PROJECT

One of the overseas missionary agencies that St. Margaret's support is The Falconer Home, based in Kabulamema, Zambia. This is a children's orphanage that has been running since 1947 and, as you can imagine, facilities are always in need of renovation and development. As a result The Falconer Trust, which administers the affairs of the Home, is launching a new project with the aim of renovating a large dormitory at the Falconer Home, in order to accommodate 24 boys. The dormitory is currently in very poor condition, and is not fit for use. The project would involve the following work:

- Replacing the roof and roof trusses (this part of the task has already been funded)
- Install electric lighting
- Install wash basins and showers
- Fit doors and glaze windows
- Create a second entrance
- Clean and paint
- Equip with bunk beds, lockers and furniture

Please Help!

The Home and Trust continue to need funds for this vital work and are looking to raise **£30,000** (above and beyond our regular support) in order to complete the project. Compassion Fatigue ?

Every time I pick up a newspaper these days or switch on the TV, I am confronted by pictures of refugees from the wars zones in the Middle East and Sub-Saharan Africa. This tide of human misery leaves me with conflicting emotions. **As a mother**, I am especially affected by the plight of young children, and empathise strongly with those parents in desperate need. **As a citizen** of this country, I feel quite overwhelmed by the scale of the problem – and helpless in the face of such mounting numbers of migrants. Selfishly, I don't want their plight to affect my own, or my children's, standard of living. Then I feel so angry about those war lords who cause the problem in the first place, and the traffickers who profit from other people's despair and misery.

Migrants, refugees – words which neatly obscure the fact that we are dealing with real people, people in desperate need, fleeing in terror from persecution, torture, and the real fear of being killed or injured.

It brings me up short with the question “**why does God allow this?**”, and there are no easy or trite answers. The Hebrew Bible (or Old Testament) records over and over again the suffering and bewilderment of God's people. The Christian “New” Testament begins with the massacre of young children as a cruel despot tries to destroy the Christ Child, who, he fears, will grow up to threaten his power and privileged lifestyle. So **Jesus himself became a refugee**, fleeing from a ruthless tyrant, and the words of Jesus from the cross “My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?” echo throughout both books of the Bible. So the Bible never suggests that life in this world is easy, or without problems which challenge us all.

As a Christian, I believe that God brought this world into being, and He sustains it from moment to moment. I believe that God did not create anyone as a warmonger or murderer, but He did give us free will. Freedom to do good or evil, and what happens when people misuse that freedom is spelt out clearly in the very first book of the Bible as we read that Cain killed his own brother Abel.

I can offer no reasons or solutions, but heartfelt prayer for wise decisions from the politicians, compassion for those people caught up in wars not of their own making, and generosity of hearts, minds (and pockets) to help those genuinely seeking refuge.

Just Boys?

Our Boys Club here At St. Margaret's has been running for many years now. Over the years the girls in our community have been really well provided for with Rainbows, Brownies and Guides that meet here on a Wednesday at the Parish centre. As we seek to serve our local community we felt a place for boys to come and meet and have fun together was important. A dedicated team of fully DBS checked volunteers run the club with the support of Tom our Youth and Children's Worker.

Boys Club is aimed at the primary age range between Year 2 And Year 6. This mix of ages works really well with great relationships establishing between the younger and older kids. They all look out for one another and enjoy playing together. Each week we have loads of fun playing football, dodge-ball, cricket, pool and table tennis to name just a few. We play lots of other games and have lots of challenges to keep everybody interested. Each term we also go on a trip. Bowling is one of our favourites.



Each week we share a story from the bible. This autumn we are working our way through the Friends and Heroes DVD's. Friends and Heroes is an animated children's adventure based in ancient Egypt, Israel and Rome. The story follows two young friends, Macky and Portia, as they fight for justice against the Roman Empire. Each episode consists of two

Bible Stories in which children can learn about characters from the Old and New Testament. Whatever their faith or background, like our heroes, children will be empowered and inspired by what they see and hear.
