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The Episcopal Church Reclaims its Mission: Live as people of Jesus

For ten days in early July The Episcopal Church met in Austin, Texas for its 79th triennial convention. All active bishops, four clergy persons and four lay leaders of every diocese spent ten days in legislative sessions, worship services, community witnessing, theological and programmatic conversations and an honest to goodness not in our wheel house **revival**.

In those ten days it became clear that The Episcopal Church with its dioceses in the United States, Taiwan, Micronesia, the Caribbean, Central and South America, as well as the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe and the Navajoland Area Mission is not about church business as usual. Instead of operating in a siege mentality, how do we fill the pews, how to we attract young families, how do we guarantee older wealthier members remember the church in their wills, the convention asked, how do we bear witness to the power and love of God in the world? How do we spread the good news of Jesus Christ to people who are overwhelmed by struggles in daily living? How do we remind people in our church and outside our church that we are one in eyes of an awesome God?

Signs of vibrancy, focus, and forward movement I observed in my time in Austin included joint sessions of bishops and deputies on the topics Evangelism and Reconciliation. The session on Care of Creation occurred after I returned home. An organized public presence of Bishops Against Gun Violence brought hundreds to hear from the parents of a slain Parkland student. The family are members of St. Mary Magdalene Episcopal Church in Coral Springs, Florida. The demonstration was a visible sign that followers of Jesus Christ believe in the sanctity of human life and our engagement is both gospel based and required to deal with a multilayered

epidemic in our country. Other signs included the large presence of young adults eager to lead, eager to commit, eager to help shape the church for current and future generations. The respectful conversation about future Prayer Book Revision also signaled a shift in how we will approach divisive issues within our own polity.

Perhaps the most significant indicator that The Episcopal Church is more determined to promote the Way of Christ than maintain the status quo of the post WWII church came in various sermons and addresses of our Presiding Bishop. In the final paragraph of his revival sermon, Michael Curry made the impassioned charge:

"My brothers, my sisters, my siblings, we have work to do. We must stand for Christianity, a way of being Christian that looks like Jesus of Nazareth. A way of being Christian that is grounded and based on love. A way of being Christian that is not ashamed to be called people of love. So go from this place and be people of the way. Go from this place as people of Jesus. Go from this place as people of love! Go from this place and heal our lands! Go from this place and heal our world! Go from this place until justice rolls down! Go from this place until the nightmare is over! Go from this place until God's dream is realized! Go from this place and help us live!"

I left Austin and General Convention heartened. I left with a sense that I am part of church committed to serving and espousing a mighty God who is active and effective in a hurting world and has answers for a humanity hoping for better than we see around us. I am encouraged, and I pray as we continue our life together in this church, you will be as well.

After spending several days in the city, Joy and Hope were words that came to mind. I often thought of Ghandi and Mother Teresa during my time there. While these two individuals did amazing work, I am not sure they thought they were doing much more than being the people God created them to be. Ghandi did not just wake up and decide to take on the British Government. Mother Teresa did not simply wake up and say im going to start an orphanage half way around the world. Both started small. Episcopal Outreach Camp - St. Martin's Charlotte July 29-Aug. 1




Erica Jordan-Thomas & her new beginning.


Weekend Food Back Pack Shopping List


The Power of a Prayer Shawl

The second recipient of the shawl I had initially delivered was told that the shawl was given by me AND my church. That person actually knew me and took the time to let me know she had received "MY" shawl. To me this was one of those "God moments". I had long forgotten about the delivery of the prayer shawl and had no idea it was continuing to
