What Emergency Public Notification, Alert and Warning Methods Are Used in Franklin County?

NOAA Weather Radio

- Severe-weather watches and warnings from the National Weather Service are broadcast on NOAA weather radios, widely available for purchase at retail stores. (NOAA stands for National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.)
- A "watch" is issued when conditions are favorable for the development of hazardous weather, such as a tornado. A "warning" is issued when the hazardous weather is actually happening or is imminent.
- The radio broadcasts can also be used for hazardous materials warnings.
- An alarm will sound for hazards in your area. A radio should have a battery backup in case of power outages. Be sure your radio has fresh batteries.
- Every home, school, business and place where people gather should have a NOAA weather radio.

Outdoor Warning Sirens

- Outdoor sirens sound when there is a tornado *warning* (when a tornado has been sighted or picked up by radar) by the National Weather Service for Franklin County.
- Sirens warn people outside to seek shelter and tune to local TV and radio stations or a NOAA weather radio for more information.
- Sirens can also transmit spoken messages for other types of emergencies.

Emergency Alert System

- The Emergency Alert System (EAS) is a national public warning system made up of TV and radio broadcasting stations,

- The system may be used by state and local authorities to deliver important alerts such as emergency weather information from the National Weather Service.

TENS

- The Telephone Emergency Notification System (TENS) is used to call home and business phones and *registered* cell phones in a selected area with a recorded message.
- TENS is used to warn of localized emergencies, such as flooding.
