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Learn about Hull's history and architecture and explore the **Old Town** with tour guide, Paul Schofield, or just wander around with one of the free maps available from the Tourist Information Centre.

Follow the fishes on The Seven Seas Fish Trail.

Starting outside the Tourist Information Centre are 41 unique pavement sculptures of life size representations of all kinds of fish, from a tiny anchovy to a 10ft ray. Obtain a free map and follow the trail through the historic Old Town - great fun for all the family.

Walk along the cobbled High Street in the Old Town. which was once the medieval hub of the city, where quaint old buildings and olde-world pubs have stood for years and four museums bring history back to life in the Museums Quarter. Set around beautiful gardens, the museums offer a fantastic day out for all the family. Also on High Street in Hull is the fine merchant's house. Maister House which was rebuilt in 1743. Owned by the National Trust visitors can view the staircase and

entrance hall and see how interiors would have been in buildings during Hull's trading heyday.

The River Hull walkway,

which runs behind the buildings on High Street and follows the banks of the river. is where the earliest settlers lived and moored their boats. You can follow the river to the picturesque Marina which houses numerous vachts and small sailing craft. Walk around the Marina to Victoria Pier where the Ferry used to go to the South Bank before the Humber Bridge was built. Corporation Pier opened in 1847 but was renamed Victoria Pier in 1854 after Queen Victoria left from this port following her visit to Hull.

Finally, just a short distance from the Marina and the Museums Quarter, no trip to Hull would be complete without a visit to **The Deep.** There are thousands of fish and sea creatures on show including spectacular sharks and rays - watch the sharks being fed every day! The Deep's a great place to keep the kids amused for several hours.

Discover Hul at your pace

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The best way to explore the city and learn of Hull's heritage in an exciting and interesting way is to walk the routes or trails around it.

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Museums & Attractions

Hull is home to many free museums, mostly situated in the Old Town and centre of Hull. The museums regularly host events and exhibitions, so there's always something new to discover. (All opening times correct at time of going to press.)

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Hands On History Museum

Hands on History includes a fascinating glimpse into Victorian times and also features an Egyptian Gallery with a genuine 2,600 year old mummy and unique replicas of King Tutankhamun's treasures.

If you're looking for culture or a night's entertainment during your stay, look no further than the exceptional theatres available in Hull city centre.

Hull offers theatre goers a wide mix of venues and events. If you want to see some of the musicals and classic shows that have graced the West End visit Hull New Theatre. The theatre regularly hosts dramas and musicals featuring well known actors and household names as well as showcasing opera, ballet and the ever popular Christmas Pantomime!

Hull City Hall is Hull's most versatile venue and offers rock and pop concerts, comedians and hosts an annual International Masters orchestral concert season drawing major British and European orchestras.

Hull Truck is renowned for the John Godber style high quality dramas and started out as a very small, intimate venue. In 2009 it was rehoused in a £14.5M new building on Ferensway and the new 440 seat theatre still retains the intimate style and charm of the original. Its productions regularly tour around the country.

Fruit, Hull's newest venue is a refurbished fruit warehouse which showcases ground-breaking new artists and cutting edge work. It showcases comedians, performance and theatre and also hosts contemporary art and photography exhibitions.

So, whether you want to see up and coming new talent, artists, comedians or top established names all the venues host a variety of shows and events throughout the year.



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If shopping's your bag, visit the city of Hull where you'll find an abundance of shopping areas all within walking distance of each other. The swanky main shopping centres all have convenient parking to make life easier for you!

Amongst them is **St Stephen's.** Situated next to the train station on Ferensway, this is Hull's newest glitzy shopping and leisure centre where you can shop 'til you drop, enjoy a lunch or catch a film.

Over towards Victoria Square is the architecturally stunning **Princes Quay** shopping centre built on stilts over a former dock. Over the four decks there are over 100 shops and a cinema – take a break and view the latest releases! Prospect Centre also offers a wide range of shops under cover. For classic tailoring and trendy designer names, the cobbled Savile Street to the north of Queen Victoria Square is the place to shop. Wander down Whitefriargate for more high street brands. Next to the Indoor Trinity Market is the beautifully restored Victorian Hepworth's Arcade which houses various alternative retail outlets with a retro feel.

For an instant fix of retail therapy, you're sure to find all you need in Hull. You can wander from one end of the city centre to the other and see a wide range of familiar high street stores and specialist shops to cater for your every need – whatever the weather!

Shopping

Hull is a great place to shop with three shopping centres, familiar high street brands and numerous independent shops all located within the city centre. Shop 'til you drop!

There is a wide range of cuisine on offer including Italian, Indian, Chinese, Thai, Mexican, Mediterranean, Turkish, as well as traditional English fayre.

