Lent Reflection

For some, Lent is a 40 day period of giving up chocolate, caffeine, sugar or something else after Pancake Day. Traditionally, it's seen as a time in which to reflect upon the life and death of Jesus. However much we already know about Lent, the story of Lent is one which reminds us of why it is marked by so many around the world. The arrival of Lent is characterised by pancakes! Shrove Tuesday, a day highly anticipated by all pancake lovers, is traditionally a day of preparation before the season of Lent begins. The 40 days of Lent represent the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness at the start of his ministry. Jesus fasted during his time in the wilderness, and so Christians traditionally, identify with his suffering by abstaining from particular foods during this time, including meat, fish, milk and egg products.

Shrove Tuesday gets its name from the ritual of 'shriving'. This 1,000-year-old practice involves a person confessing their mistakes, and receiving absolution for them before Lent begins. Three keystone habits that Christians are encouraged to observe during Lent are prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

Prayer: Prayer offers us all a very special opportunity to grow in our relationship with God and to deepen our commitment to a way of life, rooted in our baptism. In our busy world, prayer provides us with an opportunity to reflect upon our patterns and sins. We should pray more deeply, experience sorrow for what we've done and failed to do, and to be generous to those in need.

Fasting is tied closely to almsgiving. Instead of fasting, giving service to mankind is also encouraged. This could be helping at home or at charity centres either in cash or kind.

Pope Francis is quoted as saying: "Fasting makes sense if it really chips away at our security and, as a consequence, benefits someone else, if it helps us cultivate the style of the Good Samaritan, who bent down to his brother in need and took care of him." So when you fast, do not proclaim it, do not look hard done by, smile and go about your day happy. We are told this in the Bible.

Almsgiving: Few things in life force us to put aside our own needs more than becoming a parent. And yet, we do it because we gain more than we give. In a similar way, during Lent, we increase our generosity toward others, not to earn grace, please God, or draw attention to our own holiness, but to experience grace. Generosity enables us to rise above ourselves and to live, as St. Ignatius of Loyola said, 'As a person for others.'

On Easter Sunday, the Church celebrates Jesus' resurrection. Fasts/tasks are finished, chocolate Easter eggs consumed, and the resurrection foreshadows the renewal of creation. Good Friday is so called because the death of Christ, as terrible as it was, led to the resurrection, which brought new life to those who believe. Good Friday challenges mere human goodness — it is the nature of Jesus' sacrifice that overcomes the weakness of humanity. Churches will light a paschal candle to represent the eternal presence of Jesus, as he rises from the dead.

The story of Lent is one of sadness and joy; a story which is still celebrated in diverse ways throughout the world today.

Of course, we shall still come over to worship at Wilsford from time to time and support Group Services and the weekly Bible Study course and will not forget the many good friends we have in the Parish, but "we are pilgrims on a journey" and now move on gratefully towards retirement.

Lord, I shall say "goodbye", because pilgrims do not stay for long: they wouldn't be pilgrims if they did, would they?

Lead theft in our Diocese

The past 12 months have been a particularly difficult year for many of our parishes due to a significant rise in lead thefts. In total, 30 churches have been targeted, and despite the arrest of four suspects in December 2019 the problem has not abated – within the first two weeks of the new year two further thefts had taken place.

Lead theft is a devastating crime not only for the parish, but also for the wider community. The cost involved for the replacement of the lead using ternecoated stainless steel – a far less attractive material for metal thieves – can be considerable. Most insurers will cover the cost of a replacement roof if the church is alarmed, has SmartWater and all of the appropriate signage. Where a church doesn't have an alarm, but has the other precautions it is likely the pay-out will be capped at around £7500. With the latter the net result is that parishes have to find the repair and reinstatement costs from a combination of church funds and charitable grant givers.

On average the replacement of an aisle roof can cost in the region of £30,000, and a nave roof, with more scaffolding involved, can be as much as £70–80,000. Therefore, it is in everybody's interests to try and minimise the risk of lead theft from a church. With this in mind, and if there is lead at your church, there is advice on the Lincoln Diocese website.
