A SEE DAI DOO SOCIETY TRIBUTE TO BETTY KAM OI LEONG

Betty Kam Oi Leong

Betty Leong was a pioneer, a visionary, a mentor and a good friend.

In 1997 Betty was elected as the first female president of the See Dai Doo Society after 92 years of male dominance. She was a pioneer in breaking the barrier in having a female play a major role in shaping the destiny of the society. Although some may have tried to dissuade her as a female from being the president, she never faltered in her determination and perseverance in becoming the first female president. As a result of her leadership she encouraged more women and their daughters to get involved in the society.

Before becoming president, in 1988 she was instrumental in producing the first video show of her ancestral village. This was a new and innovative project that

was well received by the society.

She believed in the importance of education. She supported scholarships for our young SDDS members with hopes that they would return to participate and share their knowledge and innovations with the society. She believed that education was an investment in the future.

In 1999 she was elected President of the Zhongshan Association. That year as president she was able to have the international Worldwide Zhongshan Convention in Hawaii. It was no small feat but Betty was up to the challenge and the convention was a great success due to her leadership.

Subsequent to that challenge, Betty Leong served as President of the Kwangtung Community Honolulu Lin Yee Hui, formed in 1975, to provide mutual aid among Kwangtung immigrants and descendants in Hawaii.

She was very active in the Chinese community. She later served as President of the Chinese Women's Club.

During the society's centennial celebration in 2005, she helped produce and narrate a historical DVD entitled "Trace Our Root." Because of her close ties with the Zhongshan government the first SDDS tour to visit our villages in Zhongshan was very well received and a big success due to the efforts of Betty. She was the society's liaison with the Zhongshan government and they all knew her and respected her.

Betty continued to contribute to the society. By her knowledge of the culture and traditions of the society, she became a mentor to many future presidents, including myself. She always looked to the future and strived to improve the society. As a trustee she supported the maintenance and improvement of the SDDS building. Also realizing that the society needed to keep up with the changing times and laws affecting the society, she played a key role in helping to amend the society's by-laws after 25 years. She was truly a Renaissance woman.

Aside from all her achievements and accomplishments, she was a devoted wife to her husband Lum Nip, mother to her children, Wendy and Colin and grandmother to her grandchildren, Kimberly Ann, Chelsie Ann, Brandon and Leighton (deceased). But most important to many of us in the See Dai Doo Society, she was a friend, a good friend ... a friend that you could always count on for help and guidance.

Betty, See Dai Doo Society thanks you for all that you have done for our society. We will miss you. Aloha and mahalo, Betty.

Despite competition from the University of Hawaii Men's basketball game occurring at the same time, approximately 40 to 50 people attended the SDDS cooking demonstration on March 20, 2016, 1 pm, at the Great Hall. Those present witnessed the creation of a delicious three-course meal and tasted a full-size plate of samples with two scoops of mochi rice, three black bean sauce spare ribs and two *dau lau*.

Under the direction of Chef June Kam Tong (author of *Popo's Kitchen 1* and 2), Stephanie Miwa and Norma Acopan started making sticky mochi rice. While the rice was cooking, our Vice President Leonard Kam and James Acopan created spare ribs with black bean sauce. In addition, they showcased how the spare ribs could be placed upon a bed of look fun for another dish. Another variation shown was the spare ribs stirfried with bitter melon. As we waited in anticipation for the rice to be cooked, there was nothing wrong with having dessert first. Lucy Wong,

D'Wayne Wong and Stephanie Miwa under the watchful instruction of June Tong made mochi balls rolled in coconut flakes, chopped peanuts and brown sugar for a sweet delight of *dau lau*. Samples were distributed to the audience on toothpicks. Stephanie Miwa and Normal Acopan completed the three-course meal with the sticky mochi rice by adding ham, baby shrimp, *lup cheong* and mushrooms to make the tasty treat.

Eight lucky winners won door prizes and had a choice to pick from two plates of spare ribs on a bed of look fun, three full size plates of food or three plates of *dau lau*.

Recipe for Dau Lau

"An oh so easy recipe, but oh so good!"

FLOUR MIXTURE

- 1 Lb Mochi Flour
- 15 Oz Water

TOPPING MIXTURE

- 1 Cup Shredded Coconut
- 1 Cup Chopped Peanuts
- 1 Tbsp Brown Sugar

- 1. Combine flour mixture and mix well. Pinch dough and form a small ball.
- 2. Boil a pot of water. Drop mochi balls into rapidly boiling water. When dough floats, remove with a slotted spoon.
- 3. Roll balls in topping mixture.

Sticky Mochi Rice

MOCHI RICE MIXTURE

- 4 Cups Mochi Rice
- 4 Cups Water
- 1 tsp Salt
- 1 Tbsp Hondashi

FILLING MIXTURE

- 1/2 Cup Dry Baby Shrimp Wash, Parboil
- A Cup Cooked Lup Cheong Diced Fine
- 1/2 Cup Smoked Ham or Roast Pork Diced Fine
- 1 Cup Black Mushrooms Soak, Parboil, Diced Fine
- 1 Cup Green Onions Diced Fine
- 1 Tbsp Oyster Sauce
- 1 tsp Five Spice

OIL

3 Tbsp Oil

SOY SAUCE

Drizzle Soy Sauce — Optional

- Cook rice in rice cooker according to directions.
- 2. Heat wok. Add oil. Stir-fry filling mixture.
- 3. Combine rice and filling mixture as soon as rice button shifts to warm. Mix well and let steam for 30 minutes or more.
- 4. Drizzle soy sauce and mix well.

SDDS offers graduating high school seniors and current college students scholarships each year. The amounts awarded vary each year depending on the number of applicants and amount available. We also award scholarships to students attending Chinese schools as well.

Eligible applicants are those undergraduate students attending or entering accredited universities or colleges whose ancestor or ancestors came to Hawaii from the historical See Dai Doo district in Zhongshan, Guangdong Province, China. Scholarship criteria include a minimum 3.3 grade point average, community service, two recommendations, a transcript and an application essay.




