Prayer around the world


Travel writer Rick Steves, who's a Christian, believes travel can help us see God. He writes of gaining new insights into prayer from a socalled "whirling dervish" (a sort of Muslim monk) in Turkey. Before demonstrating how he prays, the man explained to Steves: "When we pray, we keep one foot in our community, anchored in our home. The other foot steps around and around, acknowledging the beautiful variety of God's creation ... touching all corners of this great world. I raise one hand up to acknowledge the love of God, and the other hand goes down like the spout of a teapot. As I spin around, my hand above receives the love from our Creator, and my hand below showers it onto all of his creation."

Most of us probably won't add whirling to our prayer practices! And we likely already pray for people near and far. But what if we pictured ourselves both anchored at home and stepping out among God's whole creation? What if we imagined God's love pouring into us, then out of us onto all the world? How might such an approach to prayer influence how we live?

Some time ago I read the book "The Minister's Charge" by William Dean Howells. At one point in book, one of the characters made the observation "how much easier it was to make ones peace with one's God than with one's wife". My thought was to question if that could be said of me? Am I easy to make peace with?

It says in several portions of scripture to forgive others as we are forgiven; forgiveness results in having peace with one another. The so called Lord's Prayer contains a reference of this nature (Matthew 6:12 with commentary Mathew 6:14-15). Paul repeats this instruction in Ephesians "Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you." (4:32). Clearly, God's instructs us to forgive others as God has forgiven us. A higher standard than most of us live by. The gospels tell us about the suffering that Jesus endured in our place.



Answer: D (See John 3:1-16.)

How often do we spit on Christ by continuing to violate God's laws? Still, if we have trusted in Christ's atonement for our sins, we stand before God forgiven. Do we forgive others to that extent? When we stand before Christ forgiven we have peace with Him.

When someone offends us, do we forgive as easily as God does? Do we forgive as easily as Jesus Christ does? Or do we make the offender work to be forgiven? One of the things that separates true Christianity

from false religions is that because of what Jesus Christ has done for us on the cross, we don't have to work for our forgiveness to achieve peace with God (Eph 1:7). In 1 John, we learn that if we confess our sins, God is willing and anxious to forgive us (1:9).

The apostle Paul wrote to his young protégé that the law is for the lawless, not the obedient. Its purpose is to show us that we cannot live by God's standard in our own strength. The more we know of the law, the more it condemns us (1 Tim. 1:8ff). Consequently we are in conflict with God and we must be reconciled to God to avoid His condemnation. As undeserving as we are, God reaches down to us extending forgiveness and peace to us.

When we are offended, do we reach out offering forgiveness as God demonstrated? Are we ready to forgive when forgiveness is sought by the one who offends us? God is our example of forgiving, may it be our goal to be as forgiving to others as God is to us. May we establish peace with others as God has desired peace with us.

What Hell shows

According to a Pew Research survey, only 60 percent of mainline Protestant Christians believe in Hell. Even some theologians have moved away from the concept of everlasting torment, saying it's morally incompatible with a loving God.

Admittedly, Hell is a tough topic, but we can't afford to ignore it. Jesus didn't; in fact, he talked more about Hell than heaven. Why? He doesn't want us to experience total separation from God the Father. After taking our place on the cross, Jesus proclaimed ultimate victory over death, Satan and Hell.

Rather than being incompatible with love, Hell magnifies God's love by showing what he was willing to endure for us. Hell, which is utter darkness, allows us to realize what Jesus, our true Light, has rescued us *from*. It also motivates us to share the good news of the gospel — that "the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people" (Titus 2:11, ESV)!

Don't settle

Pat Answers

What did D.A. Carson Teach on Eternal Conscious Punishment in Hell? Vaporize the unbelievers and they wanted the supposition of the supposition

Most of you know I attended the Evangelical Free Church Ministerial Association annual conference on Theology February 4-7 at our Trinity Seminary, Deerfield, IL. The main conference featured seven speakers on seven key doctrines where our denomination wants to clarify our stand on Biblical Truth. The last speaker was D.A. Carson, one of my former professors, on Hell. Here is a summary of his main teaching points. He began by saying since 1800 the doctrine of Hell has been abandoned more than any other doctrine. Hell stands for everything the world rejects. Here are his main points:

- 1. The Bible describes Hell in a variety of images: being beaten; chained; outer darkness; destruction; thrown into the lake of fire, banishment, etc. You cannot imagine it BAD enough!
- 2. The Old Testament images of judgment are largely temporal war, plague, death, famine because the people of God are a national people. But the New Testament images are FAR WORSE THAN THE OLD TESTAMENT! BOTH GOD'S LOVE AND GOD'S WRATH ARE "RATCHETED UP" IN THE NEW TESTAMENT Romans 3:25, 25 God's wrath is poured out on His Son in His great love on the cross. Revelation 14:11 speaks of the smoke of God's wrath arising forever and ever.
- 3. There are degrees of punishment Matthew 11:20-24. But this does not mean people will escape Hell for ignorance.
- 4. Don't think of judgment in mechanistic or impersonal terms. God's wrath is personal because sin is personal against a Holy God. Isaiah 10:5-10.
- 5. Is there anything convincing to be said in defense of annihilation? (the modern view that God will simply

vaporize the unbelievers and they will cease to exist rather than spend eternity in Hell). NO! The same word for "eternal" is used both of eternal punishment and eternal life in Matthew 25:46. Revelation 20:10 teaches those in the lake of fire will be tormented day and night forever and ever. How can a sin committed by a finite human be worthy of eternal punishment? It is determined by the Infinity of the One sinned against. There are no Scriptures depicting people in Hell repenting or longing for a second chance – Luke 16:19-30 – the rich man still treats Lazarus as a servant, addresses only Abraham, and is self-focused. Hell is full of people who still sin and want to argue with God.

6. Never apologize for the Doctrine of Hell. We are not more compassionate than Jesus and He clearly and repeatedly spoke of Hell.

Here are Dr. Carson's summary points:

- 1. The doctrine of Hell is tied completely to the doctrine of sin and God's Holiness see Isaiah 6. Those who have a light doctrine of Hell have a light doctrine of sin and God's holiness.
- 2. The doctrine of Hell is tied to Christ's death the Son of God took God's wrath for us on the cross 2 Corinthians 5:21; Romans 3:25; 2 Peter 2:24.
- 3. The doctrine of Hell has the power to define our mission. The gospel is the only way!
- 4. Be very careful of jokes about Hell.
- 5. Rightly taught and rightly preached the doctrine of Hell should lead us to ineffable (unspeakable) praise for "so great salvation" in being delivered from Hell in Christ.
