Pride Aside By Natalie Butcher



"Pride aside... We need prayer!" This was the text message that Joni Hutton sent her church's life group (a group of people that "do life" together inside and outside church) while sitting in the ICU. Her son, Ben, was in the hospital, because he had several organs shutting down due to a drug overdose. Up until this point, they had

never shared with anyone that their son was addicted to drugs. In a desperate attempt to save her son's life, she sent the text.

"Pride Aside" is a DVD series by Steve Hutton, father of Ben and husband of Joni, that the Sunday Night Growth Group watched in July. Steve recounts his family's journey with a son that became addicted to drugs. The Hutton family was a typical "good" family with two loving parents who faithfully attended and served in church. Their son, Ben, was a 4.0 student in high school and was blessed with an incredible amount of athletic talent. He was the fastest person on his high school football and track teams. He was talented enough to earn a football scholarship the University of Southern Mississippi, a Division I school. Like many students, Ben experimented with drugs — first trying alcohol out of curiosity. Over 5 years he not only drank, but also tried marijuana, Adderall, and Xanax. He eventually tried harder drugs like cocaine and heroin. This led to a vicious cycle of addiction.

In the DVD, Steve stated that 1 in 10 people that experiment with alcohol **Addiction** and/or drugs become addicted. Why can't they just stop? In "Drugs, Brains, and Behavior The Science of Addiction" by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, "Addiction is defined as a chronic, relapsing brain disease that is characterized by compulsive drug seeking and use, despite harmful consequences. It is considered a brain disease because drugs <u>change</u> the brain—they change its structure and how it works. These brain changes can be long-lasting, and can lead to the harmful behaviors seen in people

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who abuse drugs."



Steve talked about three main parts of the brain — cortex, limbic system, and brain stem. The cortex is where reasoning is found and is controlled voluntarily. However, the brain stem (controls bodily functions like the heart beating and breathing while asleep) and the limbic system (controls pleasure) are involuntary. When a person takes a drug the

first time, they are using the part of their brain that voluntarily makes decisions (cortex). When they become addicted, the limbic system has been chemically altered by the drugs. The decision to take or not take the drug is no longer under the control of the cortex. They can't just stop.

Steve also explained that when a person uses an illegal drug or abuses a legal drug theyexperience a "high", but come back to normal. When they take it again (depending on their tolerance, weight,



heredity, genetic predisposition, etc.), they eventually don't get quite as "high" and have to take more to get "high". They eventually can't get to "normal" even though they desperately want to.

People like to think that addiction is a teenage or young adult problem. It's not. It can also strike older adults when painful diseases or injuries attack the body or when life events cause depression. My dad, a strong Christian, was diagnosed with Fibromyalgia, an incredibly painful disease, in his latter years of life. While being treated for the disease, he was prescribed many different medications to try to give him relief from the disease's symptoms. At some point, he became addicted to Oxycontin. At the time, I didn't know. In October of 2012, Richard and I flew to the

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West Coast to visit my parents. I hadn't seen them in 6 years. When I got out of the car and walked to the apartment, I was shocked to see my dad with glazed eyes and walking with an "old man shuffle". Seeing him broke my heart and I knew that I would never see him again. Here was a man that I dearly loved that when I saw him last was teaching and dancing line dances — he was very active. He was now taking morphine and other medicines. During the visit, I watched him track and countdown to when he could go to the pharmacy to renew his morphine prescription. He didn't leave the apartment much — sleeping most of the day and night and going out mainly to get prescriptions filled. Due to the years of dealing with the pain of Fibromyalgia and the medications that he was taking, my dad ended his suffering by committing suicide the following March. I never saw him again.

Drug addiction is not something people talk about, but we should. It can happen to anyone — even you or someone you love. As Ben Hutton said in a talk to some high school students, "If you don't think it can happen to you or your family, then it is more likely to happen in your family." Denial... Refusing to see the signs, because we want to believe the best in our children or loved ones. "We are a good, Christian family. It can't happen to us." It can. It happened in my family. It has happened in other families within our church and community.

After several attempts at sobriety at different facilities, Ben ended up at a Teen Challenge of the Dakotas, a Christian-based residential rehabilitation center located in South Dakota, for 18 months. He is now sober, is back in college, and is about to graduate with a Bachelor of Science in Computers. Ben and his family are using his experiences with addiction to educate people on addictions, but also point them to a loving God that has helped them through Ben's battles with addiction. Ben is fortunate. Many die from drug overdoses or suicide trying to feel normal.
