#### CANOLA EXPORTS TO CHINA

On March 29, APAS met with Federal Agriculture and Trade Ministers in Saskatoon to discuss the suspension of canola exports to China. At the meeting, APAS proposed the following changes to the Agri-Stability program in order to support canola producers:

- An enhancement of Agri-Stability coverage to deal with export market issues,
- That the federal government waive enrollment fees for 2019 Agri-Stability applications,
- That the 2019 enrollment deadline be extended past April 30, and late enrollment penalties be dropped,
- That governments prepare for Agri-Stability interim payments should trade issues seriously reduce farm income
- That Saskatchewan Crop Insurance staff be available to assist producers with their applications.

APAS also proposed changes to the Cash Advance program to revise its program year limits to ensure that producers can receive an advance on stored grain from 2018 production with flexible repayment terms while still having access to the full \$400,000 limit for 2019 spring advances. APAS also requested an increase in the interest free portion.

The government has since announced an increase in the maximum loan limit of the Advance Payments program to \$1 million from \$400,000. The interest-free portion will also increase to \$500,000 from \$100,000.

#### **CARBON COSTING**

With the arrival of the Carbon Tax in Saskatchewan last month, APAS staff have crunched the numbers and come up with their best estimate of how much the tax will actually cost producers. According to APAS calculations, the average Saskatchewan grain farmer will see an increase of \$2 per acre in direct and indirect costs this year under a \$20/tonne federal carbon tax. That number will increase to \$4 per acre by 2022.


#### **MOISTURE SURVEY**

Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada is collecting information from producers across the country about how weather and climate are affecting their farm operations. The information from these surveys help the government monitor areas of concern across the country, and decide who is eligible for supports such as the Livestock Tax Deferral program.
