#### AND IT'S ALL THANKS TO YOU!

In a down economy, despite a low probability of success, we're bucking the system and making a difference. What a fund raising year we've had so far and it's only going to get better.

We started out with a Scentsy party at the home of Joyce Shull and began adding to our scholarship program with net proceeds of \$500. Close behind that was the Mardi Gras in February which netted \$5950 and with the donation of a car that sold for \$2500, we were well on our way to matching our generous \$12,500 scholarship donation from the Edie LeFevre Trust. May 1st we danced around the May pole when our Spring Fling furnished \$1903 and sponsored the Veteran's Event, plus, we still have \$984 remaining to help with other operating expenses. Following close (too close) behind Spring Fling was our first Savor the Flavor event and Founder's Day weekend. It was a whirlwind week, but, well worth the time. With the proceeds from our very well attended Savor the Flavor and the 12.5% from the Founder's Day Committee, we ended that weekend with \$3557 extra in the bank. These funds will go a long way to helping fulfill our CASA and Christmas Family outreach needs in December.

Now we're closing in on the 3 Hog Night Pig Roast for October 13th. To date, t-shirt advertisement and t-shirt sales have netted us \$2475 and we haven't even roasted a pig yet. This year the event will benefit Alba Food Pantry and Rains County Good Samaritans.

To save you the time of going back and adding up all the amounts listed above, with the major events we've had so far and a couple of major donations, we've netted \$29,385. This doesn't include all the individual donations from our generous members along the way. Our gross income to date is \$40,820 and we have already put \$32,132 back into our community. Oh my, what big hearts you have! AND IT'S ALL THANKS TO YOU (and me too)!

The 2012 Scholarship year proved to be one of the most rewarding ever as the Lake Country Neighbors and Edie LeFevre Scholarship Fund was dispersed to twenty four (24) students! LCN graciously gave \$22,000 to students from Alba Golden ISD, Yantis ISD and Rains County ISD. Committee members Dodi Cummings, Jo Ann Doty, Debby Keenan, Kathie Ruiz and Carolyn West chose ten (10) high school graduates from Rains County, ten (10) from Alba Golden and four from Yantis, with twenty two (22) graduates receiving \$1000 and two (2) receiving \$500 each.

After hosting the students at the annual LCN Scholarship Luncheon in May, all students were given their awards at their respective graduation exercises. To date, Treasurer Pam Bowden has mailed thirteen (13) checks to the students and their respective colleges. The balance of the checks will be sent as they are requested.



Several committees are already working hard to make our 3rd Annual Pig Roast a success. Mark your calendars NOW......October 13th.

This year we are benefiting Rains County Good Samaritans and Alba Food Pantry. With the increase of unemployment, gas prices and higher food prices, many people are relying on these two organizations to help feed their families.

Last month, Good Samaritans served 270 families (815 people) and Alba Food Pantry served 45 families.

Both of these organizations rely on donations to keep their doors open. The Food Pantry cannot purchase food from the Food Bank in Tyler, so it is totally relying on donations. Good Samaritans' facility is qualified for Food Bank purchases but the requirements are so great, it is difficult to meet the needs.

Churches provide some financial support for both organizations and they are willing to work with Lake Country Neighbors on the Pig Roast.
