Mary was always regarded as being God-fearing, intelligent, mannerable, giving, loving and obviously concerned about the well-being and feelings of others. This description was one that depicted her journey throughout her entire life. She accepted the Lord at a very early age and was baptized at Rose Hill Baptist Church by Pastor Woodson. From that day
