

ALTRUSA AND WIC A COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP

The Altrusa Literacy Committee of Meredith continues (8+ years now) to partner with the local WIC (Women, Infants and Children) program – a federally funded program providing nutritional



help and education for pregnant women - breastfeeding women up to 12 months after the infant's birth, non-breastfeeding women up to 6 months after the infant's birth and infants and children up to their 5th birthday. WIC locates this program here in Meredith at the First Congregational Church and in Ashland at the Community Center.

We provide age-appropriate books for the children and educational resources as well as light reading books for the WIC mothers on the first Tuesday of each month in Meredith and once a month in January, April, July and October for WIC families in our neighboring town of Ashland. Handouts that address "Tips for Reading to Your Children" are also left with the books each month.

The poster you see in the back ground, was donated by a past, now deceased, member and reads as follows:

"Next to hugging your child, reading aloud is probably the longest lasting experience that you can put into your child's life."

Literacy members are always on the lookout for good "board books" for the very young children and appropriate books for those up to age 5. New this past year we added bilingual (Spanish and English) books as well. Members rotate each month setting up the books and signage at 8:30 in the morning of the WIC visit and then come back at 2:30 to break it down. All books are stored by members and replenished and/or refreshed each month.


The Meredith Friends of the Library volunteers have been very supportive by culling out and setting aside books donated to the Library book sale that they feel could be used for our program as well.

people to sell or give away their children. Some out of greed and for profit, I am sure. But mostly out of desperation as they could not provide even the basic food and shelter for the children. These children were put on "Orphan Trains" that took them places in the Midwest where people "adopted" (bought) them to work on farms and in factories and, unfortunately, for other horrible reasons. The Orphan Train follows the story of one such young girl, a nine year old Irish immigrant. Now a 91 year old woman, she lives in Maine and shares her story with a troubled 17 year old Penobscot Indian girl. The teen has been assigned community service or she goes to juvenile hall. The widow has the girl doing her community service by helping her clean out her attic, which is full of keepsakes, possessions and memories of her turbulent childhood. Surpirsingly to them both, her past and the teen girl's life have many similarities. It becomes a bond between the two. This is a fascinating story about a terrible and mainly forgotten chapter of history. But it is also the personal, heartfelt story told through a child's eyes and now looking back from the grown woman's eyes at her past, present and to her future. It is also about courage, second chances and unexpected friendship. I could not put this book down. It will draw you in.
