One of the questions that comes up around winter time is "where have all the fish gone?" After all, you won't see many fish out and about in lakes and streams. Since they can't walk right out of the ponds and streams, where do they go and how do they survive the cold temperatures?

Fish find the warmest place in the lake, stream, or pond to settle in for the winter. This is often the deepest part of the water. If you were able to see down there you would see the world of fish moving in slow motion.

Because fish are coldblooded, they have no other way to warm themselves up. As a result, they slow down almost to the point of hibernation. Because their body is barely moving, they don't need much food nor do they expend much energy for swimming.

Some fish like trout and salmon prefer colder water and are more active in the winter. If you were ice fishing, you would find smallmouth bass anywhere from 30 to 100 ft. down, but winter-loving fish like trout and salmon would be just 3 to 6 ft. below the ice.

When the weather begins to warm in the spring, the gradual rise in temperature will stir the fish out of their slow winter state and back to active life. Phone: 812-926-2406 Ext. 107
