At the appointed time, we have prayers around the table, read a scripture, discuss the scripture and then, remembering the Last Supper, we pass the bread and wine around to one another. All ages are welcome. The experience will last 90 minutes or less. No preparation is required for participants. Each Eucharist stands alone so come to as many or few as fits your life.
