No matter what kind of leader, we must see ourselves as "Servants".

Exodus 18:25 (HSCB) 25 So Moses chose able men from all Israel and made them leaders over the people as commanders of thousands, hundreds, fifties, and tens.

Contemporary English Version - 25 He chose some competent leaders from every tribe in Israel and put them over groups of ten, fifty, a hundred, and a thousand.

Mark 10:41-43 (MSG)

41-45 When the other ten heard of this conversation, they lost their tempers with James and John. Jesus got them together to settle things down. "You've observed how godless rulers throw their weight around," he said, "and when people get a little power how quickly it goes to their heads. It's not going to be that way with you.

Whoever wants to be great must become a servant. Whoever wants to be first among you must be your slave. That is what the Son of Man has done: He came to serve, not to be served—and then to give away his life in exchange for many who are held hostage."

Servant vs Leader - Defined

ser-vant (sûr'vənt)

noun

- One who is privately employed to perform domestic services.
- One who is publicly employed to perform services, as for a government.
- One who expresses submission, recognizance, or debt to another: *your obedient* servant.

lead·er (lē'dər) - defined

- noun
 - One that leads or guides.
 - One who is in charge or in command of others.
 - One who heads a political party or organization.

• One who has influence or power, especially of a political nature.

Servants are leaders who may be leading in a different way. All leaders should be servants. The role you have (CEO, president, Team Lead, Pastor, Bishop, Deacon, Prophet, Apostle, Evangelist, mother, father, usher, audio/video, praise team, etc.) should be to serve others.

Now let's look at the 6 Levels of leadership from Harvard Business School:



Although these are not categories with clear cut delineation, as humans, we are not so simple that we can declare ourselves as 100% Sociopath (thankfully!) or 100% Builder. Instead, we exhibit different behaviors in different situations, and we are driven by multiple reasons.

THE SERVANT AS LEADER

While servant leadership is a timeless concept, the phrase "servant leadership" was coined by Robert K. Greenleaf in The Servant as Leader, an essay that he first published in 1970. In that essay, Greenleaf said: "The servant-leader is servant first... It begins with the natural feeling that one wants to serve, to serve first.

A servant-leader focuses primarily on the growth and well-being of people and the communities to which they belong. While traditional leadership generally involves the accumulation and exercise of power by one at the "top of the pyramid," servant leadership is different. The servant-leader shares power, puts the needs of others first and helps people develop and perform as highly as possible.
