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A time apart

Researchers at the Alban Institute, a go-to resource offering research-based consulting on conflict, transitions, mission in congregations and ministerial life found with the church in a period of rapid change, with pastoral responsibilities regularly requiring attention over and above normal business hours, with the growing expectation that parish ministry will be staff centered rather than volunteer based, the likelihood of burnout increases.

Burnout makes both ministry and the minister dull, hollow, and uninteresting. Time apart provides opportunity for both clergy and congregations to refresh, reengage, and reimagine. Three months of sabbatical rest and renewal every five to seven years has proven mutually beneficial for thriving churches.

The Diocese of North Carolina agrees. Its policy on Sabbatical Leaves states, "Every priest who works in the church in the Diocese of North Carolina is eligible for periodic 'Sabbath leaves.' The benefits of such a time for *the clergy* are refreshment of mind and spirit, growth in personal commitment and spiritual awareness, a renewed vision, and rededication to the work setting. For *the congregation*, sabbaticals provide the experience of different leadership and an opportunity to rethink ministry, the mission of the parish and the meaning of Sabbath rest itself.

The goals of this time apart include expanding one's perception of mission and ministry, understanding current developments in church and/or society, and providing for personal or spiritual renewal. Activities to meet these goals include directed study, participation in continuing education events, pilgrimages, retreats, writing, and taking time for rest and recreation."

Following the advice of congregational experts, observing diocesan policy, and appreciating the direction of St. Mark's vestry, I'm paying attention to an internal call to pause. I begin a sabbatical leave following the 11:00 service on the Feast of Pentecost, June 9th and will return to my priestly and administrative duties the Tuesday following Labor Day, September 3rd.

In that time apart, Bishop William O. Gregg will preach and preside over the Eucharist all but two Sundays and will be available for pastoral emergencies during the week. Our parish staff, Sarah Milholland, Cindy Thrower, Bob Clark, Alex Ancona, with our two stalwart wardens, Beth Hunt and David Fahey and our highly competent vestry members will ensure our congregational wellbeing continues uninterrupted.

As summer is resident seminary and youth mission season, Matt Addington will be on and off site through the season. September 8th, my first Sunday back, a 9:30 service, parish picnic and Rally Day activities are already planned!

For the curious, some of my time off the hill will be used for travel, some for time with family, some for writing spiritual retreats for Christian believers, some for studying new ways to engage the unchurched and some for undesignated fun. For the July and August Calls, I'll send updates from the road.

While away, I'll be praying for you hoping you are doing the same for me. Here's to a restorative summer for us all.

June 9th Join us in celebrating this day: Wear Red!

The Christian holy day of **Pentecost**, is celebrated on the seventh Sunday after Easter. It is the festival when Christians celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and other followers of Jesus Christ while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks.

The disciples were together in Jerusalem after Jesus' Resurrection and return to heaven, fearful because he had left them. On that morning, however, "there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance." Because of the festival, crowds of visitors were in Jerusalem, speaking many languages, but the disciples of Jesus moved among them and spoke to them all, and "every man heard them speak in his own language" about "the wonderful works of God." Peter then made a powerful speech to the crowds in the city, and many were baptized as new followers of Jesus.



All,

I'm pleased to share that the process for adding a new fellowship hall to our beautiful campus on the hill continues to move forward.

As you know, we have secured a \$1.4 million loan, engaged an architect and general contractor, and developed plans for construction. We are now working on the final pre-construction step — approval from the Standing Committee of the Diocese of North Carolina, a requirement before we can break ground.

The committee asked us to do a bit more research into the tax implications of using the barn as a wedding venue, and to seek the guidance of a business consulting firm to help ensure we've asked all the right questions before proceeding to construction. We are doing these steps now.

Along the way, we learned another Episcopal congregation — St. Peter's in the Great Valley, just outside of Philadelphia has had a barn/worship space/wedding venue on its campus for 20 years. In talking with folks there, we confirmed that St. Mark's need for more space, the sacrament of marriage, and the demand for our beautiful church and grounds as a wedding venue, are a powerful combination for our church, its ministries, and our desire to know God and make him known.

You may remember we were hoping construction would be under way by now. It turns out our initial timeline was a bit optimistic, as so often happens. We now expect to present our final plans to the Standing Committee in the next several weeks, and to have a decision from them by mid- to late June.

The steps the Standing Committee asked us to take have solidified our belief that our plan to continue doing God's work using the resources He's provided us on this hill is strong and will strengthen St. Mark's for a long time to come.

it in the offering plate or you can email your selection to Alex Ancona @ awancona@gmail.com by June 23rd.




