The Fayette County Cultural Trust has 3 basic initiatives. The Downtown Connellsville initiative focuses on the historic preservation of Downtown Connellsville as well as promoting Connellsville as a great destination within the Laurel Highlands of Pennsylvania. The Connellsville Canteen perserves the history of the Fayette County men and women who served not only in the War but at the homefront. The Rural Arts Collaborative was formed to place local professional artists into a classroom setting. The Fayette County Cultural Trust brings all walks of life together in the Fayette County area to perserve the history and collaborate working relationships with other like minded organizations.

The Connellsville Canteen is the only WWII Museum in Southwestern Pennsylvania. It is also the home of Harry Clark's Indian Creek Valley Railroad Display. Since opening it has received the Pennsylvania Downtown Center award for community enhancement. The Canteen has also been visited by the *Travel Channel*, *Mysteries at the Museum* and News Center 4 from Cleveland, Ohio.

Neighborhood Partnership Program

The Partnership is funded through the Pennsylvania Neighborhood Assistance Program, which is a tax credit program offered through the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development. The program offers tax credits of 80% against applicable Pennsylvania business taxes to businesses who commit at least \$50,000 per year for over 5 years and up to 10 years for an approved program.

Connellsville Carnegie Free Library

The library opened its doors on April 30, 1903, thanks to the generosity of Andrew Carnegie, who believed that education is the cornerstone of success. At that time, Connellsville was the leading coke producer in the world and immigrants were flocking here to work in the mines and coke works. Built of sandstone in the Italianate manner, the building housed books and magazines and offered early patrons both educational and recreational reading, as well as musical evenings in the second floor auditorium. The library was named to the National Register of Historic Places in 1981. Library patrons now have access to more than a million volumes including magazines, e-books, audio books, music and movies through the WAGGIN network.





Wesley Health Center

Wesley Church Health Center, Inc. (WHC), a mission of Wesley United Methodist Church, was founded in 1993 by the Rev. Eugene Ankeny and parishioner Dr. J. Miller Oppy. WHC has been in continuous operation since that time and is the only clinic in southwestern Pennsylvania that provides free primary health care for individuals without health insurance or wo are under insured. WHC is managed by a volunteer Board of Directors and a volunteer Executive Director. Part-time paid staff consists of a Nurse Practitioner, Office Manager, and a Medical Assistant. Dr. Mouhanad Al-Fakih is WHC's Medical Collaborator and, over the years, WHC has added services through collaborative agreements including those with Connellsville Counseling and Pyschological Services for counseling, Dr. John Ellis for eye care, Dr. Francis Jacobyansky

for dental care, and Excela Health's Frick Hospital for blood analysis. An elevator makes WHC's second floor accessible for additional services such as dental and vision screenings, patient education and health classes.



Allegheny Conference on Community Developement **Continued Support**

The Allegheny Conference's Strengthening Communities Partnership (SCP) program assists communities to achieve stronger momentum in their economic transformation. Leaders representing communities, business and government are working collaboratively to create truly transformative economic development. Their program was created to concentrate private investment and help address disparities in many of the region's neighborhoods.

Since the program's inception in 2012, they have seen the tremendous impact these partnerships have, not only the buildings and vacant lots in these communities, but also, in the

restoration of pride and hope in these communities.

The Conference helps build strong relationships between business and community leaders and has committed resources to assist our community partners. The Conference currently assist 16 communities. These communities are Beaver Falls, Bloomfield, City of Butler, Braddock, North Braddock, Rankin, Swissvale, Fineview, Perry Hilltop, Hazelwood, Hill District, Penn Hills, Homestead, W. Homestead, Munhall, Connellsville, Homewood, McKees Rocks, Mount Oliver, Knoxville, Sharpsburg, City of Washington, and Wilkinsburg.

Since its inception in 2012, SCP has assisted communities to bring in over \$15M in revenue, close to 50% coming from tax credit funds. The role of a business, investing in tax credits, providing technical support, and creating strategic partnerships is essential for the region's communities to thrive. The SCP program is part of the Conference's focus of promoting a regional vitality where a thriving people living in the highest quality of place.



Downtown Connellsville - Scenic Pittsburgh Award - October 16, 2019



Connellsville, PA–Years of planning and labor by area leaders to leverage their scenic resources and make good on a new vision of the former "coal and coke capital of the U.S." have brought big changes to Connellsville, and a first-of-its-kind award by local environmental and civic advocacy group Scenic Pittsburgh.

Scenic Pittsburgh's Community Scenic Achievement Award is given to a southwestern. Pennsylvania community that has "demonstrated a consistent, long-term, and visionary commitment to protecting and promoting their scenic resources."

