Beginning April 1 MCCC has acquired a grant to start up a program Called Recovery Congregations



#### **Homage of the Pines**

Following a few stumbles since equinox, spring has arrived in earnest. Tree buds are swelling. Pastures are turning green and the song of spring peepers echoes through the surrounding wetlands. It took me a while to clean up the yard after January's ice storm. The ice that brought down many large pine branches in turn froze the branches to the ground. Those pine branches further extended the duration of that grip by insulating the ice. By mid-April I was able finally to remove all the branches and even rake up the pine straw. The day after I finished was Palm Sunday. As I drove to church there were a few snowflakes flying through the air. I didn't think much of it. Snow flurries in April aren't unusual in west Michigan. By the time I returned to the car I had to remove nearly an inch of snow from the windows before driving home. Throughout the afternoon and evening I watched incredulously as heavy wet snow accumulated inch by inch and white pine boughs drooped lower and lower. A number of large branches had already broken off by twilight, but I wasn't able to survey the full extent of the damage until I returned from work the following day. The snow had brought down nearly as many branches as had the earlier ice storm. It's amazing what can be accomplished when a few snowflakes stick together. As I cleaned up the yard Good Friday afternoon, a bit of whimsy crossed my mind. Many of the branches lay in our driveway and footpaths between the house and outbuildings. Perhaps by bowing and laying their branches in the paths the pine trees were contributing their own *Hosannas*. As I recall from the Gospel text, Jesus answered critics who wished to silence the crowd, "...if these were silent, the stones would shout out." (Luke 19:40)

As the weather warms, most of us will be spending more time outside. For me it's time to clean out the barn, cut firewood and hunt for morels. Though I may help with early soil prep, these days Lois handles most of

While dramatic settings easily evoke a sense of awe, perhaps it's even more important spend enough time in habitats closer to home to discover that same sense of wonder. It's a way to connect the poetry of worship to the prose of our ordinary lives.

While the thought of the pine trees observing Palm Sunday is admittedly a bit fanciful, the notion of creation worshiping the Creator has biblical precedent. In addition to Jesus' comment during the triumphal entry into Jerusalem, I think especially of Isaiah's joyful description of mountains and hills breaking into song and the trees of the field clapping their hands (55:12). I'm also reminded of Francis of Assisi's "Canticle of Brother Sun". Many readers are likely familiar with William H. Draper's early 20<sup>th</sup> Century translation, "All Creatures of Our God and King". In such poetry or natural settings we may be reminded that we too are creatures within creation. We share interdependent relationships both within the human family and natural world. Indeed we are members of a community much greater than our congregations, denominations, faith traditions or all humanity. The world is not merely our home for now. We live in relationship to all creation. I think of the line from Henry van Dyke's "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee" set to the theme from Beethoven's 9<sup>th</sup> Symphony: "Mortals join the mighty chorus which the morning stars began...." That kind of awareness of our place in creation can help us make better choices about how we live in this world.

### CLUB 188 SUMMER ACADEMY OF ARTS AND ACADEMICS- 2019 Mount Zion Church of God In Christ- Muskegon, MI

Club 188 is a youth outreach ministry of the Mount Zion Church of God In Christ that began in 2009. The goal of the program is to provide summer programming for youth that will help minimize summer learning loss. Elementary through high school youth participate in a variety of academic and enrichment experiences during the seven week summer session. The program is open to all Muskegon County youth, however, we target youth from the cities of Muskegon and Muskegon Heights. Instructional activities include a variety of hands-on learning activities involving reading, writing and mathematics; also a small computer lab is used to support the instructional efforts. Additionally, Club 188 children are exposed to the cultural arts, and they take a variety of field trips. We also offer recreational and other healthy lifestyle activities.

The Academy is located at the Mount Zion Church of God In Christ in downtown Muskegon, MI. It meets Monday-Friday, 8:30 am to 1:30 pm during the summer. Some activities are held in other venues in greater Muskegon; and a few special activities are held during the school year, such as a college tour and theater trips. The staff includes retired educators and other professionals, community volunteers, college student interns, and high school students completing work skills training or community service hours. Funding is solicited from several different sources, including the Community Foundation for Muskegon County, Mercy Health, corporate foundations, area banks and businesses, organizations and churches, individual donors and the Mount Zion Church. We have collaborations and partnerships with other youth serving organizations. The program is free to youth, and meals are provided through local summer feeding programs at no charge to program participants.
