Got Lent?

From the invitation to observe a Holy Lent in the Ash Wednesday service come these words, "Thereby, the whole congregation was put in mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our Savior, and of the need which all Christians continually have -to renew their repentance and faith." A few Sundays ago, the concept of repentance showed up in the Gospel lesson and we were reminded that the word comes from the Greek word *metnoia* which means to understand something differently after thinking it over. In the Greek world of the time, the mind was connected to the body, so to change one's mind would necessarily lead to change in one's action. Jesus began his ministry calling people to change their minds so that they could enter the wonderful, welcoming dream God cast for all creation. Jesus suggested the world values things God does not. If we put on God's values, our lives improve. Look to God's values and think about accepting them as your own, he proclaimed. Act on your change of mind. See what happens.

I've been wondering if how we observe a Holy Lent needs a *metnoia*. For some, a period of fasting, of giving up things that bring us pleasure puts us in mind of Christ's gift of love for us, of his tremendous sacrifice on our behalf. But for others, maybe rethinking how we relate to Jesus, how we interact with Christ might be more helpful. If for a period of forty days, we took up a practice of praying with our Lord in an intentional way, a new way, would we come to Easter morning as something new?

We have three opportunities for Lenten study and worship detailed inside but a completely different tack might be to buy a journal or notepad and draw a picture for Jesus every day of Lent or to eat a piece of chocolate every single day of Lent and as you eat each morsel say, thank you Lord for the redemption of my soul and for the eternal on-going gift of life with my Father in heaven.

Is it ironic? Is it coincidental that this year Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day and Easter on April's Fool? In this year of achingly distressing news, do we need a unique way of honoring the singularly most transformational event in human history? Fasting, giving up pleasures, taking on disciplines is

the traditional and commended way to observe the season but any way that draws us into deeper communion with our Savior at this time of year is to be encouraged.

Beloved, find a way, some way to understand something about Jesus Christ in a new way. Meet him in an activity, a practice that moves your soul. Think creatively. Light on some idea that will inspire you to stay the course through the entire Lenten season.

Blessings on your time with the one who came to bring us Good News and Life Everlasting.

Bishop's Visitation February 18th 9:30

At **11:00**, she will **preach**, **preside** over the Holy Eucharist and **confirm**, **receive**, **and reaffirm members** who through study, discussion, personal examination, prayer and discernment now reassert the promises made at their Baptism.

Following that service, we will fete the bishop and honor those presented for the various forms of Confirmation in **Osborne Hall.** As the reception ends, Bishop Hodges-Copple will meet our vestry to hear St. Mark's plans and add her thoughts as to the direction of The Episcopal Church, the Diocese of North Carolina and our particular place in God's kingdom.

Sunday the 18th will be a special opportunity to see ourselves in the broader context of the Anglican Communion and 21st century Christendom. It will also be an occasion to welcome new members into our parish family.



An Invitation to a Holy Lent: February 14th

Begins with these Words from the Ash Wednesday Liturgy:

Dear People of God: The first Christians observed with great devotion the days of our Lord's passion and resurrection, and season of penitence and fasting. This season of Lent provided a time in which converts to the faith were prepared for Holy Baptism. It was also a time when those who, because of notorious sins, had been separated from the body of the faithful were reconciled by penitence and forgiveness, and restored to the fellowship of the Church. Thereby, the whole congregation was put in mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our Savior, and of the need which all Christians continually have - to renew their repentance and faith. I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. And, to make a right beginning of repentance, and as a mark of our mortal nature, let us now kneel before the Lord, our maker and redeemer.

Ways to Observe Lent with your Parish Family

For 5 **Thursdays beginning February 22** we will meet in Osborne Hall to pray the scriptures and color together the Stations of the Cross we will use for our Good Friday service. Stations of the Cross or the Way of the Cross, also known as Way of Sorrows or Via Crucis, refers to a series of images depicting Jesus Christ on the day of his crucifixion and accompanying prayers. The stations grew out of imitations of Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem which is believed to be the actual path Jesus walked to Mount Calvary. The object of the stations is to help the Christians faithful to make a spiritual pilgrimage through contemplation of the Passion of Christ. It has become one of the most popular devotions and the stations can be found in many Western Christian churches, including Anglican, Lutheran, Methodist, and Roman Catholic ones.

