall River High School be adopted, and that henceforth, beginning with the year 1927, the High School diplomas will be awarded under the title," City of Fall River" to all who have completed the required course or courses of instruction in the Fall River High School."

As you can well imagine, the response to this resolution was not well received, especially with graduation less than two months away. Students who had already order rings with Durfee on them were not happy. Accounts of that time describe considerable demonstrations around the school. Student strikes were threatened but did not materialize. On May 20, 1927, the Durfee Alumni Association demanded the name change be rescinded because any name change violated the spirit of the gift given by the Durfee family when the original school was built. On May 24, 1927, 1200 Fall Riverites held a meeting to discuss the name change. No one spoke in favor.

The School Committee however stood firm with it's decision and diplomas were awarded at graduation that read "Fall River High School." The pressure soon became more intense over the summer and into the fall. The new school year began in September of 1927 and the name was still Fall River High School. In the municipal elections in November of that year two committee members who supported the name change would go down to defeat at the hands of two anti name change candidates. This more than anything got the attention of the School Committee. The Class of 1928, which made it clear the name change, was unacceptable formed committees. The students were angry. On January 9,1928, feeling the heat, the School Committee backed down and restored the Durfee name. Forever diplomas would read B.M.C. Durfee High School. Members of the class of 1927 were given the option of receiving new diplomas.



which sited growth and innovation as well as an important contribution to the community.

In addition to fast catamarans, Gladding-Hearn has constructed more than 50 pilot boats for various worldwide associations. The Exxon Valdez oil spill showed a need for larger pilot ships to guide tankers in and out of harbors and Duclos was able to capitalize on that need.

Duclos is a member of the International Marine Transit Association, Passenger Vessel Owners Association and the Propeller Club. He is a founding board mem-
