To The Horse Lover

Perhaps by now you've heard about the unnecessary suffering and slaughter of tens of thousands of mares and their foals every year to produce the hormone-replacement therapy (HRT) drugs Premarin, Prempro, and Premphase, manufactured by Wyeth-Ayerst. Many physicians and women taking these pills remain unaware that the drugs are derived from animal waste, at great cost to the horses. We are writing to ask for your help in spreading the word.

Premarin, Prempro, and Premphase are the only HRTs made from pregnant mares' urine. To produce these drugs, each year approximately 75,000 pregnant mares are tethered for six months in stalls – some measuring just 3 1/2 to 5 feet wide and 8 feet long. Due to the short chains, urine-collection bags, and harnesses strapping them to the ceiling of the barns, the mares are usually unable to take more than a step or two in any direction, turn around, or even lie down comfortably. They are fitted with rubber urine-collection bags that sometimes chafe their legs and cause painful sores, are virtually never exercised, and are denied free access to water. The U.S. Department of Agriculture found some PMU mares lame from their long ordeal, others with untreated in-

juries oozing pus (antibiotics are withheld so farmers don't have to discard the urine), and a routine denial of free access to water, causing mares to fight and struggle at water distribution time.


Foals born to PMU mares are an unwanted product. Kept with their mothers for a mere 2-3 months, foals not used as replacements for worn-out mares are sent to feed-lots to be fattened and slaughtered for European and Japanese markets.

Please let your members know how these drugs are produced so they can share this information with family, friends, and physicians. Many other effective HRTs are available. Made from plant sources or synthetics, they more closely mimic the estrogens found in the human ovary. We are happy to supply information on alternatives and their sources and, if you or people you know would be interested in tabling at horse shows or other events, we can provide information.


has a light mane and tail.

The "Little" Legacy



The Mountain Pleasure Horse Association Explains

What is the Difference...

Our goal is first to preserve the bloodlines of the Mountain Pleasure Horse, then to build the population of Mountain Pleasure Horses. We issue registration papers not to sell these horses, but to certify they meet the stringent criteria if the Mountain Pleasure Horse Association (MPHA) and to encourage the breeding of Mountain Pleasure Horses.

Those are our goals and so we do not consider ourselves to be in "competition" with any other gaited horse breed. However, some of our horses are double registered with the Rocky Mountain Horse Association, so, naturally, we are asked the difference between the Rocky Mountain Horse and the Mountain Pleasure Horse.

Quite simply, the Mountain Pleasure Horse breed existed some 100 years before the existence of the Rocky Mountain Horse, In fact, Kentucky Governor Breseton Jones, in September of 1994 recognized in his official proclamation, (1) "The Horsemen of Eastern Kentucky developed a type of horse, known as the Mountain Pleasure Horse, to be smooth of gait, gentle of disposition, willing to work and surefooted as necessary for mountain terrain; and (2) this Mountain Pleasure Horse has been carefully and closely bred for over 160 traceable years along the original Kentucky mountain bloodlines; and (3) Bloodtyping research by the University of Kentucky has shown the Mountain Pleasure Horse to be the parent stock of American gaited horse breeds," including the Rocky Mountain Horse and Tennessee Walking Horse.

On the other hand; some 40 to 45 years ago, Sam Tuttle tapped into the Mountain Horse Heritage, crossing the native Mountain Pleasure stock with Tobe, a stallion carrying an unusual chocolate color, and his descendants, spawning (eventually) the Rocky Mountain Horse Association breed registry.

The key difference between the two

registries is genetic foundation. Fewer than 17 percent of the foundation horses of the Mountain Pleasure Horse Association carry any trace of "Tobe" bloodlines and those combine Tobe with the native Mountain Pleasure bloodlines.

In the MPHA, color is not a criteria of quality. In the RMHA, the chocolate color is generally preferred. Besides the chocolate color there are, to those who study closely, various physical characteristics and slight variations in gait among horses descended from Tobe bloodlines that generally are not present in the Mountain Pleasure Horses.


The MPHA registration books are now closed and only offspring of a registered stallion and a registered mare can be submitted for registration. We have no provisions for "grade mares."

requires that all former automated for permanent registration be videotaped demonstrating gait and the Board of Directors of the MPHA must approve each horse.


The MPHA requires that all its horses be bloodtyped by the University of Kentucky for absolute identification of parentage before papers are issued.

Generally speaking, our horses tend to be a bit larger (taller), longer bodied and cover more ground with their gait than the horses from the Tobe/ Tuttle bloodlines.

We are proud of the Mountain Pleasure Horse genetic heritage that helped produce the horses of the Tobe/Tuttle bloodlines. We realize that some people may prefer the results and color of the Tobe/Tuttle influenced horse. But for those who want the old-fashioned smooth ride and wonderful disposition of over 150 years of Kentucky heritage, backed by the integrity of bloodtyping and stringent scrutiny by the MPHA breed registry, we offer The Mountain Pleasure Horse.





The Pleasures at Northgait

It all started on a blustering November day while I was perusing the "Horses and Livestock" columns of the local Buyers Guide (classified ad magazine). Having dabbled in buying and selling horses for a few years, I was looking for any 'bargain horses'. Whereupon I encountered this ad; "For Sale: Mountain Pleasure Horse, Gelding, 12 yrs." and tacked on to the end of the ad was this ridiculous price which I audibly laughed at.

Sometime later that same wintery day, I mused to myself,"who would be gullible enough to pay that kind of money for some kind of a mountain horse and he's only about fourteen hands?"

A day or two later I was still wondering about the strange nature of the ad, so I proceeded to retrieve it from the 'paper recycling bin'- also known as the garbage can, and reread it.

In so doing, I again became aware

the assumption that it was obviously a type-o. And yet, could it actually have been intentional? Mountain Pleasure Horse. Hmmm.

What if it had really been the seller's intent? Could there really be such a breed of horse? Certainly, I would be the last resident on this planet to say that I had heard of all equine breeds in existence, even though I had already gone to my World Book Encyclopedia and found no 'Mountain Pleasure Horse' there. (Actually, there are many of the breeds missing under Horse in the World Book). Consequently, to satisfy my curiosity, I was to venture a call to the ad maker, whereby he was to assure me it (Mountain Pleasure Horse) was in fact a bona fide breed of horse. Well now, this I had to see.

Later in that same day, my cidest son. Mike and I headed in that general direction to get some ammunition that was on sale at a store some eight so ten miles from this Mountain Pleasure Horse.

Now if you have ever been in Michigan during November, you know that our rifle deer season is one huge annual event. Some 750,000 or more of us, don our 'blaze orange' and head for the woods.

There is always a considerable amount of preparation for this grandiose event, and as with most other things in our lives, there always seems to be a short fall of time. "But he's only eight or so miles from here, lets at least see what a Mountain Pleasure Horse looks like," I said to Mike.

When we got there, much to my amazement, this little guy, this 14H equine, looked just about like any real horse, all 700 or 800 pounds of him.

"That much money for such a small package?" And the seller retorted with, "He'll carry you all day." I looked at him as if to say, "How many head blows have you taken lately?"
