Invisible Fences

The Rescue "rules" on invisible fences are that they are used only when the family is home.

NO dog should be left outside with an invisible fence! And this includes access to a dog door with one!

The GOOD things about an invisible fence are:

- They are a GREAT alternative for a family who can't fence but wants the dog to be able to run and fetch and play with the kids, etc without being on a runner.
- They are good for a home with kids. Most E-fences are in the front and back yard and if a toddler leaves the door open they can't bolt.
- No worries about fences being left open by the lawn guy, etc.

However, keep in mind that battery checks as well as having the collar on are very important.

Runners are horrible because:

- 1. The dogs step on them
- 2. The ball goes further then the leash does and they get yanked back
 - 3. It takes the kids out when the dog runs by
 - 4. It gets tangled, etc.

The big NEGATIVES to having an invisible fence are:

- If a dog runs through it chasing an animal they are not going to have the same adrenaline when it comes to getting zapped on the way back in. So they tend to not go back in to the yard.
- The fence does not keep things out. So a person, animal, other dog that is a threat is welcome to come on this dogs territory but the resident dog can't run away.
- Theft. People can walk up to your dog, remove the collar and take the dog.
- Also, power out = fence out.

Puppies should never be trained to use an invisible fence until they are at least 6 mos

And remember that no dog should ever be left <u>unattended in a yard</u> with an invisible fence!