The public award ceremony took place on Wednesday, October 16, 2019, at the Connellsville Canteen. The planned location was in front of the mural at the Italian Independent Social Club at 400 West Crawford Avenue, but due to inclement weather it was moved to the Canteen. The 4,000 sq. ft. mural was commissioned by the Fayette County Cultural Trust from noted Pittsburgh muralist Jeremy Raymer, and portrays scenes from the history of Connellsville's Italian-American community. Aside from the mural and the Connellsville Canteen, a restaurant and WWII museum housed in an historic train station, other scenic attractions include flower plantings, renovated historic buildings, and improved facades. Public art calls attention to the city's history and location, adjacent to the Youghiogheny River and Great Allegheny Passage bike trail. Connellsville also adopted an ambitious Comprehensive City Plan in April 2019 that focuses on further development of the area as a "recreational haven" and local arts showcase with a walkable downtown.

Scenic Pittsburgh's focus is the preservation and promotion of southwestern PA's scenic resources – those places, sights and unique features of communities that make them great places to live and work. The non-profit serves a 10-county region that includes Allegheny, Armstrong, Butler, Beaver, Fayette, Greene, Indiana, Somerset, Washington and Westmoreland counties. Scenic Pittsburgh's Executive Director, former PA state senator, state representative and Allegheny County commissioner Mike Dawida, says Connellsville is a great example of how communities can make the most of their scenic resources.

"Our motto is that beauty is good for business. Connellsville is leading the way, and showing how communities in the region can provide economic opportunity and quality of life for their residents by taking advantage of what makes them beautiful and unique."

One of the main forces behind the city's revitalization has been Daniel Cocks, who created the Fayette County Cultural Trust specifically to seek funding for Connellsville's downtown. He says the Trust's efforts helped to catalyze a broader transformation financially supported by a broad range of local organizations, businesses and individuals called Downtown Connellsville. "Collaborations are very important for any community development initiative, and Connellsville has proven that working together produces positive results," he said.

The city council and Connellsville Redevelopment Authority have also been on board every step of the way. Mayor

Greg Lincoln said, "It is a great honor to receive an award from Scenic Pittsburgh for all the efforts done by so many to make Connellsville a better place to work, live, and do business in."

Mayor Lincoln also emphasized the role of collaboration in the city's success. "We have an amazing community full of volunteers who love Connellsville and its history. This award exemplifies working together to build a better community and I am grateful to Scenic Pittsburgh for recognizing our jewel on the Yough." "The people behind this had a vision," adds Dawida. "And through a lot of hard work, and a focus on the beautiful aspects of their community, they've brought it to life."







This project was funded through the Allegheny Foundation and matched with part of an estate from Michael Prestia.



Crime Prevention



A project of the Fayette County Cultural Trust, the Connellsville Canteen has been operating since 2012 and is the only museum in Southwestern Pennsylvania dedicated to preserving the history of WWII. Since opening, the Canteen has hosted several school field trips, mystery tours from out of state tour groups, the *Travel Channel*, news teams from Ohio, and has received an asset enhancement award from the Pennsylvania Downtown Center. The Canteen continues to be the hub of education in the area with its programming to include Lunch & Learns, Dinner & Dialogues, educational partnerships with the Heinz History Center and other organizations.



The Connellsville Canteen employs a Chef, Canteen Manager, and two waitresses. The Canteen has also worked with seniors from the local Area Agency on Aging. The facility also has a "Canteen Bootcamp" program to train Culinary Career and Technical Students the aspects of running a kitchen. This past year we have utilized interns from Penn State University.

The Canteen is also the home of Harry Clark's Indian Creek Valley Railroad Display. This 25' x 55' display was rated one of the best scratch built displays in America. This display houses many recreated buildings from the area around the 1940's. A group of volunteers runs the trains every Saturday.

May 2019 - The 3rd grade classes from West Crawford Elementary took a field trip to the Connellsville Canteen, Appalachian Creativity Center and the Laurel Highlands Native American Interpretative Center in Connellsville. They spent all day having fun learning about the Canteen, train display, creating art, WWII, Native American History and even got to meet Officer McGruff who stopped by to say hi. This field trip was provided by the Allegheny Foundation which included their transportation, lunch and a fun day in Connellsville! Thanks to the teachers at West Crawford Elementary for making this happen.

Started in 2012 and after a year of conversations and planning with funding from the Claude Worthington Benedum Foundation, the Rural Arts Collaborative (RAC) Arts Education Project was formed. The premise behind the RAC project approach was to recruit Teaching Artists to work in school districts in Southwestern Pennsylvania counties, with the intent to infuse a diverse arts education approach into existing curriculum, enhance social and cognitive learning for students, and contribute to sustained partnerships amongst educators, artists and students in the region, particularly in those schools which were experiencing cutbacks or entire elimination of their arts programs.












Connellsville Crossroads Magazine


Fayette Non-Profit Partnership



Pennsylvania's Neighborhood Partnership tax credit program is based on the state's fiscal year. The financials reported in this end of year financial report only reflects part of the income from the Neighborhood Partnership tax credit program which is the reason the FCCT is showing a deficit at the end of the 2019 calendar year.