Sit by the waterfront on Princes Dockside and eat al fresco in one of the many cafés and pubs. Enjoy a delicious pub meal and soak up the atmosphere in the Old Town or visit Trinity Guarter, the site of the old market square in front of Holy Trinity Church. This area has benefited from recent sensitive restoration including seating and public art, as well as a great selection of small cafés and restaurants with outdoor areas to make it a vital destination when visiting the city centre.

There are many bars and restaurants located outside the city centre area in the trendy quarter around Princes Avenue and Newland Avenue which are well worth a visit. This area offers a vibrant. bustling atmosphere at any time of day with bars and pubs virtually next to each other. For a unique experience why not dine with the sharks at the Two **Rivers Restaurant within** The Deep on a Friday or Saturday evening?



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Food and Drink

Hull has a wide selection of superb family friendly restaurants and cafés, as well as numerous bars, traditional pubs and exciting nightlife.

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The smallest window in England can be found on the exterior wall of **The George Inn** on a street called The Land of Green Ginger (named after the medieval spice market that operated here). The story goes that the window, which is adjacent to the gateway used by the old mail coaches, was used as a lookout by those responsible for caring for the horses.

Visit Ye Olde Black Boy in

High Street to see one of the few remaining old pubs in Hull that has kept its original style. Originally opening as a pipe shop in 1720, it has also been a brothel. It became a public house in the 1930s. There are many ghostly tales attached to the old building. Regulars are supposed to have photos of ghostly apparitions; one was grabbed round the neck by a pair of ghostly hands appearing from the bar wall. It was also rumoured that a previous landlord's dog was traumatised by spending a night downstairs in the pub. Who knows what it saw?

Another of the pubs in Hull to retain its original look as a Grade 2 listed building is **Ye Olde White Harte** down Silver Street which originates from the 1550s. This building contains the famous 'Plotting Parlour' where Sir John Hotham and others plotted against Charles I who arrogantly believed the monarchy had the right to do and take what they pleased. Wanting to levy illegal taxes, 'Ships money', members of the gentry refused to pay. Ye Olde White Harte is also home to the skull of a youth. Doctors and physicians have examined it and a fracture on the top suggests the youth died from a blow to the head. It is suggested an angry, drunk sea captain hit the boy with a pistol. The boy was discovered hidden under the staircase in the 19th century. This skull can still be seen in a Perspex case behind the Small Saloon Bar.

The old Grammar School

became a private residence after world war two and a few ghost stories originate from this time. It was rumoured that a vicar or curate wandered the dark corridors and could be seen floating past the first floor windows. Whenever the apparition was seen terrible events would take place.

Ghostly tales

Like any city, Hull has its own unique attractions and places of historical interest. Here's some you may not know about.

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Things to See

Holy Trinity Church

This magnificent historical building is one of the grandest parochial churches in England. (It is recorded as England's largest parish church by area in the Guinness Book of Records.) Being over 700 years old it has many unique and fascinating features that are well worth a visit. The font dates from 1380 and William Wilberforce was baptised here. Open for both visitors and worship. There are several cafés and pubs located in Trinity Square in front of the church which makes it an ideal place to relax and have a break.



St Mary's Church

In Lowgate, this church is a fine example of a medieval church which has been added to over successive generations. No one is sure when it was built but it is referred to in records in 1327. With years of history to delve into, see four medieval shields high in the east window and Elizabethan panelling in the clergy vestry. William Wilberforce's grandfather was a Churchwarden here and it is reasonable to assume Charles I worshipped here when staying at Wilberforce House.



Humber Bridge

Towering 30 metres above the river Humber, the 2,220 metre long bridge used to be the longest single-span suspension bridge in the world. Now in the Top 5, it is still an awesome feat of engineering. Spend an afternoon taking in the views as you stroll across the bridge or walk under it at Little Switzerland.



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Wilberforce Monument

Opposite Queens Gardens, in front of Hull College standing 31 metres high is the Wilberforce Monument a statue of William Wilberforce, the former Hull MP and anti-slavery campaigner. In 1834 it was situated on Monument Bridge but was moved in 1935 as it became a traffic hazard as the town expanded.



Hull Old Town

Named as one of the nation's bestpreserved urban areas, Hull's Old Town is packed with traditional pubs and cafes alongside the museums quarter, which holds four of the city's eight free museums. Enjoy a relaxing bite to eat while absorbing the atmosphere of the medieval cobbled streets.



Museum of Club Culture

Situated in Humber Street, this unique museum celebrates and chronicles all aspects of club culture. Regularly hosting exhibitions and projects to do with club cultures and street styles from around the world.



Fruit Market

Take a stroll from the nearby marina and enjoy the city's fruit market area. The now disused fruit market stores have given way to a bohemian mix of unique venues, shops, museums, art galleries and even a micro brewery.



Architecture

For those interested in architecture the city centre has two good examples of ex cinemas. The Tower (1914-1978) stands on Anlaby Rd. by the southern Hull Paragon Interchange car park and opposite this is the ex Regent cinema (opened 1910), with its fine Art Deco top.





