State News Updates

April 14, 2020

- Governor Cuomo held a press conference at 11:30 AM and announced the following:
 - o Net hospitalizations dropped from the previous day.
 - o Intubations dropped for the second straight day.
 - o Hospitalizations by region: 64% in New York City, 22% in Long Island, 8% in Westchester and Rockland, 6% rest of State.
 - o Total deaths 10,834, an increase of 778 from the previous day.
 - Multi-State Council formed with seven states, New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Rhode Island, and Massachusetts.
 - Even if the states fail to come up with a common plan, need to come up with plans that are not contradictory.
 - Multiple sectors have to work together as well: workforce, schools, healthcare, and transportation.
- The State Department of Labor (DOL) has provided a document that answers frequently asked questions related to unemployment insurance during the COVID-19 pandemic
 - o DOL has also provided a one page fact sheet on unemployment insurance provisions included in the federal CARES Act.
 - o For New Yorkers who are not traditionally eligible for unemployment insurance benefits, the federal CARES Act included the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) program.
 - This program provides up to 39 weeks of benefits to covered individuals, who are defined as those "not qualified for regular unemployment compensation, extended benefits under state or Federal law, or pandemic emergency unemployment compensation (PEUC), including those who have exhausted all rights."
 - This also includes the self-employed, individuals seeking part-time employment, and individuals lacking sufficient work history.
 - These individuals **are** eligible to receive the additional \$600 per week for those receiving PEUC until July 31, 2020.
