Recently I was invited to give a Master Class on Preaching. I chose as my subject, WONDER. Since the class, the notion of wonder has crept in more and more of my conversations which suggests it has merits for all of us trying to live the way of Christ. My thesis is that it is the nature of God to inspire wonder. It is the nature of God to incite amazement and evoke curiosity. When I say the word amazement, what reaction does that elicit within you? Do you think ahhhh, ohhhh? Do images of the Grand Canyon or the moment you executed the perfect dive come to mind? When I say the word curiosity, what reaction does that elicit within you? Do you think, hmmmm, how, why, I need more, I want more details, more information, more time with this idea? My curiosity was peaked in my 7th grade fire flies report when I learned fire flies tap on snail shells and when snails stick their heads out, fire flies stab them in the neck repeatedly turning their soft flesh into gruel to slurp it up. Nasty and gross and something I remembered for a long time.

God is ever and always about those activities, stimulating amazement and arousing curiosity, in creation, in communities, in systems, in individuals. God uses the experience of Wonder, the generating of amazement and curiosity to connect with humankind. God does so with all humans. Some of us are aware and attuned to this particular invitation, some of us are less inclined to notice and respond, nevertheless the call to Wonder is persistent and eternal.

There are studies by behavioral scientists that show our brains are broadly activated when we engage in activities that interest us. We undergo physiological changes when we're about our hobbies, our preferred

leisure time pursuits, when we are involved in something we've selected for ourselves as opposed to an activity imposed on us by others, like job or relationship responsibilities. So, what we choose to do for ourselves is not accidental.

In that activity is God inspired Wonder. This wonder is part of what is referred to in scripture as being known from the foundation of the world, as being known as your bones were being knit together in your mother's womb. What we love to do is inspired by God and therefore is holy and therefore is to be honored.

So ... think for a moment... apart from spending time with your family, what is something you love to do? I invite you to actually pause here and visualize an answer and maybe even write it down. I invite you to think of another thing you like to do apart from spending time with your family. Something that comes to you easily. Something that when the activity concludes you feel lighter, yet stimulated, you feel ahhh, this has been a really good use of my time, these have been pleasant, peace filled moments. Nudging you, I invite you to think of one more thing you like to do for yourself, apart from other obligations. Looking at your list of three things, how does it resonant to think **What we love to do is inspired by God and therefore is holy and therefore is to be honored.** Sit with that one sentence for a moment.

These things you love to do are not casual or accidental. They are inextricably woven into your essence. They are ways God intends for you to engage the world, ways to interact with God's own self and ways to engage with God's beloved, your brothers and sisters.

That means dear ones, cooking is more than just cooking, tromping through the woods is more than trail hiking, playing the guitar is more than random strumming. What you love is who you are and who you are is how you see God and how you see God is what God wants expressed.

Wonder! Wonder is your friend. Wonder is a specialty tool in your disciple toolbox. It is handy, it is persuasive, and it is already within grasp. You have it in you. It does not require you to become something you are not. Your wonder is one of your most essential qualities.

What I'm suggesting is cultivating your wonder is a really effective spiritual practice. Your wonder gets at the essence God wants you to proclaim week by week. God wants your wonder to inform your interpretation of his revelation week by week.

That means time out of the office and time away from family obligations engaged in the God inspired activities you hear calling you is not goofing off or neglecting your "adult responsibilities." It is prayer. It is study. It is prep for becoming your full self.

If you wrote cooking as one of your favorite things, then you are called to cook up your discipleship. Cooking has two parts, creating and hospitality, is that not an excellent way to express the love of God? If you wrote knitting as one of your favorite things, then you are called to stitch your witness together one perfectly woven God inspired thought interlinked to the next. If you wrote watching baseball, grass and sky and manicured fields and sinew and muscle and hand and eye coordination and sprinting and sliding and the physicality and the sound of smack and thwack, then maybe you are called to commentate the action of the bible lessons and infuse them with the many interconnected parts.

Cultivating Wonder is a spiritual practice that bears good fruit. I invite you to ponder ... WONDER.



children for churches to purchase. Youth and children find their faith intersecting with what they learn in school, in their culture, and in the issues they face today and will face in the future.


Did you know our adult Christian formation is also considered to be some of the best in the diocese? We are extremely fortunate to have our clergy teaching adult ed.




