Summer Message from the Rector



So many things which we handle on a daily basis are *fragile* in nature and we have to make sure we handle them with care so that they don't get damaged. This applies to people as well as to things!

As I write I am in my first week back at work after a prolonged period of recuperation following major surgery to reconstruct my jaw. It has been a time when I have felt particularly fragile and in need of lots of 'TLC' (tender loving care), and I have received this in abundance from my family, friends and fellow Christians in Burnage.

There's a verse from the New Testament part of the Bible that I have reflected on a lot over the past couple of months: "*We have this light (of the glory of God that is seen in the face of Jesus Christ) shining in our hearts, but we ourselves are like **fragile clay pots** containing this great treasure*" (the apostle Paul in 2 Corinthians 4 verse 7.)

I owe a great deal to the National Health Service, having had five major surgical procedures since I was first diagnosed with facial cancer 10 years ago. The NHS has literally saved my life! So for me it is a real *treasure* which we should never take lightly nor begrudge paying our taxes for. But I also recognise that it is a very *fragile* institution that needs lots of 'TLC'. Mistakes do happen and not everyone has as good an experience as I've had at its hands.

As humans each one of us is basically a fragile being and we all need lots of TLC at different times of our lives. We are all *vulnerable* to hurt and pain. We get sick and are often damaged by things other people say or do to us. We are also *fallible*: none of us is perfect and we all make mistakes. And we are all *mortal*: none of us lives for ever, and one day all of us will die (whether we like to think about it or not!) The truth is we are like fragile clay pots!

But, as Christians, says Paul, we have *treasure* because God has caused his great light to shine in our hearts as the Spirit of his Son, Jesus, (who is known as the Holy Spirit) comes to live within by faith. This is a treasure we don't want to keep to ourselves as there is plenty to go around! Christ's presence in our lives helps us to cope with the fragility that we all have to contend with in our daily lives.

A Pattern for Life

I write this as we approach the 200th anniversary of the battle of Waterloo (June 18th. 1815). Now I'm not a pacifist, but whenever I think of human conflict and warfare I get upset, angry or in despair about the evil with which human beings conduct their lives (greed, selfishness, envy, cruelty – the list is endless). Then I turn to the life of St. Francis of Assisi for comfort, to a man who would not let the state of the world get him down, and set about making a difference in his own simple way.

What has a man living in the 12th century to say to us in the 21st.century?

St. Francis lived in a time of great unrest, upheaval, civil war and intolerance, and where there was a vast gulf between rich and poor; the “have’s and the have not’s” of society, just as there is on a global scale today. Francis did not despair about the state of the world, for him every creature, including mankind, was sacred. The world in which he lived was not something evil to be rejected but a sacred ladder by which he could ascend to his Creator. In the western world today, which is just finding a new sense of responsibility about our exploitation of God’s bountiful resources, St. Francis has much to teach us about “reducing our carbon footprint” and living in harmony with all creation.

Pope Francis is quoted as saying (about the choice of his papal name) “*St. Francis brought to Christianity an idea of poverty against the luxury, pride, vanity of the civil and ecclesiastical powers of the time. He changed history.*” The simple rule of the orders of Franciscan Friars and Poor Clare nuns (which Francis founded) is “To follow the teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ and to walk in his footsteps.”

Prayer of St. Francis

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace.
Where there is hatred let me sow love;
Where there is injury pardon;
Where there is doubt, faith;
Where there is despair, hope;
Where there is darkness, light;
Where there is sadness, joy.

O Divine Master, grant that I may seek
Not so much to be consoled, as to console,
To be understood, as to understand,
To be loved as to love;
For it is in giving that we receive,
It is in pardoning that we are pardoned;
It is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

Dignity and St Margaret's

A group of us recently took part in the the Dignity Big Tent Night, and “camped-in” at church! We did this to raise awareness and funds for Dignity, a charity St Margaret's support.



Dignity works in rural areas of Zambia. Dignity is a movement of people who believe that Jesus makes a difference. They believe that knowing Jesus brings hope and leads to freedom from poverty on many levels; financial, spiritual and emotional.

In 2012, Frank and Jo Kimball, members of St Margaret's, went to Mbilimamwenge in Zambia to volunteer with the local Dignity team. Together, they spent 4 days in the village planting the work of Dignity.



Two and a half years later, something amazing is happening. Five groups of Christians are meeting together regularly

and making a difference in their communities.

Stories are emerging of alcoholics who have stopped drinking, elderly people who have been cared for and community projects that have begun to help those in need.

This includes a small farm that the groups are using to grow food to give to those without, a bit like a food bank!



Thanks to the work of Dignity, there are over 200 groups in Zambia like the ones in Mbilimamwenge where Christians are meeting together. As they study the Bible together and come to know more of how much Jesus loves them, they are loving their communities more and more in simple but life changing ways. These groups are bringing people together and seeking to help whoever is in need, pooling skills and resources and making a big impact. As we “Love Burnage” so these people love their communities. This is the love of Jesus being played out in our day to day lives.