Open Spaces

If you're looking to have a picnic, have a kick about with a ball, walk your dog or just rest your feet, there are various parks around the city.



Queens Dock was once the UK's largest dock and was renamed after Queen Victoria's visit to Hull in 1854. With the arrival of new Docks in the city centre, it was filled in and became **Queens Gardens** in 1930. You can still see the shape of the dock from overhead and from the walls around it. Sit and enjoy an ice cream or sandwich in the park or feed the ducks. In summer it is host to various concerts and events.

East Park underwent a £10m refurbishment in 2008 and is now one of the premier park venues in the north of England, A great place for all the family, there is an animal education centre with animals and birds. an enclosed deer park, spectacular pavilion which houses a café, two children's play areas, bowling greens, boating/fishing lake with boathouse, model yacht pond, football and rugby pitches, plus beautiful gardens. The open parkland is used for sporting and outdoor events, including music concerts.

West Park, next to the KC Stadium, has also undergone major refurbishment and is a great place to stretch your legs with the dog, or to play with the kids. Pearson Park. between Princes Avenue and Beverlev Road. still resonates with Victorian grandeur and features an excellent play area and a conservatory filled with birds, reptiles and fish. The acclaimed poet Philip Larkin lived in a house overlooking Pearson Park from 1956 -1974. Larkin was heavily influenced by the city and on an autumn afternoon in the park you can experience something of the particular atmosphere that pervades much of his work.

In the Humber Bridge Country Park you can walk below the Humber Bridge to Hessle Foreshore or stroll around the Country Park area known as "Little Switzerland", which used to be a chalk quarry. The only thing left of the old quarry workings is the black painted mill which was used for crushing chalk. visithullandeastyorkshire.com

For sporting things to do the choice is enormous. KC Stadium is home to football's Hull City AFC and rugby league's Hull FC.



Home to both Hull City Football Club and Hull FC, the **KC Stadium** is a superb stateof-the-art facility which holds 25,000 people for matches and also hosts conferences and events. Watch a match or take part in a tour of the stadium as part of a package. Excellent sporting facilities are also available in and around the **Bonus Arena** in West Park.

Hull's other first class rugby league team, Hull Kingston

Rovers, is located at **Craven Park** in East Hull. Rivalry between the two teams in the city is legendary.

Hull Arena is home to an olympic sized skating rink. Watch a game of ice hockey here or try your chances on the ice yourself! Beginners ice skating lessons and family lessons are available. Hull Arena also often hosts concerts by top rock and pop groups from time to time. Check their website for details.

Nearby Neighbours

Whilst enjoying a longer visit to Hull, why not visit the surrounding area with its many smaller towns and villages, countryside and coastline?

The beauty of the Yorkshire scenery can be seen from the many smaller towns and villages in the surrounding area and along the dramatic East Yorkshire coastline. There is so much to see and do from small villages, historic market towns and country houses to pleasant sandy beaches and nature reserves.

Visit the lighthouse at Flamborough or walk along the headland to Bempton Cliffs, the RSPB nature reserve which is literally packed with seabirds. See puffins, gannets, kittiwakes amongst others. **Spurn Point**, a unque spit of land at the entrance to the river Humber, is a haven for nature lovers. Whilst visiting the seaside, it's a must to stop off at **Bridlington**. Visit the Old Town or stop to enjoy fish and chips along the seafront.

For those with a historical interest, there are many nearby stately homes, historic houses and gardens such as **Sewerby Hall and**





Gardens, Burton Agnes Hall, Stewarts Burnby Hall Gardens and Museum, Sledmere House and Burton Constable Hall.

Several market towns are all in close proximity to Hull and make a pleasant day out. **Driffield** is known as the capital of the Wolds and features attractive Victorian architecture, historic inns, many individual shops, a bustling street market on Thursdays and a monthly farmer's market.

Pocklington is a charming market town with various pubs, shops and restaurants and a farmer's market. The centre is characterised by the red pantile roofs, unusual street names and twisting alleys. Market Weighton also has a market, several shops, cafes, pubs and is well worth a visit. A trip to **Beverley** is a must -see for any visitor. The quintessential market town, from its cobbled streets lined with quaint tea shops to the bustling stalls and lively atmosphere of the Saturday Market, Beverley is dominated by Beverley Minster which was built between 1220 and 1425, one of the finest Gothic churches in England.

Skidby Mill & Museum is a popular attraction set over an acre of countryside and commanding magnificent views over the Yorkshire Wolds. Why not walk part of the Wolds Way which passes through the delightful village of Welton and the pleasant woodland surrounding South Cave? Or by bike on one of the eight Big Skies Bike Rides. It's a great way to soak up the atmosphere and beauty of the landscape.

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
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