Commonly, a series of 14 images will be arranged in numbered order along a path and the faithful travel from image to image, in order, stopping at each station to say the selected prayers and reflections. This will be done individually or in a procession most commonly during Lent, especially on Good Friday.

As we color, we'll read the scripture we're drawing, pray and discuss, finding deeper meaning in our time together.

- Station 1: Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane (Matthew 26:36-41)
- Station 2: Jesus, Betrayed by Judas, is Arrested (Mark 14:43-46)
- Station 3: Jesus is Condemned by the Sanhedrin (Luke 22:66-71)
- Station 4: Jesus is Denied by Peter (Matthew 26:69-75)
- Station 5: Jesus is Judged by Pilate (Mark 15:1-5, 15)
- Station 6: Jesus is Scourged and Crowned with Thorns (John 19:1-3)
- Station 7: Jesus Bears the Cross (John 19:6, 15-17)
- Station 8: Jesus is Helped by Simon the Cyrenian to Carry the Cross (Mark 15:21)
- Station 9: Jesus Meets the Women of Jerusalem (Luke 23:27-31)
- Station 10: Jesus is Crucified (Luke 23:33-34)
- Station 11: Jesus Promises His Kingdom to the Good Thief (Luke 23:39-43)
- Station 12: Jesus Speaks to His Mother and the Disciples (John 19:25-27)
- Station 13: Jesus Dies on the Cross (Luke 23:44-46)
- Station 14: Jesus is Placed in the Tomb (Matthew 27:57-60)

Dr. Amy Hawn Nelson will offer a presentation on the segregation/desegregation/re-segregation of CMS, where we are and how we got here. This will be at Ranson IB Middle School.

Amy Hawn Nelson is a member of the Research Faculty at the University of Pennsylvania, and serves as the Director of Training and Technical Assistance for Actionable Intelligence for Social Policy, an initiative out of UPenn that focuses on the development, use, and innovation of integrated data systems (IDS) for policy analysis and program reform. Prior to joining AISP in 2017, Dr. Hawn Nelson was the Director of Social Research for the UNC Charlotte

Urban Institute and Director of the Institute for Social Capital, an IDS charged with supporting university research and enhancing data-informed decision-making in the Charlotte region. Prior to entering the world of IDS' in 2012, Hawn Nelson served as a teacher and school leader for 11 years. She is a community engaged researcher generally focusing on intersectional topics related to education policy, and was selected as a Charlottean of the Year in 2015 largely due to her research and community engagement around issues of educational equity. She is a co-editor of Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow: School Desegregation and Resegregation in Charlotte (Feb. 2015, Harvard Education Press).

La Escuelita San Marcos is growing!

We have added a 2 year old program in response to parent requests and our projected

4 - 6 children quickly became 7.

Ms. Anabel joined our staff to lead the class which meets Tuesday – Thursday each week.

Children are learning to socialize, and become part of a group of friends.

They take part in fine and gross motor activities and enjoy play time, story time and independent "reading" time.

The 4 year old class is teaching them their songs and routines and the 3 year old class joins them at art and story times. All the children enjoy the playground together, as often as weather permits.

In addition

La Escuelita has moved to a Collaborative model, in which parents are active participants in the daily learning in the classroom. Twice a month, our Teacher Moms (Mamas Maestras) or Grandmas co-teach in their child's class. We reinforce positive discipline and age/ development – appropriate expectations. This way, Kindergarten readiness can be reinforced at home as well as in La Escuelita. This model helps build community and helps parents break the isolation often found when starting over in a new country.

We are also rendering 3D views of the two Fellowship Hall constructions being evaluated placed in locations determined by survey.
